PAIA, Maui, December 20.—Small farmers on Maui have been having it rather rubbed into them this year. First the corn crop failed then a blight did up the potatoes and now a worm has gotten into the beans and about the entire crop is a failure.

The trouble of the past year comes from a superabundance of rain. Last week at Naniuku 42 inches of rain fell in six days.

Celebrations at Maunaloa Seminary and Makawao School.

PAIA, Maui, December 20.—Last evening a most enjoyable Christmas entertainment was given at the Maunaloa Seminary for the benefit of the girls. The entertainment was in the nature of a concert, and an admission fee of 25 cents was charged to outsiders, the money raised to be used for the benefit of the school.

The evening ended by the appearance of Santa Claus, who emerged from the fire place, and after some fun making proceeded to distribute gifts to the girls from a well decked Christmas tree. Old Saint Nick derived his best sport out of the evening by throwing bags of candy at familiar faces in the audience. The entertainment was under the special auspices of Miss Asbery and much credit is due her for the same. The Seminary closed yesterday for the holiday vacation.

The teachers of the Makawao School entertained their pupils with a Christmas tree and the appearance of Santa Claus yesterday to close the term, and the affair was a great success.

NEW SCHOOL AT HAIKU.

PAIA, Maui, December 20.—A new two room school house will in all probability be built at Haiku within the next three months. The present school house is pretty much of a wreck, and hardly more than habitable.

VISITORS FROM THE COAST.

BARRETT DECLINES.

WASHINGTON, December 12.—Secretary Hay has received a cablegram from John Barrett, at Calcutta, India, saying he regards it his duty to continue his connection with the St. Louis Exposition, and declining the United States Ministry to Japan. It is now understood that Lloyd Griscom Jr., Minister to Persia, will be the successor to the late Minister Buck.

THE CABLE STARTS.

SAN FRANCISCO, December 12.—The steamer Silverton, with the Honolulu cable on board, left the harbor today. It was planned to begin the work immediately one mile south of the CHH House.

THE BRUSSELS CONVENTION.

LONDON, December 11.—Questioned recently as to whether the law officers of the crown had ever given the opinion that the imposition of a countervailing duty to neutralize foreign sugar bounties would contravene the favored nation clause in existing commercial treaties, Premier Balfour replied that he had no record of such an opinion. Today, however, he volunteered the statement that an identical opinion had been given in 1880, but he declined to commit himself with regard to the effect of this opinion in the present circumstances. The Premier's statement, however, is regarded as justifying Russia's threat to treat the imposition of a countervailing duty as a breach of treaty. As practically the entire British export trade with foreign countries is carried on under the protection of the favored nation clause, the government faces the alternative of either dropping the Brussels sugar convention or risking the loss of the favored nation advantages. One effect of Great Britain's adherence to the sugar convention would be to entitle the United States and Russia to place higher import tariffs on British goods. It is expected that rather than risk such a serious dislocation of foreign trade, the government will forego the imposition of countervailing duties on sugar.
