TAKE GOVERNMENT COAL.

The Captain Rodman of the Naval Station has accommodated the British war ships with considerable coal. The cruiser Amphion is taking 600 tons, of which 330 were secured from the Naval Station. The Naval station gave 165 tons of coal for the two torpedo destroyers.

LEAVES INTER-ISLAND.

A. W. Keach the superintending engineer of the Inter-Island Steam Navigation Company, has tendered his resignation and will leave the company today. Mr. Keach has been with the Inter-Island for about 16 years. He has occupied a very important position with the company. His successor has not yet been appointed.

AFRICA WANTS MANY CHINESE

COMMISSIONERS FROM THE TRANSVAAL EN ROUTE TO ORIENT TO GET LABOR.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 23.—The feasibility of importing 100,000 Chinese laborers to work in the gold mines of the Transvaal is a question which H. Ross Skinner and H. H. Noyes, at present guests at the Palace Hotel, are now on their way to the Orient to investigate.

"Since the close of the Boer war," said Mr. Noyes, "mining in South Africa has gone ahead with tremendous strides, but the future development of the industry is seriously hampered by the want of cheap labor. There is not sufficient Kaffir labor to operate the mines, and the Chamber of Mines of South Africa has accordingly undertaken to solve the labor question by looking into the feasibility of importing Chinese labor. The idea of employing white labor is out of the question. White men will not work along side of Kaffirs. We think, however, that under wise Governmental regulations we will be able to get sufficient Chinese labor to meet the conditions. Mr. Skinner and myself are now on our way to the Orient to report to the Chamber of Mines on the capabilities of the Chinese as a mine worker."

"I have a high opinion of the Chinese as mine laborers. I was stationed in the Orient for some years and had an opportunity to observe what they are capable of in that particular line of industry. In the tin mines of the Malay peninsula, which produce four-fifths of the world's supply of tin, they are employed with entire success. The question involved in the scheme to import coolie labor into the Transvaal are rather of a political nature. There are political objections to the importation of Chinese labor, such, possibly, as exist in this country. We hope, however, to secure the passage of laws in advance of the importation of any laborers, so that the whole business may be carried on under Government supervision. The Chinese will be indentured in China and taken to South Africa for a fixed term of years, and upon the expiration of their fixed term of service will be returned to their homes. This arrangement might overcome any existing political objections which have arisen thus far. At the present time I think that 100,000 Chinese laborers could be profitably employed in the South African mines, and as the country gets better settled and mining development continues there will be a much larger field for the employment of cheap labor."

"A POLITICAL OBJECT LESSON."

Under the above heading, the Pacific Commercial Advertiser this morning publishes the following editorially:

"This is a good time for the Republicans of Hawaii to make up their minds to nominate no more legislative tickets and no county tickets which represent a Saturday afternoon spoils. Every prominent Home Ruler who wanted a job got it. Even the clerkship of the House went to a man who voted against the Republican legislative ticket. Such creatures as Prendergast, such wild-eyed Wilcoxes as Markham, Testa, Nakuna, the latter a member of the Home Rule Executive committee—Kalaikaua, Jr., Makinal, ad nauseam; Republican secret allies of the Home Rule party and the riffraff of the political beach-combers, these are the men who went from the legislative session with full pockets. There were not enough genuine Republicans in clerkships to fill a bus. It was as if a sign had been put up: 'No Republicans need apply. More Home Rulers wanted.'"

"If the honest men of the Republican party let this sort of thing go on in future it will be their own fault, and they will deserve to be robbed. Their first duty will be to take part in the county primaries and stop all schemes of other parties. The pretended Republicans should be driven back into the Home Rule ranks where they belong; not elected to office so that they can rob the taxpayers under the guise of legality and build up the interests of the political opposition."
