PROCESSION OF NEW CARS

RAPID TRANSIT'S GRAND OPENING TOMORROW.

The New Line Will Begin Business on Sunday—Satisfactory Trial Trip Made Yesterday.

Tomorrow the Rapid Transit Company will have a formal opening of its down town line, and on Sunday, September 1, the line will begin regular business. Manager Ballentyne and the directors are at work on a timetable, and in the near future they will have one hundred five cars from end to end of the road will be the rule, and the cars will make the entire run in about 30 minutes. In a short time, when more cars are secured and switch arrangements are finally completed, this will be reduced.

Yesterday afternoon's trial trip over the new road was very satisfactory to the directors of the line. It showed that the tracks are well laid and the switches and turns are all right. It was the opinion of those on the car that the line will compare favorably with the best metropolitan street railroads in the world.

Tomorrow afternoon there will be a procession of cars. It is proposed to run the eight large cars of the company one after the other, over the down town line traversed yesterday by the one car. In the leading car will be the governing board. The occasion will be a notable one, and many will be the passengers. It will mark the progress of Honolulu from the era of slow, mud-splashing mules, and dirty overcrowded trams to electric street railroad power, with some of the finest cars to be seen on a city street anywhere.

The part of the track passed over down town and up to College Hill, was run over for the first time yesterday. On the Punahou line cars have been running a good deal lately, and already residents of the city will be making use of the cars to ride to the city and back. The company at present collects no fares. Cars are stopped for passengers to get on and alight on the way.

The cars attracted much attention yesterday as they ran to and fro on the Punahou line. Some Portuguese youngsters have found a new amusement in putting small stones on the track, just to see how the car crushes them. Down town and in Aala the welcome car was watched with jubilation.

BARK'S WONDERFUL RUN.
From Hong Kong to San Francisco in 38 Days.

SAN FRANCISCO, August 21.—The remarkable time of thirty-eight days from Hong Kong to this port has been made by the French bark *Marchal de Villars*, Captain Rioual, which came into the harbor yesterday morning, in ballast. The vessel's time is the best that has been made between the two ports for ten years, or since the ship *William H. Macy* came across in thirty-four days. Steamers do only a little better.

From Hong Kong to the Japanese coast the *Marchal de Villars* made ordinary speed, but when not far from Yokohama an average speed of 240 miles a day was kept up for some time. The Japanese current was followed to latitude 44 deg. north, an average of 130 miles a day being made, and at that latitude strong southerly winds sent the bark along for several days at the rate of 350 miles a day. From August 12th to 14th only twelve miles a day were logged, and then, with a strong north-easterly wind, the *Marchal de Villars* made 242 miles a day, with the upper topgallantmast fast and the lower topgallantmast loose.

Upon nearing port the bark lost the favoring wind, and whs many hours in passing Point Reyes. The great circle was followed from China, which is unusual for a sailing vessel. On a previous occasion the *Marchal de Villars* made the voyage from Portland, Or., to Europe in ninety-nine days. The bark will load wheat here for Europe.

SHORTER HOURS.
About fifty clerks were present at the meeting at the Y. M. C. A. held last evening to consider the proposition of shorter hours or a weekly half holiday. G. Stephens presided. E. J. Hooke was secretary. The whole subject was discussed. No definite conclusions were arrived at, though it was pretty generally felt best to drop any effort for a Saturday half holiday, and to concentrate on some other day for a holiday, or simply to ask shorter hours. It is hoped to interest the Merchant's Association or the Chamber of Commerce in the matter. Another meeting will be held next Tuesday evening at which employers will be invited to be present and discuss the matter with their employees.

MORE TROUBLE ON MEADE.
The usual trouble in the fire room of the transport *Meade* occurred here. A number of the men left the vessel, claiming that they had been abused and badly treated. The officers said that the crew was mutinous and that some of them were discharged and others shipped in their places.
