GETS UNLIMITED LICENSE.
 Capt. Greese of The Iwaland Is Lucky Man.

Acting under advice from the Federal Inspectors at San Francisco, Captain Whitney and Clark F. Lenbers of the Federal Inspectors of Hulls and Boilers for this district and Alaska, have granted to Captain J. S. Greese, master of the steamer Iwaland, an unlimited license for steam vessels on oceans.

Captain Greese went to the Coast last year to bring the new steamer Hanalei to Honolulu and while there secured a license for a 2,500 ton vessel. He applied to the inspectors here during their visit last year for a license but inasmuch as he had secured a license from the inspectors at San Francisco, the local inspectors naturally felt a delicacy regarding the matter. The San Francisco Inspectors were communicated with however and they advised the inspectors to grant the unlimited license which has been done.

BOXERS TO SPAR.
 Some Interesting Set-to's Promised Tonight.

Under the management of "Denver Ed" Smith an exhibition of boxing and wrestling will be given at the Orpheum tonight which promises much entertainment. The following set-to's are announced: Jack Mansfield vs. "Denver Ed"; Sidney vs. "Spider" Jackson; Jack Andrews vs. Jack Conisley; Ulysses Harris vs. Kid Atkins; Joe Decker vs. Joe Conisley; Jack Hector vs. Jack Weeday; and Lon Agnew vs. Jimmy Fox.

The last named will be the most interesting bout of the evening. "Denver Ed" and the big longshoremen may furnish some amusement if Mansfield tries to be ambitious but general interest will center on the set-to between Fox and Agnew. The two men are entirely dissimilar Fox being a very pretty boxer and Agnew a fighter par excellence. Six rounds are allowed for this contest which will give Agnew a chance to show successfully. Of course the contest is merely an exhibition one and to the general observer Fox will win all the applause with his superior and more artistic boxing tactics. It is doubtful if he can hit hard enough to seriously disturb Agnew while that worthy punches is a most unkind and foolish fashion. The two are in good condition and every body is looking for a lively exhibition.

Nagasaki, Yokohama, Hattsuji and Wakanabe, Japanese wrestlers who have already appeared on the public, will wrestle on the mat during the performance which will start promptly at eight o'clock.

FOOTBALL THIS AFTERNOON

Males and Honolulu Play off Protested Game.

The last game of the season, unless a draw ensues, will be played between association football teams this afternoon at Makiki by the Honolulu and the Males teams to settle their mutual supremacy and the championship of the league, whose regular season is now completed. If the Honolulu win this afternoon's game, which they will undoubtedly strain every nerve to do, they will tie with the Males for league honors, necessitating another game. The original game between the teams playing this afternoon resulted in a win for the Males, the game being successfully protested however, on a claim that the Males were playing men who were not regular members of their team.
