The steamer Nihau will be put on the leeward run of the W. G. Hall to Kauai ports. The Mauna Loa will lay up for repairs.

MANAGERS IN TROUBLE.

Lum Lau, Ah Chang and Ah Kong were before Judge Wilcox yesterday to answer to charges of conducting a pay show on Saturday. It appears that the Chinese had advertised to give a free show at the Chinese theater Sunday. The show was free to members only of a certain society. The crowd kicked at paying admission and a small sized riot occurred. The three men were taken into custody but their cases were nolle prossed.

OAHU POLICE GET RAISE

APPROPRIATION INCREASED IN ORDER TO PROVIDE MORE TURNKEYS.

At the afternoon session of the Senate yesterday, the report of the conference committee was amended so as to suit the desires of the House. The unpaid bills measure came up on third reading and passed, the total appropriation being \$78,751.18.

The emergency appropriation measure was passed second reading with several changes. An item of \$10,000 to reimburse J. G. Pratt and the Chamber of Commerce for service and expenses in lobbying at Washington in favor of the Fire Claims, was inserted. An item of \$2,370 for the reimbursement of road boards was also inserted. This item is designed to cover the alleged Charles Wilcox shortage. The total appropriation is \$207,457.55. The current appropriation bill and loan bills went over.

On the six months salary bill, the pay of Oahu police was raised to \$50,160 to allow for extra turnkeys. A motion was made by Senator Kaohi to insert an item of \$900 for the salary of the chief engineer of the pumping station. The matter was referred to Senator Isenberg.

The salary of kerosene oil and gunpowder keeper was increased from \$750 to \$900. The salary of the watchman at the pilot's office was increased from \$300 to \$450. The salary of bookkeeper in the land office was made \$900 and the salary of clerk and messenger of the Agricultural Department was cut from \$950 to \$300.

Senator McCandless wanted the salary of the president of the Board of Health cut out, but he received no second. In the matter of reducing the appropriation for government physicians from \$19,140 to \$5,000 and itemizing the various salaries, a special committee consisting of Senators McCandless, Dickey and Kaiue was appointed to report.

The salary of the president and executive officer of the Board of Health was, on motion of McCandless, cut from \$1,800 to \$1,500. The matter of the salaries of auditor and deputy auditor was referred to a special committee consisting of Senators Achi and Dickey. On motion of Senator Dickey, the bill was amended so as to provide for the appropriations continuing pro rata after January 1, 1904, should the County Bill not go into effect.

The public expenditures committee was instructed to prepare the two current appropriation bills.

A VERY SHORT FIGHT.

The fight between George Douglas of the Amphitrite and Joe Millet, at the Chinese theatre last night, was a very brief one. The Britisher was no match for his opponent and was counted out in the first round, but not until he had been made the victim of a foul which entitled him to the decision.
