CELEBRATION IN HONOR OF THE OCCASION—MANY PRIVATE NEW YEAR PARTIES.

The usual din of whistles and bursting bombs greeted the New Year at midnight while every household in some way showed his or her appreciation of the fact that the annual quest had arrived with many prospects for good fortune in his train. Town town in the evening there was but little excitement but private parties were many. One feature of the general celebration was the large display of American flags by Chinese and Japanese firms, all of them decorating liberally in honor of the New Year.

Mr. and Mrs. Fred Church were at the head of a merry party of over thirty. Dr. and Mrs. Humphris entertained as did Mr. and Mrs. Harry Lewis and Mr. and Mrs. Phillips. A small party of newspapermen formed a sextette in honor of E. D. Moore of the Associated Press, H. W. Lake being the host.

TRAMWAYS AND RAPID TRANSIT

As a result of the almost completed negotiations between the Rapid Transit Company and the Hawaiian Tramways Company representatives, looking to a settlement of the differences of the two companies, as reported in yesterday's Star, L. T. Peck and Col. Davidson, President of the English company, will probably leave for the coast on the Korea, to conclude the deal in San Francisco. It is regarded as exceedingly probable that the terms agreed upon here will be ratified and that the local company will acquire the property of the London corporation.

A STUDY OF TARO.

The second bulletin of the local United States Agricultural Experiment Station has been issued. It deals with taro root and suggests cures for the rotting of the root, being the result of investigations made by Jared Smith and T. E. Sedgwick. The conclusions reached give the following as necessary conditions to securing good crops of taro: 1. A supply of good hules, free from disease. 2. A patch so laid out as to secure the most economical use of the irrigation water. 3. The application of proper fertilizers at the right time. 4. A constantly running stream of water circulating over the fields, or when this is not possible, a frequent change of water. 5. An occasional change in the variety of the taro planted. 6. An entire change of hules from one patch to another, or a rotation of crops, using taro land for rice or bananas, at least two years in every five.

AUSTIN DECLARED BANKRUPT.

Creditors of the Former Auditor File a Petition. A petition was filed in the United States court yesterday afternoon to declare H. C. Austin, the former auditor, a bankrupt. The petitioners are Lewers & Cooke, E. O. Hall & Son and the Washington Mercantile company, who allege in their petition as follows: "That your petitioners are creditors of said Herbert C. Austin, having claims amounting in the aggregate in excess of securities held by them, to the sum of \$3,517.09.

"That the nature and amount of your petitioners' claims are as follows: "Lewers & Cooke, Ltd., note dated October 31st 1899 three months from date, \$2,650.72. "Interest on same at 8 per cent from date \$79.80. "E. O. Hall & Son, Ltd., goods, wares and merchandise sold and delivered, \$28.18. "Washington Mercantile Co., Ltd., goods, wares and merchandise sold and delivered, \$18.39.

"And your petitioners further represent that the said Herbert C. Austin is insolvent and that within four months next preceding the date of this petition the said Herbert C. Austin committed an Act of Bankruptcy in that he did, to wit: "On the 20th day of December 1902 suffer while insolvent a creditor, to wit, one H. G. Middleitch to obtain a preference through legal proceedings and did not within five days before a sale or final disposition of the property affected by such preference, vacate and discharge such preference.

"Whereupon, your petitioners pray that service of this petition with a subpoena be made upon the said Herbert C. Austin as provided in the Acts of Congress relating to Bankruptcy and that he may be adjudged by the Court to be a bankrupt within the purview of such acts." Judge Estee set the hearing of the case for January 12.

BREADFRUIT POI.

Natives on Maui are substituting breadfruit for taro on account of the scarcity of the latter plant, due to disease. The substitute is said to ferment easily and become a powerful intoxicant. Dr. McGettigan of Hana recommends practical cooking schools for the purpose of teaching native children how to vary their diet and supply more wholesome food. A number of unsanitary shacks are reported from Waialua on this island by Dr. Wood. Rice planters in that district are said to be conforming to Board of Health regulations. Several cases of typhoid fever are reported from various island points.
