R. R. HIND AT KAHULUI.

KAHULUI, January 14.—The schooner R. R. Hind was sighted off Kahului last Saturday, January 12, but on account of lack of health, the pilot was sent out to her, advising her to stand off and on, pending berth accommodations. She took to sea again, and will come in on Wednesday or Thursday.

A MAUI PECULIARITY.

WAILUKU, January 14.—The weather on Maui has been very uncertain for the past two months, rain and shine working alternately. Something peculiar is that the weather is fine during the week, but rain always takes its turn on Saturday night and Sunday. This state of uncertainty has existed for six weeks past.

THE LAHAINA STATION.

Manager F. J. Cross, of the wireless telegraph company leaves for the Maui today for Lahaina to install the station at that place. He took up with him an eighty-foot pole and complete apparatus. This station will be a safeguard in case of a breakdown at Makena and vice versa. The Lahaina station will not be able to reach Honolulu direct, but will reach Lanai, Molokai and Makena.

THE SAW LEWIS AND TURK

TWO MEN MUCH MISSED IN HONOLULU.

They are in the Shipping Business in San Francisco—Charitable Projects Abandoned.

Shipping masters Turk and Lewis are still in San Francisco. When they left Honolulu about three months ago it was for a "vacation." They were to visit the coast and then come back to Honolulu to re-enter the shipping business here when the sugar season began again. But they have stayed and stayed, and it is reported now that they have lost all desire to return to the metropolis of Hawaii.

Many inquiries for the two noted shipping men have been made recently by ship captains coming here, none of whom seemed to know where the two inseparables were. Captains who were here when Turk and his oily partner were running things on the front came back to find both of them gone and even captains who came from San Francisco did not know where the two were. Turk and Lewis seem to be keeping very quiet on the coast.

One of the captains recently arriving here reports having seen the two shipping masters in San Francisco. They are in the shipping business there. Neither of them is likely to go into any other, for that matter, for both have been raised from infancy in the business of putting seamen on board vessels.

The United States Sailors' Home, which was founded here by Turk and Lewis, together with a Ladies' Sailors' Friend Society, to look after the sailors in a religious and educational way. Mrs. Turk and Mrs. Lewis being the principal workers of the society, have lost all connection with their charitable founders. The "Friend Society" has gone glimmering. It died aborning, for no sailor ever had a chance to enjoy the advantages of its labors in behalf of a higher religious and intellectual standard among seamen. The sailors' home has been sold by Turk and Lewis.

The sailors' friend society idea is now open to anyone who wants to take it up. A society was wanted, said Lewis, that would keep the sailors away from the saloons and teach them to interest themselves in higher things. Since Lewis has been prevented by his necessary change of residence from assisting the society, no one else has come forward, and the movement to keep sailors out of the saloons is dead.

MANOA CEMETERY.

The Manoa Cemetery Association of Chinese is throwing open the balance of its tract of land in Manoa valley, lots being distributed to the 130 stockholders.

HUMANE SOCIETY.

At the session of the National Humane Society in Pittsburg Richard Tabor of Chicago made an exhaustive report on cruelty to animals in Cuba, and recommended ways made that vigorous steps toward the correction of abuses by the native drivers be made. The report also stated that there was less cruelty to children there than in more educated and civilized lands.


