### TRIED TO PROTECT HIM

A WOMAN'S FORGIVENESS SETS HER INTO TROUBLE.

Crump McCarthy took a Month for Assault and His Victim is Arrested for Perjury.

Crump McCarthy was given 30 days yesterday afternoon by Judge Humphreys for a brutal assault upon a woman named Katy, with whom he has been living. In an effort to save him from his deserts, the woman gave testimony which resulted in her being taken into custody for perjury, and she is in line to serve a far longer term for trying to save her brutal assailant that he has been given for giving her a cowardly thrashing.

In passing sentence Humphreys remarked that the woman was evidently attached to McCarthy and had tried to save him. The defendant is a man considerably over six feet in height and well known as a water front crimp. Katy bravely took the stand and denied that he had beaten her, in the hope that she could get him off, but the police court record was brought in and Judge Wilcox took the stand with the result that Katy is now in custody for perjury, an offense for which the limit of punishment is 20 years.

Judge Wilcox told the court of his examination of the woman, describing her as a woman of good character, and a result of the thrashing she had received from her companion. The jury found him guilty on the first ballot in the jury room, and he was given one month at hard labor. The jurors were: George W. Harrison, Isiah Bray, David Notley, George Dunlop, John Hansmann, Joseph K. Inakila, Joseph Richards, George K. Kala, Hermann Levy, George W. Macy, Jacob Lando and James M. Sims.

### PROTEST DISALLOWED.

Chillingworth Resigns From the Winter League.

Local baseball received an unfortunate setback last evening when the protest from Mahelona, manager of the Capitol baseball team against the ruling of Pahu, umpire in a game played between the Capitols and the Customs last Saturday afternoon, was declared invalid at a meeting of the Winter League at the Honolulu Athletic Club's headquarters.

A number of local baseball men attended the meeting looking for interesting developments and were not disappointed. President Charles Chillingworth of the league took umbrage at a statement that had been made by Fogarty, manager of the Custom House, stating that he, Chillingworth, had written the protest himself. Fogarty laid the blame on Joy, who lately distinguished himself by brutal football football field. Joy was not forthcoming.

After casting the deciding ballot that rendered the protest invalid on account of lack of specific information, Chillingworth handed in his resignation as president of the league and stuck to it, despite requests to withdraw his action.

Chillingworth stated that his course was taken chiefly through the money element that had been brought into the sport by the challenge of \$1000 issued by Manager Fogarty to play the capitols, and which had partly displeased many of the influential men about town, who had expressed themselves as willing to subscribe largely toward the support of the game, as well as many of the members of the league. Fogarty is said to have stated that he would resign from the league and baseball generally. A. M. Nowell, captain of the Customs team stated that the money challenge had been made without his authority and Fogarty acknowledged the corn.

### FINE STREET NEARLY READY.

Beretania Street Extension Will Open Soon to the Public.

Within the course of several weeks, the Beretania street extension will have been completed by the road department and thrown open to the public. The grading and paving of this street was begun under the orders of Road Supervisor Lloyd. Chief Deputy Superintendent Charles Dwight had had charge of the making of the new street, and he has put in probably the finest piece of street work in the city. The street has been paved with rock from the government rock crusher. A little less than half has been finished now and the completion may be slightly retarded on account of having to shut down work on the crusher. Mr. Dwight thinks however, that arrangements can be made to get sufficient rock elsewhere with which to finish the work, which is from the bridge to the new street junction. The new road King street junction cement gutters and rock curbing has been placed all along the route.

### PAIN'S ALLEGED FRANCHISE.

The Hawaiian Tramways company yesterday applied to Judge Humphreys for an injunction to restrain the Rapid Transit company from extending its line into King street, claiming an exclusive right of franchise. Judge Humphreys refused to grant an injunction and the matter was taken to Judge Estee, who also refused. A suit was filed in the federal court, to be heard next Monday, when the matter of issuing an injunction will be decided.

### CONSUL CANAVARRO.

Word comes from Lisbon that Senhor A. de Souza Canavarro, Portuguese Consul at Honolulu has been heartily received and much complimented by the Portuguese Minister of Foreign Affairs during his visit to the capital city of his native land.


