PUNAHOU PREPARATORY.
The New Building, at Punahou is
Nearing Completion.

Work on the new building for the pre-
paratory department of Oahu College
has progressed so far as to give a good
idea of what the building will be like
when completed. The building is of
concrete, and is being constructed by
the Concrete Construction Company. It
is located Waikiki of the college build-
ings facing Wilder avenue near the pre-
sent terminus of the Rapid Transit
