REPORT ON CHEAP WINES

DR. SHOREY FINDS SOME OF IT FORTIFIED.

One Lot Was Not Wine At All But a Cheap Whiskey—Malt Extracts are Merely Intoxicants.

At yesterday's meeting of the Board of Health the food inspector, Dr. Shorey, made a rather startling report in regard to the character of cheap wines sold in this city. He reported the following samples examined: No. 1, Port Wine, 1 pint 50 cents; from Cosmopolitan Saloon. Alcohol, per cent by volume 40.2; extracts, per cent 3.00. This sample was found not to be wine, but whiskey watered. The sample contained more than the usual amount of solids in genuine whiskey, was artificially colored and contained added aromatics as well as a small amount of added water. Nothing actually injurious was found. In this case Port Wine was asked for and it is not known whether the substitution of whiskey was intentional or not.

No. 2, Port Wine, 1 quart, 30 cents, from Commercial Saloon. Alcohol, per cent by volume 11.5; extract, per cent 6.53; sugar (as glucose) per cent 0.82; Ash, per cent 0.19.
No. 3, Port Wine, 1 quart, 30 cents, from California Saloon. Alcohol, per cent by volume 16.5; extract, per cent 8.76; sugar (as glucose) per cent 1.56; Ash per cent 0.245.
No. 4, Port Wine, 1 quart, 30 cents, from Hoffman Saloon. Alcohol, per cent by volume 16.5; extract, per cent 10.45; sugar (as glucose), per cent 7.40; Ash per cent 0.290.

Of these samples No. 2 and No. 3 are very inferior; No. 2 in the first place is watered, and very probably watered here, for it is not likely that a sweet wine would be shipped containing a percentage of alcohol as high as 11.5. In both No. 2 and No. 3 there is too great a difference between the extract (total solids) and the sugar indicating the addition of some vegetable extract other than that derived from the grape. In No. 3 and No. 4 small amounts of copper sulphate (coppers) is present; this may have been introduced accidentally in the course of manufacture. All four samples were delivered in old whiskey or beer bottles corked with corks which had been used before. In the case of No. 2, after the sample was received and paid for, the statement was made that it was not port wine, but as that was asked for and no statement was made as to what it ought to be called I have reported it as above.

In his report the inspector accounts for the detection of watered milk in a half dozen cases, and states that all of the soda works of the city are using capsium in place of ginger in the manufacture of ginger ale.

The inspector made an extended report on malt extracts being sold by the drug stores of the city, uncovering the fact that nearly all of them contain as much alcohol as beer and are intoxicants. Schlitz, Pabst, Schiller, and Stout were found to be more intoxicating than beer, and were regarded as liquors under another claim for recognition, to evade the law.

Reports of drugs examined showed Sedlitz powders, nitrate of iron, quinine and some others to be pure.

TO PAY HAWAIIAN DEBT.

Two Million and a half to be Sent to Honolulu.

WASHINGTON, March 19.—Secretary Gage said today that immediate steps would be taken to liquidate the outstanding debt of the former Hawaiian Government, in accordance with the act of Congress passed late in the recent session. This will call for the expenditure of \$2,500,000, but it will have little effect on the funds in the Treasury, as the surplus for the current fiscal year stood today at \$26,542,000. Secretary Gage will exercise his own discretion in regard to the kind and denomination of money to be used in liquidating the debt, the only obligation being to use legal tender for the purpose. The required amount will be sent to Honolulu in cash, a part of the amount probably being in gold coin, of which the Treasury has a greater amount now than at any time in its history, and the balance in legal tender paper money. The gold coin will be sent from the San Francisco Mint, if it is found convenient in order to save express charges across the country. The whole amount of \$2,500,000 is expected within the next month to be placed on board an Army transport bound for Manila and calling at Honolulu, or on a naval vessel.
