NEWS FROM HAWAII.

Purser Willis Simerson of the steamer Mauna Loa which arrived this morning from Hawaii and Maui ports reports that strong northeast winds and rough seas have been prevailing along the Hamakua coast. There has been plenty of rain. Along the Kau coast very smooth seas and no winds were the order during the steamer's trip. There was plenty of rain however. The steamer Kauai had 3500 sacks of sugar aboard at Punaluu when the Mauna Loa left Hawaii. The Kauai was expected to sail for Honolulu at noon today.

MAUNA LOA ARRIVES TODAY.

The Mauna Loa arrived this morning with a very heavy list of freight. She brought over 8,000 sacks of sugar and 1,000 sacks of seed cane, besides other stuff.

A WET SUMMER.

The Lancet assures us that a wet summer has its advantages. We are glad to hear it, says the London Express. In London and in many other big manufacturing towns the almost continual rain has provided us with a wonderfully clear and clear air. The freshness and transparency of the air of London are well-known effects of a sharp rainstorm.

The continual bombardment of the air by millions of pure water drops exerts a mechanical effect, a physical effect and a chemical effect, all of which play a part in a hygienic purpose. There is no doubt that the rapid passage of water drops through air exerts a bracing effect upon it, which is probably due to the formation of peroxide of hydrogen, which gives invigorating properties to the air. Yet, somehow, in spite of all this, the continuous rain has exerted a most depressing influence over most of us.

A LOCAL SHOWER.

An extreme example of the very local character of rainstorms in these islands during the summer season occurred yesterday afternoon, and was observed by a number of people on the King street line of the Rapid Transit road. Between Pihok street and Thomas Square about 3 o'clock there was a tremendously heavy shower, amounting almost to a cloudburst and lasting about ten minutes. The street was entirely flooded. The gutters ran torrents. Ten yards beyond Pihok street not a drop of rain fell, and Pihok's watering cart pursuing its way marked a clear distinction between the sprinkled track and the dusty remainder of the road. From Thomas Square to Punchbowl street a slight shower fell, while this side of Punchbowl scarcely any rain fell.

STRAW HATS.

A writer in the New York Sun has found evidence for saying that in many cities straw hats are "called in" after September 1, though in Montreal the straw-hat season has been extended to September 4. In New York the Panama hat has prolonged the season to October 1, if the weather should warrant it.

LARGEST DUCK FARM.

Australia has the largest duck farm and the largest incubator in the world. The incubator has a capacity of 11,440 ducks' eggs, or 14,080 hen's eggs.

ANOTHER NUT FOR BOARD OF STRATEGY

THE PRESIDENT OF THE MARCUS ISLAND TRUST IS ASKED TO GIVE UNCLE SAM \$2,500.

Just as the schooner Julia E. Whalen was entering the harbor yesterday afternoon, a suit was instituted against her owner to declare her forfeited to the United States, on account of alleged violations of federal statutes in securing American register for her, just before she started on her famous trip to Marcus Island.

United States Attorney Breckons began suit against Walter C. Peacock, owner of the schooner for \$2,500, the value of the vessel, claiming that the amount received by him, from T. H. Davies & Company for Hilo road work. The money was turned over to Chief Clerk White.
