BOARD OF HEALTH HOLDS MEETING

ROUTINE BUSINESS DISPOSED OF AT THE MEETING YESTERDAY AFTERNOON.

The Board of Health held a regular meeting yesterday afternoon and discussed a number of routine matters. A petition was received from W. Kukoo, fish inspector of Waialua, for permission to start a fish market and it was granted.

The report of Dr. Cooper and Dr. Mays on Malulani Hospital was presented and adopted. The report declared that the rule proposed by the trustees to give free treatment to indigent native Hawaiians should be made applicable to the indigent of all nationalities, otherwise the government subsidy would not be payable. It was advised the fee be made \$3 a day for patients occupying rooms. The exclusion of delirium tremens patients recommended was cut out as being inhuman. It was advised that Dr. Armistead be placed upon the honorary staff of the hospital.

N. J. Young, of Los Angeles, wrote asking for permission to live at the Leper Settlement. He is a minister of the Church of the Nazarenes and said he wanted to serve the afflicted. He only asked transportation here. The request was denied, as all other similar petitions have been.

R. A. Duncan sent in an application for the vacant position of Food Commissioner. He held the degree of Bachelor of Science from the University of California. J. T. Crawley, superintendent of the Hawaiian Ferrying Co., certified that Mr. Duncan had been chemist in that company's laboratory since some time in 1902 and given full satisfaction there.

President Cooper mentioned that the Board had now applications from two good men. It was voted to refer the applications to the medical members of the Board, who are to report on them.

Dr. Mays asked for more time for the committee on A. L. Perry's proposed cemetery site at Kapiolani tract, Kailua. At the same time he had no hesitation in saying that he was opposed to the multiplication of cemeteries, especially when a body could be sent to Ford City cemetery for one dollar. Time was granted.

The Board discussed the matter of a charge for disinterment permits, referring it to the Atto-ey General for an opinion as to the Board's power.

CIRCUIT COURT NOTES.

Execution for \$1575.65, including all costs, in the suit of Hawaiian Hardware Co., Ltd., vs. Kamalo Sugar Co., Ltd., has been returned as fully satisfied by Deputy Sheriff Chillingworth, who collected the money and distributed it, the amount paid the plaintiff being \$1597.75.

Ching Lam answers the complaint of Kaunakani Woolsey, in a bill for accounting on a fire claim award of \$965. He denies that he agreed to pay complainant any part of the award. While she has erected no building on the premises since the fire, it is further alleged, he has expended \$1800 in a new building thereon, making the premises more valuable to the plaintiff as lessor than they were before the fire.

George A. Davis has brought an assumpsit suit for the January, 1904, term against Libornia de Nobrega, claiming one thousand dollars as attorney's fee in Libornia's divorce suit and costs of the present action. Sylvia de Nobrega, the divorced husband, gave a mortgage against the alimony ordered in the case, but there was no provision made for Davis' fee. Tom Been has a ven notice of mechanic and materialman's lien against Filumena Benevides for \$168.50 upon a house and lot in Kailua tract.

Allan W. T. Bottomley as trustee has begun suit against L. R. Medeiros and J. P. Rodrigues for \$700 alleged to be due the Washington Mercantile Co. on the purchase of the store at the Walkiki corner of King and Beckley streets in Kailua.

CRAZY KOKUA ARRESTED.

A crazy kokua at the leper settlement ran amuck with a batch of the other day and was taken into custody. He was sent down to Honolulu on the steamer Lehua yesterday.

NEW MEAT MARKET.

Dr. J. H. Raymond of Maui has organized a concern to open a market in Honolulu and handle the meat from the Kahikiniu ranch. His associates in this organization are H. E. Gires, formerly proprietor of the Central market, Mr. Taylor of the Dairyman's Association and Mr. Westbrook an employee of the Metropolitan company. It is said the new concern will pay him ten and a half cents a pound for his meat by the carcass.

BASEBALL MEETING.

An important meeting of the Baseball League will be held this afternoon in Eika's Hall. The meeting is for the discussion of a proposition from the California team to visit Honolulu during the winter for a series of games. President Isenberg has received a definite proposition from the California manager and he urges that all the members of the league, and all captains and managers attend this afternoon's meeting to discuss the proposition, and decide what shall be done.

DEAD.

SMITH—In Honolulu, September 16, 1903, Mrs. L. K. Smith. The funeral will take place from the undertaking parlors of H. H. Williams at 4 o'clock this afternoon. Deceased leaves two children. She was a well-known native Hawaiian who had a divorce from her husband.

TRIAL OF CHRIST.

Interesting and unusual as an evening service was the one recently held at the Bethany Presbyterian church of New York, when Walter M. Chandler of the New York bar delivered his lecture on "The trial of Jesus from a lawyer's standpoint." This lecture, while reverent and devout in its character is a strong presentation of the totally illegal nature of that trial. Mr. Chandler tells in brief and pointed fashion just what was the Jewish law about such trials and shows that almost every step taken at that time was a violation of that law. From the Roman standpoint the arraignment before Herod and Pilate could not be designated as trials at all.

GOVERNOR YATES.

Governor Yates of Illinois wants to run next year for another four-year term, but his administration has been neither strong nor popular, and the Roosevelt republicans are opposing his renewed candidacy. It is the story out there that the president himself has expressed a desire that some one else shall lead the Illinois republicans in the presidential year.
