KAKAAKO HAS A LIVELY START

CAMPAIGN OPENS IN WARM STYLE—HOME RULERS CAVASSING THE DISTRICT.

The campaign in the Kakaako district, where the largest of last night's meetings took place, has begun in lively style on both sides. The Home Rulers have a lot of workers out, among them being Charles Wilcox, who is personally visiting all the voters he can reach. The old story of advice to stay away from the Republican meetings is being given, as in the last campaign. The Home Rulers appear to have a lively fear of the effect of Republican speeches upon voters.

A disturbance which appeared to center round Representative Jonah Kumalae interrupted last night's meeting for a short time. It seemed that several men around Jonah had a notion to spoil the meeting by noisy demonstrations to drown the speeches. Captain Sam Johnson stopped the row, by a few vigorous remarks addressed to Kumalae. "It will be your meeting next Wednesday and if you want this kind of a campaign you'll get it," he said. "If the row continues I'll bring a band and a crowd big enough so that there won't be a speech heard on Wednesday night."

This stopped all raving and the meeting went on until a band close by began another interruption. It was squelched in the same way. The musicians were told that their music was fine but inopportune, and a few forcible remarks interrupted the flow of harmony.

The Home Rulers open in Kakaako on Wednesday evening and some interest will attach to a comparison of the different party meetings. The Republican meeting last night was one of the largest and most enthusiastic ever held there. Incidentally there was a keg of the beer that made Kakaako famous, and the voters didn't do anything to it.

WILCOX AND LEPERS.

"If I am elected sheriff," Bob Wilcox is reported as telling the Hawaiians in recent speeches, "I will get rid of the leper hospital at Kailih, and I promise that if elected I will not arrest any one suspected of being a leper."

RAISING ITS TRACKS.

The Rapid Transit Company has a force of men at work raising its tracks on King street at the junction of Pihok. At this point large volumes of water come down from the slopes above every time it rains, overtaxing the capacity of the storm water system, and flooding both King and Pihok streets at this point whenever there is a severe rain. The water covers the track and washes mud, sand and even stones of considerable size on to the track, greatly interfering with the operation of the road. The company now proposes to raise its track at this point so that it cannot be flooded and to provide drainage to carry off the great volume of water which converges at this point after every heavy rain.

DIED FROM HIS INJURIES.

Kalawa the aged Hawaiian who was struck by an electric car at the corner of Hotel and Richards streets yesterday morning died at the Queen's Hospital last night from the effects of his injuries. He never regained consciousness. Hemorrhage of the brain is supposed to have been the cause of death.

HAD CHARGE OF CENSUS.

General J. P. Sanger who had charge of taking the census of the Philippine Islands, is a through passenger on the Nippon Maru. He inaugurated on that work last October. He has been on duty in the Philippines since 1901 in connection with the inspector general's department. He is a veteran of the Civil War. He is accompanied by his aid Lieut. Thomas B. Taylor.

SOLD DELINQUENT STOCK.

The following number of shares of delinquent stock were sold Monday at auction by J. F. Morgan: 250 shares Waimea to Willard Brown at \$10; 70 shares Kahuku to Harry Armitage at \$21 and 10 shares South Kona Agricultural to A. N. Campbell at \$2.

KAHUNA GOT DEED.

Kakanu Kinoo (w), has filed a suit against Edward B. Mikalemi and Kehekekuallahi, to cancel a deed to Aiea land which she made to them in May, 1901. She declares that the last named defendant is a kahuna and that he assisted in frightening her into signing a document which she didn't know the contents of, but has since found to be a deed.

A LOST JUROR.

The case of Frank Godfrey, trustee, vs. Helen Rowland et al, was delayed all yesterday by the absence of J. H. Love, one of the jurors, who is an employe of Honolulu plantation. The court, attorneys and other jurors waited all morning but he did not show up. When found he made satisfactory explanation to Judge De Bolt that he had understood the jurors were excused until Tuesday, as they were last week.

UTAH MAN COMING.

P. H. Lannan, better known throughout the Rocky mountain region as "Pat" Lanunan, and until recently the principal owner of the Salt Lake Tribune, of Salt Lake City, Utah, will shortly visit Honolulu en route to Japan. Mr. Lannan was identified with the Tribune during the long period of Hon. C. C. Goodwin's editorship. Mr. Lannan disposed of his interest in the Tribune a couple of years ago to Perry Heath, formerly First Assistant Postmaster-General, and to Thomas Kearns at present United States Senator from Utah. Mr. Lannan has been identified with Utah and Nevada public affairs for the past thirty-five years.

BY AUTHORITY

Proclamation!

WHEREAS, Act 31 of the regular session of 1903 of the Legislature of the Territory of Hawaii provides that an election shall be held on November 3rd, A. D. 1903, for the purpose of electing County officers, and that at least sixty days prior to the 3rd day of November, A. D. 1903, the Governor shall issue a proclamation for such election:

NOW, THEREFORE, in accordance therewith, I, SANFORD B. DOLE, GOVERNOR OF THE TERRITORY OF HAWAII, hereby give notice that a special election for County officers of the several Counties of the Territory of Hawaii, will be held on Tuesday, the 3rd day of November, A. D. 1903, between the hours of 8 o'clock A. M. and 5 o'clock P. M. in each County throughout the Territory, except the County of Kalawao including Kalapapa, Kalawao and Waikolu, on the Island of Molokai.

The Counties are as follows: COUNTY OF OAHU:—Including the Island of Oahu and all other Islands of the Territory not included in any other County.

COUNTY OF MAUI:—Including the Islands of Maui, Molokai, Lanai and Kahoolawe and all other Islands within three nautical miles of the shores thereof, but not including that part of the Island of Molokai known as Kalapapa, Kalawao and Waikolu.

COUNTY OF WEST HAWAII:—Including the Districts of Kau, North Kohala, South Kohala, North Kona and South Kona, upon the Island of Hawaii, and all other Islands within three nautical miles of the shores thereof.

COUNTY OF EAST HAWAII:—Including the Districts of Hilo, Puna and Hamakua, upon the Island of Hawaii, and all other Islands within three nautical miles of the shores thereof.

COUNTY OF KAUAI:—Including the Islands of Kauai and Niihau, and all other Islands within three nautical miles of the shores thereof.

County officers to be elected:

FOR THE COUNTY OF OAHU.
Seven Supervisors, two of whom shall be elected from the Fourth Representative District, two from the Fifth Representative District and three from the County at large.

Sheriff, who shall be Coroner, ex officio;
County Clerk, who shall be Recorder ex officio;
Auditor;
Assessor and Tax Collector;
District Attorney;
Treasurer, who shall be License Collector ex officio;
Surveyor.

FOR EACH OF THE COUNTIES OF MAUI, WEST HAWAII, EAST HAWAII AND KAUAI.

Five Supervisors;
Sheriff, who shall be Coroner ex officio;
County Clerk, who shall be Recorder ex officio;
Auditor;
Assessor and Tax Collector;
District Attorney;
Treasurer, who shall be License Collector ex officio;
Surveyor.

The Registration Precincts are as follows:

FIRST DISTRICT.

Puna, Hilo and Hamakua, Island of Hawaii.

First Precinct—All of Puna except Keauau and Oiaa.


Second Precinct—The lands of Keauau and Oiaa.

Third Precinct—That portion of Hilo lying between Puna and Ponahalu Street and Road and the line of its extension to the sea.

Fourth Precinct—That portion of Hilo lying between the Third Precinct and the Honolulu Street.

Fifth Precinct—That portion of Hilo lying between Honolulu Street and the land of Makahanaloa.

Seventh Precinct—That portion of the First Election District lying between the Sixth Precinct and the bed of the Kaula Gulch.

Eighth Precinct—That portion of the First Election District lying between the Seventh Precinct and the land of Kalona.

Ninth Precinct—That portion of the First Election District lying between the Eighth Precinct and the bed of the Malanahu Gulch.

Tenth Precinct—That portion of the First Election District lying between the Ninth Precinct and Kohala.

SECOND DISTRICT.
Kohala, Kona and Kau, Island of Hawaii.

First Precinct—North Kohala, Second Precinct—South Kohala.

Third Precinct—That portion of North Kona lying north of the westerly boundary of Hoihala and a line running from the north corner of Hoihala to the south corner of Puunahulu.

Fourth Precinct—That portion of the Second Election District bounded by the Third Precinct, Hamakua, Kau, the boundary of Keauhou from Kau to Honanau and the sea.

Fifth Precinct—That portion of South Kona lying between Keel and Oloemoana.

Sixth Precinct—That portion of South Kona lying between the Fifth Precinct and Kau.

Seventh Precinct—That portion of Kau lying between South Kona and Punaluu.

Eighth Precinct—The remainder of Kau.

THIRD DISTRICT.
Islands of Maui, Molokai, Lanai and Kahoolawe.

Second Precinct—That portion of the Island of Molokai excepting Kalapapa, Kalawao and Waikolu.

Third Precinct—That portion of West Maui lying between the lands of Waikapu and Honokawai.

Fourth Precinct—That portion of West Maui lying between the lands of Hanakooa and Wahee, known as Kanapali.

Fifth Precinct—The Island of Lanai.

Sixth Precinct—That portion of the District of Waialuku lying west and north-west of a line running from the mouth of Waialuku Stream southerly along the sand hills to Maline Bay and including the Island of Kahoolawe.

Seventh Precinct—That portion of the District of Waialuku bounded by the Sixth Precinct, the lands of Pulehuni, Keliainu, Kailua, Hokuula and Hamakua and the sea.

Eighth Precinct—All that portion of Kula on East Maui lying west of a line running from Honouua to the north boundary of Pulehuni on the line of the two hills Puu o Kali and Puu o Kaha.

Ninth Precinct—The remainder of Kula and that portion of Hamakua lying south-west of the Maliko Gulch and mauka of the Road running from Kaluanui to the Makawao Jail and a line in extension thereof.

Tenth Precinct—The remainder of Hamakua and that portion of Hamakua lying west of the Kahalehaku Stream.

Eleventh Precinct—That portion of East Maui lying between Halehaku and Opoula Streams.

Twelfth Precinct—That portion of East Maui lying between Opoula and Kapaemahu Streams.

Thirteenth Precinct—All that portion of East Maui lying between the Twelfth Precinct and Kipahulu.

Fourteenth Precinct—Kipahulu and Kaupo.

Fifteenth Precinct—That portion of East Maui lying between the Fourteenth Precinct and the Eighth and Ninth Precincts, including Kahikini and Honouua.

FOURTH DISTRICT.
All that portion of the Island of Oahu lying east and south of Nuuanu Street and a line drawn in extension thereof from the Nuuanu Fall to Mokapu Point.

First Precinct—All that portion of the said District comprised in the District of Honolulu and lying east of a line running from the lon, bridge on Ala Moana to the north angle of King and Punahou Streets, the true bearing being N. 30° 30' E. thence along Punahou Street to the foot of Manoa Road; thence mauka to and along the western edge of Manoa Valley to the head of the same.

Second Precinct—All that portion of the said District lying between the westerly boundary of the First Precinct and a line running from the seashore along Sheridan Street, Pihok Street extension and Kipahulu Street to and along the western boundary of the Lunalilo Home premises to the south corner of Kalawahine and along the eastern boundary of Kalawahine until

it strikes the western side of the First Precinct at a point about 1400 feet mauka of Tantalus.

Third Precinct. All that portion of the said District bounded by the westerly boundaries of the First, Second and Eighth Precincts, Nuuanu and School Streets a line running from the junction of School and Punchbowl streets to the old flag pole crest of Punchbowl and the summit of the Konehunuai range.

Fourth Precinct—All th. portion of the said District bounded by the Third and Eighth Precincts and Beretania and Nuuanu Streets.

Fifth Precinct—All that portion of the said District bounded by the Eighth Precinct and Beretania, Punchbowl, King and Milliani Streets and the wester front.

Sixth Precinct—All that portion of the said District bounded by Milliani, King, Punchbowl, Beretania and Nuuanu Streets and the harbor.

Seventh Precinct—All that portion of the said District lying outside of the District of Honolulu.

Eighth Precinct—All that portion of the said District lying between the westerly boundary of the Second Precinct and a line running from the shore along South, King and Alapai Streets, and from the head of Alapai Street to the old flag pole crest of Punchbowl; thence to and along easterly edge of Paena Valley until it strikes the westerly line of the Second Precinct at a point just mauka of the hog back at foot of Tantalus cone.

FIFTH DISTRICT.
All that portion of the Island of Oahu lying west and north of Nuuanu Street and a line drawn in extension thereof from the Nuuanu Fall to Mokapu Point.

First Precinct—All that portion of the Judicial and Taxation District of Koolauko lying west and north of a line drawn from the Nuuanu Fall to Mokapu Point.

Second Precinct—The Judicial and Taxation District of Koolauko.

Third Precinct—The Judicial and Taxation District of Waialua.

Fourth Precinct—The Judicial and Taxation District of Waianae.

Fifth Precinct—All that portion of the Judicial and Taxation District of Ewa, comprised in the lands of Hoaeae and Honouliuli.

Sixth Precinct—All the remaining portion of the Judicial and Taxation District of Ewa.

Seventh Precinct—All that portion of Honolulu or Kona lying mauka of the King street Road from the Ewa line to the King street bridge and all mauka of said Road from the Ewa line to the main Road up Kailih Valley.

Eighth Precinct—All that portion of Honolulu or Kona lying mauka of the King Street Road from the main Road up Kailih Valley—Lilaha street and a line drawn from the head thereof in extension of the line of Judd street, to and along the ridge forming the westerly border of Nuuanu Valley.

Ninth Precinct—All that portion of Honolulu or Kona lying between the Eighth Precinct and Nuuanu Street, and mauka of a line drawn along School street, the Nuuanu Stream and Beretania Street.

Tenth Precinct—All that portion of Honolulu or Kona bounded by King, Lilaha and School streets, the Nuuanu Stream, Beretania and Nuuanu Streets and the harbor.

SIXTH DISTRICT.
Islands of Kauai and Niihau.

First Precinct—The Island of Niihau.

Second Precinct—That portion of the District of Waimea extending from the Third Precinct to the Puunaaupua point.

Third Precinct—That portion of the District of Waimea extending from Hanapepe to the boundary line between Waimea and Kekaha Plantations and extending along a line in continuation of the said boundary to the sea.

Fourth Precinct—From and including westerly boundary of Hanapepe, Kalahoa to and including Hanapepe.

Fifth Precinct—The District of Koloa from its junction with Lihue to and including the land of Lawai.

Sixth Precinct—The District of Lihue.

Seventh Precinct—Extending from the land of Papaa to and including the land of Wallua.

Eighth Precinct—Extending from Kailihwai River to and including the land of Papaa.

Ninth Precinct—Extending from Kailihwai River to the north boundary of the District of Waimea.
