**LEO XIII.**

The last of four great nineteenth century characters of Europe passed away when Leo's end came. Most people remember the days when Gladstone, Bismarck, Queen Victoria and the Pope were mentioned as a quartette of great ones of venerable years, none of whom would outlive the last century. The pontiff, oldest of them all, was little expected to live the longest. The Iron Chancellor was the first to answer death's summons, then the Grand Old Man of England passed away, and the venerable Queen was called, and now the reverend head of the Roman Catholic church, outlasting all the leaders of his days of prime, healthy, clear headed and full of mental vigor at the age of 93, has gone to join the others who with him were commanding figures of the nineteenth century's closing years.

The life of such a man as Leo is of value to the world far beyond the services he was able to do for the great religious and charitable organization of which he was the supreme ruler on earth. In the universal respect to his memory there is an elevating and liberating influence that began while yet he lived. Differences of creed, nationality and race are levelled in general homage to a recognized example of human greatness. To the disappearing class of bigots who regard the Roman church as a sort of Nazareth out of which no good thing can come—for example the extremists of the prejudice-bound A. P. A.—the splendid figure of Pope Leo is an answer powerful enough to impress the most unreasoning. The reach of such influence is greater in the cable-rounded world of today than ever before, for today all mankind mourns at once, and there is kinship in mutual feelings of respect and sorrow. A common sorrow makes the whole world kin and all humanity recognizes the loss when a man like Leo passes to the beyond.

The bell that mournfully tolled at our own Catholic cathedral yesterday, and which will toll every day until a successor is raised to the temporarily vacant throne of St. Peter, is a striking reminder of the power this man wielded, of the far and fast reach of his power and direction, for as this bell tolled so far from Rome, so toll thousands of others all over the five great continents and even on the small islands which dot the seas. Time calculations show that the expected sad news was received in Honolulu in almost incredibly short time after death won the long battle against the worn-out frame of the Pope. By the calendar Honolulu had the news hours before the event took place. The same speed was observed all over the globe and the impressive picture is presented of a whole world thrown into mourning and made to pause and listen to the mournful clanging of bells with the speed of an electric flash encircling the globe. That the mourning in outward form was immediately observed wherever civilization has gone was due to the laws and rituals of the Catholic church; that it was observed with genuine feeling as deep as the solemn forms of service represent, and was joined in by men whose minds are far from attuned to the creed and policies of Rome, is due to the character of the man who died yesterday in the Vatican.

It is therefore right and proper that the world, regardless of race or creed, color or caste, should pay tribute at the bier of Leo XIII. If the best possibilities for the human race lie in the lesson of universal brotherhood, in toleration and mutual respect and in love of virtuous, intellectual and vigorous manhood, no matter whether found in the church of Rome or in any other church, or among the ranks of the less fortunate who mourn to say they claim no church at all and none claims them, then every man who lives and dies as Leo did is more of a boon to the world at large than to his own church alone. Leo forced the enemies of his church to bow their heads in respect to the man it had produced and this is a far step in the lesson of toleration—in the full realization of the meaning of one of earth's most beautiful, comprehensive and needed sayings, "a man's a man for a' that."

Of Pope Leo's religious views it is not for the secular journal to speak. They were his and his life work grew from them, and individuals are free to follow them or not as individuals choose. At all events none can fail to say he was a man upon whose like the world goes not often look.

When Catholics send prayer to heaven for a Gladstone or a Newman, when Christians are even willing to raise their hats at the bier of an Ingersoll, and when atheists and Protestants alike stop to mourn the passing of a Pope, the world is indeed moving. A great Catholic leader, Leo XII was in a larger sense the pride and property of all mankind, a historic figure that will always command respect, from the Catholic as a great successful head of the wonderful power that centers at Rome and from others who do not hold the faith for which he strove as "a man for a' that."

**ALASKA'S TRADE.**

The commerce of Alaska during the fiscal year which ends with this month seems likely to aggregate over twenty millions of dollars, exclusive of gold. The Treasury Bureau of Statistics is now collecting and publishing monthly statements of the shipments of merchandise to and from Alaska. This information is now being collected under an Act recently passed by Congress at the recommendation of the Bureau of Statistics, giving it authority to collect statistics of the commerce between the United States and its noncontiguous territory. Under its operations the value of the merchandise passing from the United States into Alaska and from Alaska to the various ports of the United States is now for the first time presented.

The figures of shipments from the ports of the United States to Alaska during the ten months ending with April, 1903, aggregate \$6,831,070 of merchandise, and \$104,359 of gold and silver coin. During the month of April the total shipments of merchandise to Alaska amounted to \$2,581,784; and as the opening months of the season are those of heavy shipments to Alaska, it is quite apparent that the total shipments to Alaska during this first fiscal year in which their value is measured, will aggregate between ten and twelve million dollars. A similar statement of the shipments from Alaska to the United States which is also published, shows the total value for ten months to be \$10,101,060 of merchandise. In addition to this, the shipments of gold ore from Alaska, produced in United States territory, amount to \$4,360,496. The shipments of "foreign" gold ore from Alaska during the period, by which is meant that from the Klondike (Canadian) territory reaching the United States through Alaska aggregates for the same period, \$10,972,454.
