ELECTRIC ROAD EXTENSION
PACIFIC HEIGHTS LINE CONNECTS WITH TRAM.
First Cars Run Today From Nuuanu Avenue to the Top of the Heights.
Fireworks on the Fourth.

Honolulu will not be altogether without a public celebration of the Fourth of July. Arrangements are being made by the residents and promoters of Pacific Heights to give an exhibition of fireworks on the Heights in the evening.
Beginning this morning the Pacific Heights Electric cars make direct connection with the tram cars at Nuuanu Avenue. The extension of the electric road from the power house to Nuuanu Avenue has been completed, tested and approved and this morning the cars began running over it for the benefit of the public. The extension has been well built. The bridge across Nuuanu stream is a very substantial one and is not unhandsome. A traffic arrangement has been made with the tram car company by which the public can be transferred from any of the tram company's lines to a car on Nuuanu street which will connect with the electric cars. The tram car conductors will be provided with transfer slips which will be issued to passengers paying the fare for the continuous trip, and entitling them to the transfer. Cars will run on the electric road every half hour, and it is hoped that Manager Pain will designate in some way, readily recognizable, the cars which will make exact connection with the electric cars. All the tram cars connect with the electric line, but as the two lines are run on a different schedule, all do not make exact connection. The electric cars will run until 10 o'clock tonight, and if the patronage warrants it will continue to run that late or even later.
Plans are being drawn for a pretty station at the junction of the two roads so that even in the worst weather people will suffer no inconvenience. It is also planned to make the surroundings of the lower terminus of the electric road attractive with lawns and flowers. Nuuanu Avenue is to be widened, arrangements having already been made with W. O. Smith, Mrs. Hobron and other property owners on the Ewa side to widen the street on that side, eleven feet. The government owns the property on the other side.
The whole line of the electric road will be illuminated tonight and the new extension of the road will be illuminated with 32-candle power incandescent lights.
A pavilion is being built on the hotel site at the upper terminus of the electric railway where light refreshments and soft drinks will be served. To add to the attractiveness of the Heights, the ramble or bldie-path which now follows the crest of the Heights for some distance is to be improved and extended.
In addition to the refreshments served at the terminus of the electric railway, refreshments are served at the Japanese Tea Garden near the reservoir, so that outing and picnic parties do not need to take their refreshments with them.

MANY FEDERAL LICENSES
STARTLING REVELATIONS ABOUT LIQUOR TRAFFIC.
The "Kakaako Social Club" Gets Permission From Uncle Sam to Sell Liquor for a Year.
The Kakaako Social Club has a license to sell liquor. It was not approved by the executive council, nor granted by Treasurer Wright with the approval of the governor or acting governor, but was issued by Uncle Sam and only cost \$5. It is an internal revenue license, one of about 400 issued by the bureau here.
The energetic work of the internal revenue men has demonstrated the remarkable amount of illicit liquor traffic in the islands. On every island there are men and women in business who have been found by internal revenue men and convinced that they had better get United States licenses. Deputy Drake, who was formerly in the customs service, has been in charge of the work, and he has ferreted about the islands with great success.
In the office of Collector Chamberlain and in public places throughout the islands have been posted copies of the circular from Washington on the subject. It says that "Under the provisions of the internal revenue laws of the United States, any persons engaged in any business by which he is rendered liable to a special tax is required to procure and keep conspicuously in his establishment or place of business a stamp denoting the payment of said tax for the special tax year beginning July 1, 1901, before commencing or continuing to do business."
Under the internal revenue laws, as far as a liquor dealers are concerned, the holder of a license may sell wine, okolehao or anything else. The national government only looks after getting its tax from those who sell liquor, and it generally gets it. The "Kakaako Social Club" is an association of those who help to make Kakaako a place of repute in polite annals. The members did not want to risk a mix-up with Chamberlain, nor did any of them want to come out into the open and have a license in his name. So the name of the club was taken as payee of the tax to the United States.
The big difference between police ordinary licenses and those of the federal bureau is the usual state of affairs in the United States. Illicit dealers everywhere have a wholesome fear of violations of the internal revenue laws. Uncle Sam is very severe in his sentences, and the watching is constant and thorough. No effort or expense is spared in the most rigid enforcement of internal revenue and customs laws and between the work of the regular men and of secret service men, it has come to be known that it is a very unhealthy business for men to try to dodge the internal revenue taxes.
According to the reports of those who ought to know there are still all over the islands, and liquor selling is carried on in many places. Many of them are small joints, but they have been thoroughly searched for and if the internal revenue men were only police agents, which they are not, they might give much work to the courts.
