objection also, and the witness went ahead and tried to read the tickets.

"The prosecution can offer its evidence as it wishes," remarked the court. "If it wishes it can introduce the tickets first or later."

"Oh, I wouldn't care to be responsible for the prosecution's case," replied Creighton, and a moment later he added that the Deputy High Sheriff was becoming angry.

"Oh! I wouldn't get mad at such a little thing as you," replied Chillingworth.

It was just about this time that the prosecution discovered that a mistake had been made in drawing up the complaint. Instead of the lottery tickets offered in evidence being of the "Little Louisiana Lottery," they were of the Beneficia Publica, the Mexican lottery.

This necessitated a change in the complaint, so Chillingworth at once entered a nolle prosequi in the case and Silva was discharged. A new complaint changing the name of the lottery to the Beneficia Publica was then drawn and Silva was taken into custody and arraigned on the fresh charge.

The trial of Silva was not taken up however on the new complaint, but the case against J. Rothenberg, the barber of the S. S. Alameda, was called. Rothenberg was charged with assisting in maintaining and conducting a lottery. W. C. Vida and Deputy High Sheriff Chillingworth testified for the prosecution. Rothenberg took the stand in the afternoon in his own behalf.

WAIMANA WANTS HOMESTEADS

PETITION TO GOVERNOR FROM 86 PERSONS WHO DESIRE TO SETTLE ON GOVERNMENT LANDS.

Governor Dole has received a petition from Waimana, Hawaii, signed by 86 persons who want to take up homesteads there. The petition will receive immediate attention, as the lands in question are lands which the government already intended to offer for homestead seekers. The petition is interesting inasmuch as it shows that there is a demand for these lands, which the government is about to survey and open.

The petitioners to the Governor appear to have been inculcated with a good deal of "Americanism," judging by their petition, which is as follows: "His Excellency, Sanford B. Dole, Governor, Territory of Hawaii.

"Sir: We the undersigned, citizens of the United States of America, and also citizens of the Territory of Hawaii residing in Waimana, District of South Kohala Island of Hawaii, said Territory of Hawaii, respectfully represent:

"That in accordance with the spirit and intent of Land Act of 1895 for the acquisition of homesteads and also the desirability of perpetuating the advancement of the Homestead system heretofore incorporated by the passage of the said Land Act in 1895 and also for the purpose of qualifying ourselves to become good American citizens who till the farms they own and in order that we, as such American citizens enjoying the rights of American citizenship laid down by that great good man of the United States of America George Washington, or our children hereafter may be able to call them their possessions and also be imbued with the idea of advancement and to see Waimana in years to come a real 'Paradise,' hereby apply that the now available government lands lying and being in said Waimana, said district of South Kohala, Island of Hawaii, be surveyed and laid out into homesteads under and by the provisions of the Right of Purchase Lease of the said Land Act of 1895."

The 86 signatures are of native Hawaiian and naturalized Americans of various nativity. The petition was sent to the governor with the following letter:

"The application and petition of the citizens and residents of Waimana is herewith enclosed, trusting you as our Chief Executive, you will carefully weight well the importance of the said application and petition, especially as coming from a people who as you have lately come in contact with them, are not of the kind that will lazeably pass of valuable lives in roaming about at large and thereby become worthless citizens, but are a hard working people and are willing to make the best of their lives by tilling the farms. If it pleases your excellency to grant this request, as one of them, let me inform you that judging the enthusiasm shown by them at a mass meeting lately held by us for the purpose of signing the said petition and application I am of the opinion that they were really actuated by motives of advancement and to try and better the world by use of what little strength left in them for the purpose of qualifying themselves to become good American citizens, reaping thereby honest earnings.

WILL RESIST COLLECTOR.

High Sheriff Brown proposes to resist the imposition of the \$200 fine which Collector Stackable has imposed against the gasoline launch Fun for an alleged offense against the navigation laws while the vessel was being used by the police to round up Japanese fishermen in and about the harbor the other night.

The High Sheriff takes the view that the fine was entirely unjust and unwarranted, and it is proposed to take the matter to the Treasury officials at Washington.

CLEAN SWEEP OF DEPARTMENT

ATTORNEY GENERAL ANDREW'S AND REPUBLICAN PARTY LEADERS IN CONFERENCE.

A meeting of the Republican Executive committee and Attorney General Lorrin Andrews will be held at two o'clock this afternoon at which candidates for the positions in the attorney general's department will be discussed.

In addition to a deputy attorney general, there is an assistant deputy to be appointed as E. A. Douthitt, now in Hilo attending to the term there is said to be about to resign. There are also several clerical positions in the attorney general's office.

A number of local attorneys have been quietly working for both the lawyer positions and it is understood that Lorrin Andrews has practically made his choice, though he is willing to consult with the party leaders before acting. There is a disposition on both sides to put in office men who have done active work for the Republican party, and in this connection some names from the other islands have been suggested. Local men talked of are Biglow, Peters, Atkinson, Rawlins, and others. One report had it that Cathercart would be asked to accept a new appointment, but this is denied. Andrews has made several visits to the Queen's hospital to consult with Atkinson. On Hawaii Judge Smith and H. L. Holstein, both active party men, have been mentioned.

PAWNBROKERS MAY OPEN UP

A pawnbrokers' law is among the features of the new county government act. The pawnbroker has never succeeded in getting a foothold in Honolulu, though there are money lenders who loan on collateral security and who will come legally within the definition of a pawnbroker under the new act. A couple of years ago several stores were opened as pawnshops on upper Fort street, but they did not succeed under the right Hawaiian law and with the small business that developed.

The new law on the subject contains the following regulations:

"Every person who shall advance for interest of or in expectation of profit, gain or reward any sum of money upon security of any goods or chattels whatsoever, taken by such person by way of pawn or pledge, shall be deemed and taken to be a pawnbroker within the meaning of this Act; provided, that nothing herein shall be held or construed to apply to loans or advances made on any goods or chattels, bonds, bills, or other security taken by merchants, bankers, commission agents or auctioneers in the ordinary and bona fide course of mercantile or banking transactions.

"The tax collector is hereby authorized to grant licenses for the respective periods of one year to carry on the business of pawnbroking, upon payment of the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars.

"Every such license shall be issued upon these express conditions set forth in such license: That the person receiving such license shall not charge or receive interest at the rate of more than four per centum per month for any loan under twenty dollars, nor more than two per centum per month for any sum above twenty dollars, and under one hundred dollars, nor more than one per centum for any sum over one hundred dollars, nor exact any other gain, profit or reward by charging commissions, discount, storage or other charge, or by compounding or by any other device increasing such interest.

"That he shall not sell any article pledged to him and unredeemed within six months after the last day fixed by contract for the redemption, nor make any sale without publishing at least twice in a newspaper published in English and Hawaii, at least ten days before such sale a notice containing a list of the articles to be sold, and specifying the time and place of sale.

"That he will disclose to the pledgor or his agent the name of the purchaser and the price received by him for any article so pledged and sold.

"That he will keep a register in the English or Hawaiian language and enter in such register the date, duration, amount, rate of interest on any loan made by him, an accurate description of the property pledged, the name and residence of the pledgor, and will deliver to the pledgor a copy of such entries and will also enter in such register an account in writing of all sales made by him.

"That he will produce for inspection his register and exhibit all articles received by him in pledge and his account of sales to any officer authorized under a search warrant to search for property or holding an order of a Magistrate directing such officer to inspect such register or such articles pledged or such account of sales.

"That he will notify the Sheriff of the county or his deputy of any offer made by any person to pledge any articles which said licensee has reasonable cause to suspect of having been stolen."

"BOOM PAUL" ADMITS DEFEAT

A "voluntary non-suit" this morning ended the case of A. Kunst, otherwise known locally as "Oom Paul," against Charles Kamman. The suit was an ejectment suit, involving some lands in Waialeale, Koolau-poko. L. M. Strauss appeared as counsel for Oom Paul, with Humphreys, Thompson & Watson and Thomas Fitch, and Strauss asked for a continuance. He said that there was a witness at Waialeale whom he had not been able to get, but Judge De Bolt refused to allow the case to go over again. Strauss then proposed to go ahead with as much of the case as possible, but F. E. Thompson told the court that the plaintiff would accept a voluntary non-suit. The order was made and the case stricken from the calendar.

Oom Paul is an aged German who has been in the courts a good deal on account of numerous charges against him of selling liquor without a license, having been found guilty a number of times in the lower courts, only to get off on appeal.

Appeals have been filed from the District Court in the case of M. J. Martin vs. G. H. Moore, two cases of C. Ming Hym vs. Wong Kwai et al, and R. Pukui vs. J. F. Kaahu.

A motion to have the case set for trial has been filed in the case of C. A. Brown vs. A. W. Carter et al, the John H. Estate case. A similar motion has been made in the case of Koolau Kakaikahaole, administrator of the estate of John Kakaikahaole, vs. S. C. Allen, which was remanded from the Supreme Court.

With him went United States Attorney R. W. Breckons, Deputy Clerk Hatch, Deputy Marshal Handy and J. D. Avery who will report the proceedings. Court will be called tomorrow and continue in session until the latter part of next week returning to Honolulu on the Kinau a week from Saturday. There are a number of liquor cases to be heard and several bankruptcy cases are to be brought before the court.

A Thomas a young Portuguese who is charged with seduction at Hilo was taken back on the Kinau by Deputy Sheriff McDuffie for examination.

The Kinau got away a few minutes after the noon hour. She did not have a very large passenger list.

Carl P. Lenbers and Captain Whitney the Federal Inspectors of Boilers and Insurers were passengers for Hilo. They will return on the Kinau Friday as far as Kahului and there inspect the tug Leslie Baldwin and return to Honolulu Sunday on the Claudine.

The tug Fearless had her flag at half mast today on account of the death of George Neill her second engineer. He had been ill for about a week. His funeral will be held at 4 o'clock this afternoon.

NEW MANAGER VOLCANO HOUSE

F. WALDRON BE SUCCEEDED BY F. CLAIR BIRGOOD—EFFORTS TO BE MADE FOR TOURISTS.

There will be a change in the management of the Volcano House on March 1. Fred Waldron, who has been manager for the last four years, has tendered his resignation. He will be succeeded by St. Clair Birgood who came here some time ago as the chief steward of the Moana Hotel. Mr. Birgood's mother has also been engaged to assist her son in the management of the Volcano House.

It is the intention of the Volcano House people to make special efforts this season to cater to the people of the Islands. The idea to be followed will be to make the rates so reasonable that persons desiring a change during the summer can stop at the Volcano House sixty days or so fully as cheaply as they could make a trip to the Coast.
