ATTORNEYS MUST BE READY

JUDGE DE BOLT POSTS A PROPOSED ORDER REGARDING CASES CALLED.

Judge De Bolt this morning posted the following notice to attorneys, with a view to having cases tried more promptly as they are reached on the calendar: "For the promotion of justice and to facilitate the disposition of the large number of cases on the civil jury calendar, Judge De Bolt is considering the advisability of making the following order on next Monday, May 11, at 9 o'clock a. m. "Cases in which neither party answers ready will be peremptorily continued for the term. Cases in which either party answers ready will be for trial in their order unless a continuance is granted for good cause shown. Applications for continuance must be made in writing and copies of the moving papers must be served on the other party two days before the hearing. When a case comes up in its order and neither party is ready, the case will go to the foot of the calendar. When a case comes up in its order and but one party appears the trial shall nevertheless proceed if the party appearing demands it."

HARBOR BECOMING DESERTED AGAIN

THREE SAILING VESSELS WILL DEPART FOR SAN FRANCISCO THIS WEEK.

The list of vessels on the way to Honolulu is rapidly increasing. The same deserted appearance that marked the harbor about a month ago will be repeated if some of the numerous boats now under way do not put in an appearance soon.

There are now only six sailing vessels in port. The barkentine Jane L. Stanford, the schooner Blakeley and the ship Benjamin F. Packard are loading sugar for San Francisco at the Railway and Hackfeld wharves. The Stanford will be about ready to sail tomorrow. The Packard is expected to get out this week for the same place, as will the schooner in a few days.

The Swedish ship Clan Macfarlane is putting out coal at the Coal wharf while the ship Servia is discharging coal at the Railway wharf. The British ship Glenclair is still in the stream.

The S. S. Nevada got out this morning for San Francisco with 5,400 tons of sugar and 150 tons of general cargo aboard. She sailed shortly after 10 o'clock. From San Francisco the bark Andrew Welch is out 21 days, the bark Edward May is out 26 days, the bark Kalulani is out 18 days, the barkentine W. H. Dimond, out 18 days and the George Curtis, 10 days all for Honolulu. The bark St. Katherine is out 18 days for Hilo.

The bark Nuuanu is out 116 days from New York. She should be along at any time now. With the strong trades that have been prevailing for the last week, some of the vessels from San Francisco ought to be along at any time. A big lot of sugar is piling up at the railway wharf. A number of vessels from Newcastle are out, but none of them are out much more than the time for an average passage.

MAY ORGANIZE CLUB.

Jess Woods May Start Athletic Club Here.

It is not unlikely that an athletic club may be started in Honolulu. Jess Woods of California who has the credit of organizing one of the most successful clubs of the kind on the Pacific Coast, recently arrived to take the management of the sporting goods department of Whitman and company, and he may be induced to undertake the establishment of a similar athletic club in Honolulu.

Mr. Woods started the Garden City Athletic club in San Jose in 1901 and built the club up to be probably the second strongest organization of the kind on the Coast. Most of the leading men of San Jose were members or in one way or another, patronized the institution.

Mr. Woods is a football coach and is a football and baseball player. He is a fine swimmer having come second to Clyde Hawthorne for the coast quarter mile championship in 1896.

Woods is a brother of R. A. Woods the well known boxing instructor. The latter was the welterweight champion of the coast a title which he gained by defeating Tom Tracy. Jess Woods is not a fighter however and the other Woods has retired from the ring.
