# HE BORE A NOTABLE NAME

PETER GENET OF MAUI WAS OF FAMOUS STOCK.

Governor Clinton of New York was His Grand Father—Genet was Mourned For Two Generations as Dead.

In the death of Peter Genet at Malinali hospital, Waialuku, Maui, January 30th, a most interesting character passed from the scene of this world's affairs. Genet was reputed to be 103 years of age at the time of his death but the fact of his having seen three centuries is not the most curious part of his life. He was a scion of a most distinguished family, an historic family in fact while his own career is in itself food for a novel of romance.

Few people of Central Maui where Genet had made his home fully appreciated the real character of the man. Still less did they realize what it would have meant to the student of American affairs to have learned that Genet was the grandson of the famous Governor Clinton of New York. Genet's father was moreover a famous man, for he had been the first envoy to America from the first Republic of France and, but for the influence of the immortal Washington, would in all probability have plunged the little American Republic into a fatal war in behalf of France.

The father of Peter Genet was the famous "citizen" Edmund Charles Genet who came to America as the representative of France to the court of the United States in the year 1793. He immediately following the Reign of Terror. The fearful guillotine when it descended upon the necks of the most eminent of France's people severed alike the ties of humanity and civilization which bound France to the rest of Europe. With one accord other nations arose to avenge the deeds of blood. Deserted by practically every other ally, France turned to America for aid. "Citizen" Genet was sent to enlist the sympathy of this country. He nearly succeeded but the wishes of Washington prevailed and America stood aloof.

The failure of his mission and the fear of death at home led Genet to remain in the new country. He married the daughter of a governor of New York. A number of children were born and Peter Genet was one of the eldest. At the age of 9 years the boy ran away from his home on the Hudson and went to sea. His family sought to obtain trace of him but without success. Sixty years elapsed before the missing son communicated with his people who had long before given him up as dead. The wanderings of the boy brought him to the South Seas. For some years he dwelt among the Maoris and in the fifties he drifted to the Hawaiian islands which were destined to become his permanent home.

# APPRENTICES SENT OUT.

Wireless Telegraphy Operators Leave Today.

The apprentices of the wireless telegraph company are to leave by the Kilauea for the other islands. These are radio operators. Why they are sent out, when they know nothing about the work, is another anomaly in the long list of incongruities that has characterized the system in the past twelve months. It is understood that they are all going to two stations "to practice." These stations are presumably Lanai and Lahaina. Just why the "practice" was not carried on between Honolulu and Molokai is hard to figure out. Sometime ago it was stated that Molokai was in communication with Honolulu, and with the apprentices here they might have enjoyed their gruel and bath at home, at least.

Manager Cross will go up next week and states—that soon after he gets there the operators will be distributed and the line opened. He says that a week's "practice" on the other islands will be sufficient to make operators out of the students.
