SYSTEM OF AUDITOR'S SISAL MACHINERY RELATING TO CHECKING

ACCOUNTS ARE EXAMINED REGULARLY BUT MONTHLY SETTLEMENT ALLOWS MUCH LATITUDE. WAYS TO BEAT GOVERNMENT.

One of the features in the Wright embezzlement case, which has been so full of mysteries, that has brought out a good deal of comment and many questions, is "How it happens that when the territorial government is so hard pressed for money that it can scarcely pay its current bills, still a clerk in one of the public offices is able to embezzle nearly \$4,000, that being the amount he is formally charged with?"

Auditor Austin says that under the law every public accountant, and that means every government employe who collects any public money, must render an account of it and pay over all collections monthly by the tenth day of the month following that for which the report is made. The Auditor is required to check up the books of each public accountant once in three months to see that they correspond with these monthly reports sent in. Mr. Austin says that these monthly reports and accountings have been regularly made, and the quarterly auditing has been regularly and carefully done. He says further that the quarterly audits have checked up with the monthly reports.

From this state of facts it is deduced that the alleged embezzlement must have occurred or at least might have occurred in one or two ways. The shortage of each month might have been temporarily made good from the receipts for the first ten days of the succeeding month. The receipts for any calendar month did not have to be accounted for to the treasurer until the tenth of the next month. So that if the shortage were suddenly called for at the end of the first ten days of the next month, these receipts could be used to make the account good. Thus the shortage could be carried from month to month indefinitely until it got larger than the receipts for the first ten days of the month, or unless an accounting were suddenly called for at some other than the regular time.

The other way in which the embezzlement might have been effected is by the old familiar way of receiving money, receipting for it to the party paying it, but making no record of it on the books of the office, so that no audit of accounts would detect it, until some accident disclosed the method or set on foot an investigation.

MARRIED. HAM-GORDON—At the Methodist parsonage, Honolulu, September 15, 1932, Rev. George L. Peterson officiating, Miss Margaret Theresa Gordon to William A. Ham, both of Honolulu.

DIED. WEAVER—In Honolulu, Monday September 15, at the Lunallo Home, Phillip L. Weaver Sr., aged 74 years from cancer of the stomach. Deceased was born near Syracuse, New York 1858, came to California by way of the Isthmus of Panama in 1852 and engaged in placer mining, making a fortune in three years which he invested in the firms of Weaver, Wooster and Co., and Moses, Ellis and Co., of San Francisco. For six years he had charge of the almshouse in that city. He was an active pioneer of the State of California and a member of the vigilance committee in its early history. He leaves three children, Mrs. Henry Faugel of New York city, Mrs. Franz Boedfeld of San Francisco and Phillip L. Weaver of this city. The remains will be cremated and the funeral services will be held at Kawaiahao church on Wednesday September 17 at 4:30. The ashes will be interred in the Armstrong plot of that church.

NO FIFTH CLASS.

There will be no fifth class yacht race on regatta day. The third class will race as usual. Clarence Crabbe, through the stress of politics has temporarily resigned from the regatta committee and Allan Dunn has been appointed in his place. The latter will also act as judge of the yacht on Regatta Day with George Turner judge of the course. All entries close tomorrow. Yachts will be assigned numbers on the program and also on cloth, the latter to be fastened to the main sails in a conspicuous position. All yachtsmen are asked to remember the life saving event on the program.

NEW TELEPHONE SYSTEM.

An agreement has been signed between the Standard Telephone Company and the territory of Hawaii by which the former is authorized to lay telephone wires. All cables withing a radius of half a mile from the corner of Fort and King streets, a radius that may be extended to one mile within a year on the request of the Superintendent of Public Works. Thirty days notice before commencing work upon the streets must be given and the underground conduit system must be started within eight months, public service commencing within fourteen months. Fifteen instruments and service must be given free to the Territory.

A SUGGESTION.

John E. Winkle, chief of the government secret service, recommends in a recent report that \$1 and \$2 bills be made shorter and narrower than larger denomination paper, in order to simplify the detection of "raised" bills. He thinks such a plan would soon put a stop to that lucrative criminal practice.

Walter C. Weedon sends word from San Francisco that the machinery for the Hawaiian Fibre Company will be shipped by the Alameda September 15, arriving here a week later. This machinery is said to be of the latest design and improvement for manufacturing sisal. It will be put up at once on arrival here and the work of harvesting and marketing the product of the Hawaiian Fibre Company which has plantations at Ewa, this island, will be commenced at once.

The Tubbs Cordage Company of San Francisco which is interested in the enterprise has been experimenting with and reducing fibre from sisal sent from here for that purpose. The officers of the company told Mr. Weedon that if the fibre reduced from the plant by the new machinery is of the same tensile strength as that reduced by hand process, it could be the best sent to the market from anywhere, and would command the highest prices. They added that they knew of no reason why it should not be of the same tensile strength as that reduced by hand. On the strength of the experiments they have been making, and the outlook for production and development, Mr. Weedon says the Tubbs Cordage Company has increased its interests in the Hawaiian Fibre Company.

RUNAWAY ON IRMGARD WHARF.

The Chinese cook on the gasoline schooner Eclipse caused considerable excitement on the Irmgard wharf yesterday. By a mistake he pulled the string that starts the whistle on the schooner. This noise frightened a team of horses attached to a dray that was being loaded with bags sent to the wharf from mauka on the wharf, bumped into another wagon, and tore open several bags of flour that were piled on the wharf. The horses were stopped before they had gone very far however.

REPUBLICANS GO TO MOLOKAI

The Republicans inaugurated the campaign on Molokai last week. A party of speakers, consisting of S. Keiloh, Louis Von Tempky, Phillip Pali, S. Kahua, D. H. Kapulelio and J. H. S. Kaleo accompanied by four musicians, boarded the steamer Lehua at Lahaina last Friday and went to Pukoo. The party planned to make a number of political speeches about the island. They will probably return to Maui this week.

HOME RULERS MEET FROST.

According to reports brought from the Kona side of Hawaii, the Home Rule politicians are meeting a frost in that section. W. Mossman and D. Kalauokalani tried to do some spell binding at Hoakona last Saturday afternoon. Their eloquence wasted its fragrance on the desert air, as only three old men and two dozen boys by actual count, were in the audience.

HONOLULU TO SAIL SOON.

The schooner Honolulu is expected to sail today for the Sound, in ballast. The vessel sent the second mate to Honolulu last Saturday on the steamer Koaia after the schooner's chronometer. The officer will take the chronometer back to the vessel this afternoon as the instrument has been fixed. The Honolulu has finished discharging and is expected to sail tomorrow morning for Puget Sound. The vessel will take a long time in which to make the trip to the Coast, as she is very foul and her progress will be very slow.

FOR INCURABLES.

The linen for the new hospital for incurables has been completed by the Woman's Guild of St. Clement's church and has just been taken out to the hospital at Kaimuki by the courtesy of the Pacific Transfer company.

McKINLEY'S HOUSE.

A national bank building covers the site at Niles, O., formerly occupied by the house in which President McKinley was born. The building is to be marked by a memorial tablet. The old house was cut in two about eight years ago, and the sections now stand in different parts of the town.
