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Not For Love Of Sumner, But Of His Money

SOCIALISTS MAKE GAINS

RETURNS FROM ELECTIONS SHOW SOCIALIST PARTY MADE GAIN OF AT LEAST 45 PER CENT—RESULT HAS PRODUCED CONSTERNATION AMONG GOVERNMENT AND CONSERVATIVE ELEMENTS.

BERLIN, June 24.—The returns from the election have had the most disquieting effect upon the government party. Election returns show that the Socialist increase has been 45 per cent. This gives them a material increase in their representation in the Reichstag. The element showed remarkable and unexpected strength at the election.

ROOSEVELT GUNNING FOR POSTAL FRAUDS

PRESIDENT DEMANDS THAT GOVERNMENT AT ONCE INSTITUTE PROSECUTION OF POSTAL FRAUDS—NUMBER OF ARRESTS WILL PROBABLY SOON FOLLOW THIS POSITIVE DEMAND BY CHIEF EXECUTIVE.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 24.—After a careful investigation into postal frauds, President Roosevelt has demanded that prosecution against all of the parties to the wholesale alleged rascality be commenced by the United States without delay.

The President is very much in earnest in this matter. The rottenness in certain branches of the Postal department was a startling surprise to him. He had had no idea of the extent to which the frauds were alleged to have gone. A number of additional arrests will probably be made within a few hours. It is thought that some highly sensational developments will soon be made, as the result of this prosecution.

WHAT DE BOLT SAYS OF ELLIS

THE FIRST JUDGE OF THE FIRST CIRCUIT COURT REFUSES TO TIE UP SUMNER'S MONEY ANY FURTHER—SAYS ELLIS' PETITION FOR A GUARDIAN IS NOT BROUGHT IN GOOD FAITH.

John K. Sumner won another victory in Judge De Bolt's court this morning, the judge refusing to grant the restraining order asked for in the petition of W. S. Ellis to have the old man put under guardianship. The court remarked that the petition didn't appear to have been brought in good faith, and that the petitioner acted not because of love for Sumner but because of Sumner's money.

The restraining order was asked in order to tie up the \$48,025 which it is expected the Supreme Court will give a decision about this week. De Bolt was asked to order the clerk of the court to hold the cash in spite of a possible Supreme Court order awarding it to Sumner, until the question of Sumner's mental capacity was determined.

The case was argued this morning by Magoon, Cathcart and Davis, and Judge De Bolt gave a ruling at once, refusing the order. The judge said that he was forced to consider the nature of the proceedings that had been taken against the old man for ten years past and that in view of these proceedings he thought that Ellis' petition was not brought in good faith—not for love of Sumner but for his money.

On the question of Sumner's sanity the court stated that the record of testimony in the last trial had been brought in as showing incompetence, but that its showing affected the court the other way. "I am satisfied from the testimony in that hearing that this old man is not insane nor non compos," said the judge.

A PASTORATE OF FORTY YEARS

NEXT SUNDAY REV. H. H. PARKER WILL COMPLETE FORTY YEARS OF MINISTRATION TO KAWAIAHAO CHURCH—IS FOURTH PASTOR CHURCH HAS HAD—PLANS FOR CELEBRATING THE ANNIVERSARY.

Next Sunday will be the end of forty years of pastoral service by Rev. H. H. Parker at Kawaiiaho church. Such an anniversary, notable as it is infrequent, is not to be allowed to pass unnoticed by the church. Arrangements are being made to suitably celebrate the anniversary by special services at the church and by an expression of the sentiments of fealty, loyalty and cherished association of friendship and the pastoral relation by the members of the church.

By far the greater number of the members of the church have entered its fellowship under the ministration and during the pastorate of Rev. Henry Hodges Parker. Very few of those who on communion Sundays partake of this holy sacrament, can remember any other pastor of the church than Rev. Parker. So far as this generation is concerned, Rev. Parker has always been pastor of the church.

The services commemorative of the finishing of forty full years of an active pastorate with one church and that one of the oldest if not the oldest church in the islands, are being arranged to be such as shall be worthy of the event celebrated.

Rev. Henry Hodges Parker is the fourth pastor of this historic church. He comes of pioneer missionary stock. His father and mother were early sent hither by the American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions, and were members of that group of missionary families that went still further into the heart of unChristian lands, being assigned to the mission to the Marquesas Islands. It was there, at

THE ROCK ALL AWRY

IN THE HOUSE VIDA INTRODUCES A RESOLUTION OF WANT OF CONFIDENCE IN MARSTON CAMPBELL FOR USING FIFTH DISTRICT ROCK ON FOURTH DISTRICT ROADS—KUPIHEA AND THE GOVERNOR.

After a shot at the governor by Kipuhea, which missed fire, the House this morning entered into a fiery debate over a Vida resolution to declare want of confidence in Assistant Superintendent of Public Works Campbell. Kupuhea wanted to return a message from the executive by the following resolution:

"Resolved, That the message transmitted by the Governor on the 18th day of June, 1903, informing this House that its procedure with reference to the appropriations under the Loan act was contrary to the duties imposed upon the members by the Organic Act, be returned to him by the clerk with a copy of this resolution, on the ground that said

The County Act Valid

JUDGE GEAR KNOCKS OUT THE SECTIONS CREATING THE BOARD OF PUBLIC INSTITUTIONS, BUT HOLDS THAT THESE ARE SEPARABLE FROM THE REMAINDER OF THE ACT, AND ARE NOT FATAL TO IT.

Judge Gear this morning rendered a decision sustaining the contentions of Superintendent Cooper as to the Board of Public Institutions, declaring illegal all parts of the County act attempting to create such a Board, but holding that the whole act is not necessarily affected, and the rest of the law may stand. The decision was in the suit brought by Sanford B. Dole and others as members of the board in question, for a writ of mandamus against Henry E. Cooper, to compel him to turn over public institutions to the Board of Institutions, as provided by the act. The writ is refused and judgment is ordered for defendant, with costs. Discussing the County bill and the Organic Act, Judge Gear says:

"All the duties and powers of this board are of a public character, and it is a Territorial board, pure and simple. No juggling of words can take it out of the provision that 'the governor shall nominate and by and with the advice and consent of the senate' appoint the members of any other boards of a public character that may be created by law. It is certainly not a board of 'private character.' The words of the Organic Act are too plain for construction. They need no construction for their meaning is as plain as it would be possible to make them. So plain indeed that 'the wayfaring man, though a fool, could not err therein.'

"One of the members of this board is the Secretary of the Territory, a presidential appointee, over whose appointment or removal the governor has no control. The governor himself, appointed by the President of the United States and confirmed by its senate, is also a member.

"It is plain that as to these two officers there is no power of appointment in the governor of this Territory. Neither is it in the power of the governor to appoint any other of the members of this board, for they are made to constitute the board by virtue of their office. If the governor should appoint as attorney general, as he has already done, a gentleman learned in the law, and made the appointment because of his peculiar fitness for that office, he would by virtue of that office become a member of this board, although the governor might believe him to be unfitted for the duties of that board." The same remarks would apply to the Superintendent of Public Instruction and other officials, says Gear.
