## OPERA BY FIELD TO BE STAGED

A COMIC OPERA LEFT BY THE CHICAGO POET ABOUT TO BE PRODUCED.

COLORADO SPRINGS, (Col.), March 22.—The arrival in this city of Eugene Field Jr., and Fred Comstock Field, sons of the poet, has caused the announcement to be made that a comic opera from the pen of Eugene Field will be given a production in New York next fall. The production of "The Buccaneers; or the Begum of Plura," in three acts, has been arranged for and the music is being written by a well-known composer of light operas.

The manuscript which had been forgotten, lay buried among a file of old papers pertaining to Field's connection with the Denver Tribune until it was accidentally stumbled upon by the poet's widow recently.

It is stated that the widow was offered \$3000 for the manuscript which comprises sixty-five pages of closely written matter, but refused it and for some time the manuscript has been in the hands of the composer.

### THE MOULIN ROUGE.

PARIS, March 14.—After three months' suspended animation the Moulin Rouge reopened its doors on Thursday night, but except for the name there was nothing to remind one of the old Moulin. It has become a modern music hall, with a variety program, after the manner of the London music halls. It is Parisian instead of merely Montmartre. One novel feature introduced which points the way to new music hall development is that a portion of the balcony has been reserved for dinners, and, in conformity with the time-saving propensities of the day, one may dine and witness the performance at the same time. Out in the garden is the debris of the old establishment. The elephant stands forlorn upon a platform, waiting until the garden again becomes a joyous annex to the theater. Then, where the concert used to be, there will be a modified revival of the quadrille between the acts, but the new Moulin Rouge will not follow the traditions of the old one, which has gone the way of nearly all the rest of Bohemia which has the charm of unconventionality and light-hearted gaiety.

### MRS. BIRD'S MINIATURES.

The San Francisco Bulletin of March 23 says:

Artists and those interested in the spring exhibition at Mark Hopkins Institute have been much amused at the action of Mrs. May Mott-Smith Bird in taking her miniature from the exhibition. It seems that she sent several to the committee, who judged them of inferior work and refused all. Disappointed at this, Mrs. Bird appealed personally to them to reconsider their vote, and one miniature was finally catalogued. Mrs. Bird, upon thinking the matter over, became very angry, went to the art gallery and, being a student there, easily secured the keys to the case from the attendant. Without any remarks she took away her exhibit, and has since then been the subject of more than one conversation. The truth of the matter is that an exceptionally high standard of work was demanded of all artists by the jury this year, whereas in former years an inferior miniature or painting was occasionally admitted.

### DARKNESS AT BARBADOES.

BRIDGETOWN (Island of Barbadoes), Sunday, March 22.—Sudden darkness spread over this island today from 9 until 11:15 a. m. Dust fell and the lamps were lighted in the churches and other buildings.

## LOUISE GETS A NEW TITLE

NEW YORK, March 23.—A cable to the Herald from Vienna says: It is learned from an authoritative source that the former Crown Princess Louise of Tuscany will in future be known officially by the title, Princess Louise of Tuscany, with honors due her royal highness. Her father, as Grand Duke of Tuscany, has the prerogative of granting titles, and has conferred this one upon his daughter with the consent of the Emperor. The King of Saxony's manifesto caused an unpleasant sensation at the grand ducal court, and a reply, formally protesting against some expressions, has been drawn up and is now on the way to Dresden.

The Allegemaine Zeitung announces that Princess Louise is about to publish a reply to the manifesto.

### TO POLARIZE X RAY.

Important Discovery Made in Regard to Roentgen Ray.

NEW YORK, March 22.—A cable to the Sun from London says: Lord Rayleigh, professor of natural philosophy at the Royal Institution, has announced that M. Blondelot, the French experimenter, recently adduced evidence going far to prove that the Roentgen rays are susceptible of polarization, if they have not been polarized already, and can therefore be traced in the spectrum.

If this is true and the rays are transversal, as Blondelot thinks, it follows they are a species of ordinary light, but of extremely short wave lengths, perhaps a hundred times shorter than the wave of light that one can see.

Lord Rayleigh said he saw no reason to question the discovery, which is of first rate importance in helping to determine the nature of Roentgen rays, which has been in doubt ever since they were discovered.

In another part of the lecture, in which the above announcement was made, Lord Rayleigh dealt with coast lights. He questioned the use of extreme candle power employed by some

lighthouses. It was probable, he declared, that for practicable purposes 100,000 candle power would be as effective as 50,000,000. It would be more valuable, he said, to repeat moderate flashlights more frequently than to employ extreme high power lights.

### BUYING MEXICAN FACTORIES.

CITY OF MEXICO, March 22.—It is reported that a syndicate of Chicagoans who have about completed a deal for the purchase of several large cigarette companies here will pay over the money on the completion. They are operating with British capital.

### NO CARTRIDGES FOR SERBIA.

NEW YORK, March 23.—A cable to the Sun from St. Petersburg says: It is semi-officially announced in regard to the Russian gift of 10,000,000 cartridges to Serbia that they will not be delivered before the end of May under any circumstances and not then if the situation in the Balkans is disturbed.

### SEALER TO GO HOME.

The British sealing schooner Geneva will sail today for Victoria.

### CABLE STEAMER COMING.

VICTORIA, B. C., March 23.—The British cable steamer Iris, built especially as a tender and repair ship for the Pacific cable is on the way to Esquimaux, being expected here in June via Honolulu and Suva. At the latter point she will load forty miles of cable, and this will be laid from Bamfield Creek up the Alberni canal, so as to overcome a bad section of land line which had to be repaired frequently this winter. The Iris is a brand new steamer similarly equipped as the Coloma, but much smaller. She will be kept permanently on repair work after laying the section in Alberni canal. Her headquarters will still remain at Bamfield Creek, the extension up the canal being for the Canadian Pacific Telegraph Company, and not for the cable company.

### WILL BE A FUNNY SHOW.

NEW YORK, March 22.—A cable to the Herald from Paris says: Mark Twain's "Stolen White Elephant" will soon be seen on the Paris stage. Two French humorists of the new school, Max and Alex Fischer, have written a one act version of "Vol de l'Elephant Blanc"—which will be produced at the Odeon shortly. M. Antonio, the director, makes a practice every year of producing the foreign work which he regards as the most interesting. Of the European productions this year he has selected Maxim Gorky's drama, "The Nethermost Depths," which he will produce before the end of the season.
