BISHOP RESTARICK

THE CLERIC HAS NO PRESENT PLANS.

Will Look Over the Ground and Form His Own Opinions Before Starting Church Extension Work.

Bishop Restarick will conduct his first services in the cathedral on Sunday next, preaching at the evening services at St. Clement's. The bishop states that he likes the outlook at present, although his horizon is naturally a limited one, he having only been here a few hours.

"It does not seem altogether so strange to me," he said, "as really San Diego and Southern California are not totally unlike the climate of Hawaii. This seems balmy to me however, there is an entire absence of the chill one feels in lower California. In San Diego towards evening, it is too chilly to sit out of doors. I have no plans for church extension. I want to look into everything carefully before making any plans and I want to, to look into things for myself and form my own opinions without being influenced by those of others. So I am not discussing any plans at all until there has been plenty of time to size everything up."

"I am always pleased to meet the newspapers and believe that they should be reciprocal with the church. They print the news and the news often does us good. I ran an Anglist journal for ten years in Southern California so that I am somewhat in touch with newspaperdom myself."

"My immediate party consists of my own family, my wife, two daughters and my son. With us came Mrs. L. F. Polson, Miss Charlotte Tegert and Miss Evelyn Wile who are located at St. Andrew's Priory where they will act as workers in that institution. Deaconess Drant, who has located at Hialeah Lawn will do much of the outside work of the church in connection with the Sunday schools and visitations though of course her duties to be in Honolulu are not yet defined. The Rev. J. Arthur Evans and his wife of the Church of the Ascension, Los Angeles are here on a vacation, and F. F. Fyler who was for a long while parish clerk of San Diego and also my secretary, is with us and may remain here. All the local clergy have called upon me. I met the Rev. Mr. Kincaid in San Francisco, also H. E. Cooper and other Hawaiians. Mr. Cooper is staying at the Occidental arriving there on July 13. He is, as you know, an old time friend of mine. I really think that is all. We had a delightful voyage down here and were met by two committees. All that you know, too. Mr. Fyler, who has been around town this morning, is delighted with Honolulu. He is a South Carolina man and the local climate reminds him of that of his birth place.

IN CONTEMPT.

LONDON, July 30.—Patrick McHugh, Nationalist member of Parliament for the division of Leitrim, left the House of Commons tonight, accompanied by the Governor of the Sligo jail, in which place Mr. McHugh is to serve a sentence of three months' imprisonment. A select Parliamentary committee decided to take no action in the case. Mr. McHugh was arrested on June 15th on a bench warrant issued by the special court assembled at Sligo, under the Criminal Act, charging him with contempt of court. In the course of Mr. McHugh's trial in April, 1921, when he was accused of publishing seditious libels in his newspaper, the Sligo "Champion," it is charged that he called the presiding magistrate a liar and that he refused to apologize, saying to the magistrate, "I never express regrets to sweeps of your kind."

KING IMPROVES.

LONDON, August 1.—King Edward daily increases his walking exercise, upon which his physicians no longer place any restraint. There is now no doubt that his majesty will be strong enough to undergo the coronation ceremonies on August 9th, but in order to guard against contingencies, a movable chair is being prepared for his majesty's use should it be found necessary.

The King is expected to remain on board the royal yacht at Cowes until the last possible moment on Friday, the 5th, if this is possible, but there is a strong possibility of his coming to London Thursday. His Majesty is in excellent spirits, and greatly enjoyed his seven-hour cruise to Brighton and back today.

COWES, July 28.—An official bulletin issued today says: "The King's health continues excellent, and the wound is healing rapidly. His majesty was able to be moved from his couch in his wheeled chair for a few hours yesterday."

SOLVES ITSELF.

ROME, August 1.—According to statements obtained from reliable sources, it is the intention of the Vatican that the Filars of the Augustinian, Dominican, Franciscan and Redemptorist orders meet in Manila, with numbers about 450 men, shall have there in small numbers at different times, so that when the moment comes to resume negotiations between Governor Taft and the apostolic delegation all the filars will have left the archipelago in such a way that the trait question will have solved itself without the necessity of further discussion.

The foregoing plan is interpreted as a late but significant recognition by the Vatican that Secretary Root's first proposition made to the Vatican through Governor Taft, was the most liberal that could be devised for the settlement of the question. The great influence of the religious orders in Rome must be reckoned with, however, should they think it to be to their interest to resist the measure. From present indications this would seem not to be so, as the general of the Augustinians will soon leave for the United States to choose American Augustinians to replace the Spanish members of that order now in Manila.

COFFEE AND RICE.

Williams, Dimond & Co., under date of San Francisco, August 1, say:

"Coffee: The market has been bare of Hawaiian coffee until some few recent arrivals, but as none has been offered for sale as yet, we are unable to give quotations. The general position of the coffee market is somewhat stronger than it has been, owing to better prices for Brazils in New York. The upward movement in New York is attributed, however, mainly to the manipulations on the part of the principal "Bull" operators, in which there are large interests concentrated, and to which movement the dealers in actual coffee have so far paid but little attention."

RICE: Owing to continued bad reports of the drought in the South, there has been a sharp advance in our market. Long Grained Louisiana is still extremely scarce and we quote 4 1/2 to 5 according to grade. Imported Japan 4.75; duty paid.

RUSSIA AND SUGAR.

Declares Increased Duties Infringement of Treaties.

ST. PETERSBURG, July 27.—The different organs of the Ministry of Finance publish an identical article on the note of M. de Witte, the Minister of Finance, regarding the Brussels sugar convention. The article declares that the application of increased duties to refined sugar exported from Russia must be regarded as an infringement of existing treaties, and that such infringement would serve as a precedent for a whole series of similar acts.

Referring to Russia's answer to "America's arbitrary increase of the sugar duty," the article contends that Russia is justified in taking similar action in analogous cases.

Discussing the trust question generally the article declares that the trusts have paralyzed all treaties and prevented trade development on a sound basis.
