

The Oregon began coaling yesterday by means of lighters, coal laden, towed out by the Iroquois.

Colonel Soper and Captain Hawes of the National Guard yesterday paid an official call on Admiral Rodgers.

Captain Gilbert Brokaw, formerly of the tug Fearless, has been appointed master of the redstack tugboat Liberty.—Call.

Nigel Jackson, charged with murder in the first degree, was before Judge Wilcox this morning. The hearing was continued until November 14.

MET HIS DEATH BY DROWNING

CATHOLIC PRIEST AT SETTLEMENT LOSES HIS LIFE—BODY FOUND AT BOTTOM OF POOL.

Brother Rochus, one of the younger workers of the Catholic Mission, met his death by drowning at the Kalapapa settlement on Monday last and was buried yesterday afternoon.

Brother Rochus had only been at the leper settlement three weeks when he met his death. He was 24 years of age and was by birth a German. He came to the mission from France two years ago and acted as cook at the Port street mission until sent a few days since to Molokai. There he was employed in a similar capacity. On Monday afternoon he went down to the shore to bathe. The coast is very rocky and the shore full of pot holes in one of which Father Tomill, successor to Father Damien used to take his bath. The hole was named after him as Father Tomill's bath tub.

It is thought that Brother Rochus, who was not yet well acquainted with the locality, mistook the hole and bathed in one similar in appearance but dangerous in character. At five thirty when the brothers went to the dining room they found nothing awaiting them and discovered that Brother Rochus had announced his intention of taking a bath earlier in the afternoon. Suspecting what had happened, a hasty trip was made to the shore where the body of the young cleric was seen at the bottom of a twelve foot pool. Natives were summoned and the body brought to the surface. The government physician was brought and pronounced the body to be that of a man who had died by drowning, probably an hour and a half before. No one had seen the accident and only surmise explained how it had occurred. The sea is very rough and he might have been knocked into unconsciousness or may have found the pool deeper than he imagined.

By a curious coincidence the particular friend of Brother Rochus, a young man known as Brother Victor who came to the mission three years ago, also died on Molokai within three months of his having been sent there, succumbing to typhoid.

RIOTOUS CONDUCT.

Deputy High Sheriff Chillingworth, who went over to Hauula yesterday to investigate election day disorder, found that there had been a great deal of riotous conduct indulged in particularly by some who were posing as Home Rule champions. Some of those creating the disorder had been arrested and charged in the district court with assault and battery, but the district magistrate, seeming to think that election day was over, discharged the defendants with a reprimand. It is probable that some of the worst offenders will be arrested again on other charges and be given another trial.

SUIT AGAINST PAIN.

The case of Mrs. Alice Hutchinson against the Hawaiian Tramways Company had a further hearing before Judge Robinson this morning, and was nearly concluded. The defense attempted to disprove the evidence of Dr. Moore as to the injuries received by Mrs. Hutchinson, and demanded that another physician be secured to examine the injuries and testify. The question of who should be selected occasioned no little argument, and the plaintiff insisted upon her own choice of doctors.

CHINESE BANKRUPT.

Wong Hing, a Chinese doing business in Honolulu, filed a petition in bankruptcy yesterday. His statement shows that he owes \$2,331 of which \$1889 are unsecured and has assets of \$622.20.
