**THE SENATE.**

Business done at Yesterday Afternoon's Session.

The Senate yesterday afternoon under suspension of rules took up the resolution of Representative Makekau requesting the senate committee on rules to meet with the same committee of the house to carry all bills passed by both houses to the governor for his signature was adopted.

Senator Crabbe gave notice of a bill to be introduced by him creating the city and county of Honolulu, and also a draft of a charter for their proposed city and county of Honolulu.

Senator Carter said he was not treated right in regard to a substitute bill reported by the majority of the judiciary committee. He said ordinary decency and courtesy would entitle him to some consideration at the hands of the majority of the committee and as he had not seen this bill he thought no action should be taken on it and that it was the third time he had been treated in that way since being on the committee.

Senator Crabbe moved to reconsider Bill No. 5, defining the beginning of the biennial fiscal period of the Territory of Hawaii. A little wrangling was done and the rules were referred to in order to settle the question whether or not a motion to table the motion was in order. The motion to reconsider the bill prevailed.

Senator Kauwe gave notice of a bill amending certain sections of the compiled laws relating to taxation. House Bill No. 2, relating to an emergency appropriation to be used in repairing damage caused by the late storms was referred to the printing committee.

House bills relating to vaccination, the repeal of certain obsolete laws, jurisdiction of district magistrates, crimes and misdemeanors, were advanced to their second reading in the Senate.

Senate bills No. 34, to secure adequate registry of property and No. 38, to provide legible and uniform recording of instruments and documents required by law to be recorded, were referred to the committee on Public Lands and Internal Improvements. Senate Bill No. 39, an act to abolish capital punishment within the Territory and substitute in lieu thereof imprisonment for life was advanced to its third reading.

**SHRINERS' NIGHT.**

The sale of seats for "Shriners' Night" at the Opera House commences today at Wall, Nichols & Company. Several theatre parties have been already arranged and the affair promises to become one of the functions of the season.

The elaborate decorations used at the Drill Shed Ball this evening will be transferred to the Opera House for Monday night and arranged under the supervision of Allan Dunn.

Wray Taylor has promised a special program for the occasion. "Nell Gwynne" is the play selected by the Shriners.
