OPIUM MONOPOLY OF CANTON. LONDON, August 18.—In a dispatch from Hongkong the correspondent of the Daily Mail says Negpikao, formerly chief Consul at Singapore, Straits Settlement, has acquired the opium monopoly of Canton by undertaking to contribute \$1,000,000 annually toward the indemnity China is paying the powers.

TELLS OF HAWAII'S ADVANTAGES. SAN FRANCISCO, August 20.—Walter C. Weedon, a resident of Honolulu, delivered his second lecture last evening on the Hawaiian Islands at the Young Men's Christian Association Hall. Mr. Weedon discussed not only the social conditions of the islands, but gave a most interesting account of the industries, the fruits, the wealth of beauty in nature's parks and on the great mountains and described also the climate, inviting his hearers to go there and judge for themselves of the advantages. He pointed to the opportunity there is for those who would care to enter the pineapple, the coffee and the rice industries, telling at the same time of the quiet and repose of the islands for those who need mental and physical rest.

LAW BOOKS AT AUCTION. A sale of law books that were the property of the late Johnson Nickens, of Wise & Nickens, HHO, was held yesterday. There was a large attendance of lawyers, and the bidding was quite active. Among the largest purchasers were Justice Perry, A. G. M. Robertson, Judge Huxley, E. C. Peters, T. E. Dillon, W. W. Thayer, E. M. Watson, C. W. Ashford. The books generally brought good prices. One volume of the civil laws of Hawaii, Ballou's compilation, brought \$10. This is far more than the book cost now, but it is out of print and very hard to get now.

CHINA WILL EXHIBIT. SHANGHAI, Aug. 17.—Liu Kun Yi, Chang Chih Tung and Yuan Shai Kai, viceroys respectively of Nankin, Hankow and governor of Pechili in separate conferences with T. S. Sharrrett, chief commissioner for the United States, have concurred in making two significant and unequivocal declarations. The first is that the critical time has arrived when China must make a supreme effort for the promotion of commerce and friendly intercourse with America and Europe; the second declaration is that as an evidence of her good faith in this intention and her appreciation of the generous policy of the United States toward her, China will make an unprecedented exhibit at the St. Louis exposition.
