THE CUSTOM HOUSE ROW

WHAT CHANGED STACKABLE'S MIND?

A Dispute on Monday, Decision to Drop It on Tuesday, Suspension of Stratmeyer Yesterday.

Deputy Collector George C. Stratmeyer has been suspended for fifteen days without pay, by collector Stackable, for insubordination and for using to Stackable language unbecoming a gentleman. There have been many rumors of strained relations between the collector and the superintendent of the outside force, for some time, and yesterday the open rupture came, as a result of a difference of opinion on Monday afternoon.

Collector Stackable notified Stratmeyer of his action at about two o'clock yesterday afternoon. He appeared to have changed his mind about the matter during the day. On Tuesday morning he told a Star representative who questioned him about the disagreement of the previous afternoon that he was not going to do anything in the matter, and that he expected that Mr. Stratmeyer would keep on with his regular duties, as usual. Yesterday he altered his view of the matter.

The difference between the collector and the deputy grew out of a discussion regarding the doings of one of the upstarts men, a new employee, said to have been sent here from Washington with a "drag." This man took various unannounced vacations and the collector asked Stratmeyer about him. He wanted to know if there was any of the customs force disengaged, who could go and find out if the man were really sick or if he was just taking a vacation. Stratmeyer says that he would not follow the offending employee about, if he was spending time in saloons and report him. Stratmeyer said that he would not do that kind of work and would not ask any of his force to do it.

The collector's view of the matter was that it was the duty of any employee who saw another doing wrong to report it, and the row followed. Stratmeyer left the office and Stackable followed to the outside office, and the conversation continued in the hearing of all the clerks.

Stratmeyer told the collector that he would not return to the private office to listen to any more "scurrilous tales" about the other employees and that he ought to be ashamed of himself. Just what fiery adjectives were used by Stratmeyer is a matter of dispute, but there is no doubt that he spoke with vigor.

The whole case now goes to Washington, with a report from both parties and the suspension of Stratmeyer will be either approved or not. In the meantime there is talk among many business friends of Stratmeyer of a petition in his behalf. The deputy has been in the customs service for many years, and has made friends of all he has come in contact with. He is a very popular man and there is general regret at the trouble. Stratmeyer was a very able Port Surveyor until the change in government and at one time he was offered the collectorship and refused as he preferred to stay on the outside.

THREE BARKS IN A RACE

The barks S. C. Allen, Mauna Ala and Andrew Welch, all leaving San Francisco within a day of each other, arrived here almost together, the S. C. Allen leading, and their arrival was the cause of a lively race between the tugs Fearless and Eleu, after the three barks arrived yesterday afternoon while the other two came in this morning. The Andrew Welch left a day after the others.

At daybreak this morning the Andrew Welch and Mauna Ala were both off Diamond Head, and people who were up early enough had a chance to watch an interesting race between the two boats. The Fearless came out first, soon after 6 o'clock making for the Mauna Ala which stood off Waikiki, about eight miles from shore, while the Andrew Welch stood further in, off Diamond Head. Long before he reached the Mauna Ala Captain Brokaw saw the Eleu coming out of the harbor. The government tug was making a speed she seldom equals and was piling up white water in front of her as she made for the Andrew Welch. Then the Fearless put up full steam.

The Spreckels tug had to speak the Mauna Ala, far out, making a contract with her, and then come round and get the Andrew Welch, before the Eleu got to her, and secured the business. The Fearless proved equal to the task, and she reached the Andrew Welch first after having made arrangements with Captain Smith of the Mauna Ala. She towed both vessels in, while the Eleu went back alone.

The three Captains, Johnson, Drew and Smith are in Honolulu today making much-needed explanations of their long trips. All three are very well known here and their many friends are not sparing them. None have anything to be proud of, but Captain Johnson feels that he has just a bit the best of it, on account of having made port yesterday.
