**KUHIU ON TRIP
TO WASHINGTON**

HE WILL NOT GO AT ONCE—HAS NOT SELECTED HIS SECRETARY. PLANS INDEFINITE.

Kauai has extended an invitation to Prince Kuhio and others of the Republican party to come to Kauai on Thursday and celebrate in a big luau on Saturday in honor of the Republican victory and the part which Kauai has played in gaining it. The prince is unable to attend the luau through other arrangements. He is still suffering from horseiness and is under medical treatment so that while able to speak, anything like a set speech would be impossible.

"I am perpetually being asked," said the delegate elect this morning, "if I am going to Washington right away and who I have selected as my secretary. I don't know. My plans are indefinite. I do not know whether I shall go to Washington ahead of the opening of Congress or not. I do not know whether I would be advisable to go on then and learn something about the lay of the land or whether there would be nothing gained by it. At any rate I am not going right away. There is a lot of work to be done here in settling what we want and how to best go about obtaining it. It is no child's play. The questions involved are all serious ones and not to be lightly undertaken. I expect to devote all my energies to the pushing of our necessities in Congress but I do not wish to waste any of those energies by working in a wrong direction or by any waste of time. I have not chosen any secretary so far. It seems to me there is ample time for all that yet."

"I understand that, Robert Wilcox has done a very generous thing. I am told that he made a speech at Home Rule headquarters in which he announced that he had lost and asked all his people to uphold and stand by the new delegate. I hope that all Republicans will avoid blaming the many Hawaiians for not joining the party. They are not to blame. They are ignorant entirely of party politics as they are ignorant in other matters not so obvious as party politics. The more intelligent class understand and they are with us. The rest will come but they need education."

WILL HAVE TO WAIT

The candidates for official positions who are seeking an endorsement from the Republican Territorial Central Committee will probably have to wait for action on the part of the committee until the time for the special session of the Senate arrives. The members of the committee are being solicited for support in behalf of several candidates for the auditorship and treasurership, but the matter has not been taken up yet. For the office of Superintendent of Public Works Henry E. Cooper appears to have no opponent. Senator Crabbe, chairman of the Central Committee, stated this morning that the matter of appointments would not be taken up until the session began. The committee meets again this evening, but the proposed ratification luau is the subject for discussion. All depends now on the amount of money raised for the celebration.

REV. FATHER M'KINNON'S WORK

SOMETHING OF THE CAREER OF A PROMINENT FIGURE IN THE PHILIPPINE CAMPAIGN.

SAN FRANCISCO, November 1.—Rev. Father McKinnon, whose body has just been brought back to California, went to the Philippines as chaplain of the First California Regiment and detachments from that organization will act as the military escort to the remains of the loved chaplain in the procession from the steamer. He was the most popular man in the regiment. He endured with the soldiers the hardships of the campaign, their tedious camp life and the long and arduous marches in the tropical climate and he was most indefatigable in his ministrations to the sick and wounded.

He remained in the Philippines when the regiment was ordered home and he was appointed as a chaplain in the regular service of the army. He became the most prominent clergyman in the islands and he did much toward organizing the public school system of Manila. Besides his services as chaplain in the army he assumed the duties of superintendent of the school system, and he labored hard to influence the Filipinos to favor the efforts that were being made to give them a modern system of education. He labored heroically during the recent epidemic of cholera and the unceasing strain of these months undermined his health and resulted in his death. About a year ago he came home for a vacation but he could not be induced to remain long as he claimed that his work was waiting for him in the Philippines.

Father McKinnon came to California when he had and he was educated at Santa Clara College. For a time he was secretary to the Archbishop and later he was placed in charge of the parish at Rio Vista. Several of his relatives reside in this city.

KAUAI POLO TEAM.

The Kauai polo team have sent in their names and positions and those of their ponies which all belong to the Lihue Ranch. The Kauai boys will arrive with their ponies next week and with Oahu's second team on Saturday November 22. Their desire will probably be granted as the last heavy practice practically closes on Saturday next. Kauai will play as follows two families being represented in the team. S. Malina, No. 1; A. H. Rice, No. 2; P. Malina, No. 3; G. A. Rice, No. 4. They have three ponies apiece named Plo-inny, Haupu, Ellen, Bobby, Gypsy, Coronation, Hot Pins, Maria, Peanut, Hont Kawa, Peter and Puulua. Their colors are red and white.

**ADMIRAL BECKLEY
TALKS AT HILO**

HE TELLS THE PEOPLE OF THE RAINY TOWN HOW HE ELECTED KUHIU—DIVINE AID.

HILO, November 7.—The speech of Admiral Beckley at Hilo on Thursday last was the event of the evening after the complimentary band concert and torch light procession. The band-stand was the rostrum of the admiral who could hardly speak at first for the cheers of the audience, the clanging of cow bells and the tooting of trumpets and horns.

"Fellow citizens," said the admiral, standing in confident pose, "I am proud as feeble words can hardly express of the royal reception you have given me showing the great Aloha that you have for me. With my assistance Prince Cupid has been elected and the people of this island should be proud of the majority with which they send him to Washington. You will have good times now and our pockets will be filled with gold. I am proud of the great assistance that I was able to render the Republican party."

"Stocks will go up. Oina has already advanced \$5, so has Kihel. I assure you good times are coming. Investors will come to Hilo and invest in this city and in Oina plantation. Honolulu will not be in it. (Cheers.)"

"I stood in the rain at Waiakoa and I worked on all the islands. I led the voters to light where they dabbled in the dark before. I have prayed to Heaven for the victory of the Republican party and you know that my prayer was not in vain. When some people in Honolulu told me that the prince would not be elected it was me that put up the money."

"I was told from Heaven to be Republican and I knew that the party would be successful. There was nobody that believed Kuliou would be successful, only me, only Beckley, and Admiral Beckley has gained the confidence of the party and the people in Hilo. We will line our pockets with gold, yes G-O-L-D. I am the Prince of Hawaii."

The admiral concluded his peroration with the announcement that the Steamship Company of which he was a director appreciated the Hilo business so much that the freight rate would in future be \$2.50 instead of \$5, a statement greeted with hearty cheers. In conclusion he said:

"I am the admiral of the largest lodge a maritime lodge, that can boast of a bigger membership than any in San Francisco or New York and that is due to my efforts. It is the greatest honor to me to wear the button of Lodge Number 54 and to let the admiral's flag fly from my ship when she reaches these shores."

PRESSING NEED FOR PHYSICIANS

ARMY SURGEONS CHECK CHOLERA IN THE CITY BUT UNABLE TO GO TO THE PROVINCES.

SAN FRANCISCO, November 1.—Civilian medical practitioners are badly needed in the Philippines to assist the army doctors in their fight against the cholera. Army surgeons who arrived from Manila yesterday state that the force of medical men now in the islands is totally inadequate to cope with the disease and unless more surgeons are sent to the Philippines the epidemic will soon spread over the entire group.

When the transport Sheridan left Manila the plague in the city had been gotten under control and only an average of three cases a day was being reported. In the provinces, however, the disease continued to rage unchecked. On the island of Panay 400 cases were daily being reported. In Cebu and Samar the death rate was high, an estimate of the death rate throughout the islands placed the number at 200 each day.

In speaking of the spread of the cholera Surgeon-Major A. H. Appel said: "It is true that the plague is dying out in Manila, but in the outside provinces it is still raging. The army surgeons are doing all they can to stop the spread of the disease, but are handicapped in their efforts by the difficulty in reaching the provinces. Civilian surgeons are badly needed to go into the provinces and fight the disease."

ST. CLEMENT'S PARISH.

The vestry of St. Clement's at a meeting held last night took the necessary steps to complete the provisional organization as a parish made by Bishop Nichols last April when acting bishop of Honolulu. The boundaries of the parish are the same as those of the provisional parish. Major Davis, Captain Whiting and L. de L. Ward were elected lay delegates to the convocation which takes place next Wednesday at St. Andrew's cathedral.
