#### Notice to Shippers.

In accordance with Sections 4472, 4475 and 4476 of the Revised Statutes of the United States, the undersigned hereby gives notice to all shippers, that the following articles will not be carried on any of their passenger steamers, viz:

Loose hay, loose cotton, loose hemp, giant powder, nitroglycerine, naphtha, benzine, benzole, coal-oil, crude petroleum or other like explosive burning fluids, or like dangerous articles, oil of vitriol, nitric or other chemical acids. Refined petroleum which will not ignite at a temperature less than 110 degrees Fahrenheit will be received, also oil or spirits of turpentine when put up in good metallic vessels, or casks or barrels well and securely bound with iron. Friction matches must also be securely packed in strong tight chests or boxes, the covers of which shall be well secured by locks, screws, or other reliable fastenings; and all these articles must be packed or put up separately from each other, and from all other articles; and the package, box, cask, or other vessel containing the same shall be distinctly marked on the outside with the name or description of the article contained therein.

FAILURE TO DO THIS WILL RENDER THE SHIPPER LIABLE TO A FINE NOT EXCEEDING TWO THOUSAND DOLLARS OR IMPRISONMENT NOT EXCEEDING EIGHTEEN MONTHS, OR BOTH.

Gunpowder will only be taken on the following named passenger steamers, under special license, viz.: Steamers "Mauna Loa," "W. G. Hall," "Hanalei," "Iwalani," "Noeau," and "James Makee."

### WORK OF JARED SMITH

#### THE EXPERIMENT STATION IN KEWALO TRACT.

The United States Commissioner of Agriculture for Hawaii Tells of the Work he is to do.

Jared Smith, United States commissioner of agriculture for the Territory of Hawaii, who arrived yesterday on the Sonoma, is preparing to make arrangements for the clearing of the land and erection of buildings where the station is to be located in Kewalo. There are about 230 acres in the tract to be used by the station, the land having been set aside some years ago by the Hawaiian Board of Agriculture. Most of it is covered with lantana now, and the clearing of it will be a heavy task.

"My general instructions," said Mr. Smith, "are to make experiments in dairying, fattening and feeding animals in the islands, growing vegetables and fruits. We shall look into the growing of food supplies generally and shall also take up coffee."

"Sugar will be let alone in the experiment station. It has been all looked after already and there is no need of work with it at such a station as is about to be established."

The difficulties in the way of raising cattle, poultry, etc., in Hawaii, have been much discussed and a part of the work of the station will be to find out some of the reasons of these difficulties, requirements, etc., that are supposed to underlie the failures of the past.

"In every state and territory," said the commissioner, "the United States establishes a station such as the one about to be established here. We have a permanent appropriation of \$12,000 a year for Hawaii, but it is not enough for the work that is to be done, and it may be increased. To start with there will be erected an office, laboratory and residence and we shall fence in and clear the land. This will make the first year an expensive one. I understand that the lantana will be hard to clear off."

"Bulletins will be issued here from time to time as they are ready, reporting upon the results of experiments made at the station. I expect to cooperate with local growers and the station ought to find out much that will be of value to the people of the islands."

Jared Smith has been at Washington for the past six years in charge of the importing and distribution of seeds and plants for the agricultural department. He has visited Honolulu several times on through steamers for Australia and says he thinks he will like the place. Several bags of mail for him came on the Sonoma containing seeds, etc., that will be used as soon as the land of the station is ready.

#### RELATIVES OF NASHIDA WANTED

Collector of the Port, Stackable has received from the commissioner of navigation copies of letters from the American consul general at Iquique, Chile asking for trace of the relatives of a Japanese seaman named Nashida who was lost off the American ship 'Helen' Brewer on November 13th last year. The personal effects of the Japanese consist of some clothing and \$5.13 due as wages. If the relatives are in the Hawaiian Islands they are requested to come forward and prove their identity and receive the effects from the Consul General at Iquique. Mr. Stackable will notify the Japanese consul general of the matter.

#### FAVORS SELF GOVERNMENT

WRITER WANTS COLONIES TO RUN THEMSELVES.

Says They Should not Leave the Mother Country, But the Bounds Should be More Elastic.

Among the through passengers on the Sonoma yesterday for Sydney were Mr. and Mrs. E. Hargrove. Mr. Hargrove is an English writer of some note and his latest work entitled, "World Politics" has received very flattering notices. He is now going to the Colonies for the purpose of securing material for another work relating to the political sentiments of New Zealand and Australia.

"I am going to the colonies," he said, "for the purpose of ascertaining the feeling there for or against centralization of government by the various British colonies. The work will have a wider scope however than that relating to Australia and the South Pacific possessions for I have studied the condition and sentiments of India, the West Indies, Canada and the South African colonies and it will be possible to deal with the feeling of every British colony upon this question of local self government."

"This imperialistic idea of government is not I believe practicable. The reason it has gained so much support is simply because nothing has been suggested in place of it. When it comes to representatives being required to travel thousands of miles to attend sessions of the central legislature or parliament the advocates of this system will find the many weaknesses of the plan. It is not at all probable that a central home government similar to that at Washington for instance, would be as well qualified to pass consistent and practical legislation for the details of governing these islands or some other remote portion of the nation as would be the legislatures

of those sections. I am not in favor of the colonies leaving the Mother Country but the bonds between them should be more elastic."

Mr. Hargrove has been in South Africa where he had the opportunity of studying the Boer situation from a political standpoint. He expressed himself as strongly believing in the ultimate domination of the Anglo-Saxon race as typified by both Americans and British.

### MIGHT JOIN THE FORCE

#### LEWIS AND TURK AS HARBOR POLICEMEN.

Now Working on the Island Steamer Strike—A Job to Get Round the Horn Crews.

How would the people of Honolulu like to see genial Oscar Lewis with star and helmet and twirling club and the energetic Frank J. Turk, also added to Honolulu's finest, keeping the peace and giving orders to move on along the water front? That is the dazzling prospect held out before high sheriff Brown, Damon and Pythias of the water front can be his if he will only reach out for them.

Lewis has already had a brief career as a policeman on the waterfront of Honolulu. When Harry Evans was captain of the front police the eloquent shipping man was given a commission by Marshal Brown and the power of Lewis' benignant countenance was backed by that of a sealed document he carried in his pocket. It was a great day for the police department of Honolulu when it gathered in a man of such accomplishments and reputation, but Lewis went into the sailor shipping business and the high sheriff and Judge Wilcox differed with him about the propriety of combining that work with police duty, and so he surrendered the commission.

Since their return to Honolulu both Turk and Lewis have had their eyes on the police department and they are said to be willing to give all their time to the assisting Captain Flint, the present harbor police captain. They have been engaged the past few days in trying to get men for the Wilder and Inter-Island steamers whose mates are on strike and it is whispered that they have distributed a letter to the effect that which comes from the depths of Klauaea.

Captain Flint when asked if he wanted the shipping men for helpmates seemed to think the honor of having them with him was too great. He had done nothing to deserve such distinction. The idea of a man who has taken Lewis' part in affairs of state stooping to separate common brawlers and haul water front victims of swipes to the station was almost overpowering, and Flint said he wanted six months to think it over.

There is a bit of shipping now to be done and though not very much it is enough to require the master hands. Two vessels are going round the Horn and the first, the Arthur Sewall, is nearly ready. The captain wants to pay men \$20 a month and the Sailors' Union, which controls about all the men here, thinks \$30 is the least that can be thought of. The difference on an entire crew for the voyage is six or seven hundred dollars, so there is much to be accomplished by good shipping men. The union also wants a month's advance for each man and various other details that are objectionable to Captain Goffrey, who stands ready to loosen in behalf of anyone who will help him to win his fight.

#### PATTI

Since the sale of Craig-y-nos castle has become public property there has been no end of speculation as to the fate of the diva's future home. Mindful of the diva's love for Italian skies and balmy breezes, many supposed she would purchase a handsome chateau which had been offered her near Naples others suggested Nice and Paris. But Patti has done what she so dearly loves to do; she has given them the slip and astonished all but her intimate friends by announcing her intention to make London her winter and Sweden her summer headquarters. For over twenty years Patti has been the chateleine of Craig-y-nos, a charming old property which she discovered during a picture excursion to Swansea valley. She immediately purchased it at a moderate figure, and during the last years of her residence has by her exquisite taste and the expenditure of over \$650,000 transformed it into one of the finest castles in Great Britain. The theater excels anything of the kind in Europe, not excepting those of royal homes.

#### SENATE YESTERDAY.

In the Senate yesterday the majority of the Intoxicant committee reported favorably on Senate Bills 13 and 16 and unfavorably on Bill 15. All referred to liquor matters. The bills were set for consideration on Monday.

Mr. Paris, for the Public Lands committee, reported that all the items asked for by Senator Makoaanu for Kauai, were included in the appropriation bill; report tabled to be considered with bill.

The same committee recommended the appropriation of \$5,000 for water for Achi's tract in Palama; report adopted. The same Senator introduced a bill appropriating \$20,000 for a telegraph fire alarm system in Honolulu; public lands committee.
