FRANCE IN CANADA.

French has been made the official language of the Quebec Legislature, city council and board of trade. English-speaking members will be allowed to use their own language, of course, but all the records are to be kept in French. The change is due to the growth of the French element in the three bodies named.

BOARD OF HEALTH

WAIKIKI DUCK PONDS AGAIN CRITICIZED.

Prohibitions of Harbor Fishing Not Removed and May Be Extended to Diamond Head.

The Board of Health yesterday unanimously refused to rescind its prohibition of fishing in certain parts of Honolulu harbor, receiving a report in favor of continuing the rule in force from Drs. Sloggett and Moore, who stated that Dr. Cofer agreed with their view. In consideration of the spread of cholera in the Orient, it was held unsafe to allow fishing in waters likely to be sources of infection. A resolution was offered to extend the prohibition to Diamond Head, including the whole front of shallow water. It was postponed to the next meeting.

Dr. W. J. Goodhue, plantation physician at Elesee, was appointed resident physician at the leper settlement. The appointment is a permanent one, though the board still hopes to secure a specialist who will work with Dr. Goodhue in studying leprosy at the settlement.

City Sanitary Officer Tracy presented a report on a complaint about the ditch along the beach road, as follows: 'After a thorough investigation I am satisfied that while the tide may bring in more or less vegetable matter which would be left at low tide, that the main causes of the nuisance are the fourteen duck ranches with their thousands of ducks. All the ponds drain into this stream and all waste and sewage matter from the ranches is allowed to discharge into the water and the ducks keep the mud and filth constantly stirred up. Besides this the ducks destroy all the vegetation in and on the water and thus go away with Nature's purifiers. In my opinion the removal of all the ducks and ranches would solve the difficulty. Respectfully, C. H. TRACY.'

The report will be considered at the next meeting of the board. The Board decided against the establishment of a new cemetery at Kapiolua, the committee reporting that the proposed site was near a running spring, from which the water might soon be taken by the government, and the drainage from the cemetery was liable to pollute it. The site also drains towards the inhabited portion of the city, and it was thought that the location of a cemetery in such a place would be dangerous to the health of the community.

A letter was read from Dr. P. R. Waughop of Kauai enclosing a bill from the Makee Plantation Sugar Co., for burial expenses of a Japanese found dead on the road in that district. The bill was referred to the Japanese Consul. Benson, Smith & Co., offered free to the Board a case of rat cheese which is said to be greatly relished by rodents and to be also a sure means of their death. The rat cheese is said to have been effective in Bombay, Calcutta, South Africa and other places, and the Board decided to experiment with the poison.

A letter of thanks was received from the Kalaawa residents at the settlement for the consideration by the Board is not causing their removal to Kalaupapa.

FOREIGN HEALTH CONDITIONS.

Dr. Cofer's report to the Board of Health yesterday on health conditions in the Orient was as follows: July 15, two cases of cholera at Kanagawa; July 16th, one death from cholera at Tokyo; two cases of cholera at Nagasaki, no deaths; July 16th, cholera epidemic in Shanghai, one new case of small pox and twenty-nine deaths from that disease; July 15, 215 cases of cholera in Amoy; July 20th, seven cases of cholera and five deaths from cholera in Kobe; July 15th, eleven cases of cholera and seven deaths at Hongkong, one death from small pox and one new case, sixty-two cases of plague and fifty-one deaths. Dr. Cofer further reported that despite the precautions of the Japanese health authorities cholera was spreading in Japan, and Honolulu could not be too careful in the matter of public health and safeguard to prevent the entrance of the disease.

KILLED BY EXPLOSION.

Two Chinese were killed by an explosion of black powder on Pe Aw's rice plantation Mana, Kauai last Saturday. News of the accident was brought yesterday by Purser Friel of the steamer Kauai which arrived from Kauai.

Chung Kui a Chinese man about 20 years of age, tried to unscrew the top of a 25-pound tin of black powder which was to be used in loading a gun with which to shoot rice birds. Ah Tong a Chinese boy aged 11 years, was standing close by, watching the performance. The Chinese could not get the top open, so he took a hatchet to break open the top tin. A spark is thought to have been caused by the hatchet striking against the tin, and this spark ignited the powder, for there was an explosion which left both Chinese bleeding objects. Both died of their injuries within a few hours.

PORTUGUESE AND PUNCHBOWL.

A mass meeting of Portuguese was held last night at Lusitana Hall, the object of the conference being the memorializing of Congress and the Territorial legislature to allow them to purchase in fee simple the leases to the Punchbowl lands when they expire ten years hence. The consul and many others spoke vigorously for concerted work on the part of those at the head of the movement, and statistics showing the great improvements upon the property made by the Portuguese residents will be prepared with this purpose in view.

Figures approximated thus far showed a million and a half expended in improvements which would be lost to the community when the leases expire unless fee simple grants are purchased.
