CLAIM HEAVY DAMAGES.

ANOTHER DASH FOR THE POLE

ANDREW J. STONE PROPOSES TO SEEK THE NORTH POLE VIA NORTHWEST PASSAGE.

SEATTLE, Washington, November 11.—Andrew J. Stone, the well-known naturalist who has spent nine summers in Alaska and Northern British Columbia in the interests of the American Museum and the New York Zoological Society, may lead an expedition from the Pacific Coast in search of the North Pole. He is confident the pole may be reached by way of the Northwest passage, which the ill-fated Franklin party attempted for the last time fifty years ago. Prior to Franklin's trip other explorers had endeavored to reach the pole by this route, but had failed.

The project of heading a polar expedition was suggested to Mr. Stone before he left for the North last spring. In any event, the dash for the pole would not be made next year. It would probably be necessary to build a boat especially adapted for the fight with the ice, and to take the utmost care in organizing and outfitting the expedition. Mr. Stone would refuse to start north in less than a year's time, but he thinks a start could be gained early in the summer or spring of 1905.

KINAU HAD LARGE CROWD

PLANTATION MANAGERS ARRIVE TO ATTEND ANNUAL PLANTERS MEETING NEXT MONDAY.

The steamer Kinau arrived today shortly before 4 o'clock from Hilo and way ports with a big list of passengers. A large number of those aboard were managers of the various Hawaii and Maui plantations, who have come to attend the annual planters meeting to be held next Monday.

Senator Palmer Woods and wife were among the arriving passengers. Dr. L. E. Cofer of the marine hospital service returned from Mahukona whither he went to appoint a representative of the marine service.

U. S. Marshal E. R. Hendry returned from a visit to Hawaii. On a trip home from Hilo the weather was very rough. Practically every body aboard was sea sick.

Among the other returning passengers was Detective D. B. Renard. He brought down Al Quong the Chinese who was sentenced to life imprisonment for rape of little Edna Horner.

MARINES WILL MAKE CHANGE

ADDITIONAL DETACHMENT WILL NECESSITATE ERECTION OF ADDITIONAL QUARTERS.

The coming of the detachment of marines for this naval station will mean considerable enlargement in the personnel at the station. Some changes will probably have to be made in the way of quartering the men. There will be at least three officers to come with the detachment.

The medical department of the station will have to be enlarged considerably as the result of the presence of an additional number of men. The medical supplies have been heretofore kept on the U. S. S. Iroquois, but some additional facilities for Dr. Taylor, the surgeon, will have to be provided. An assistant will probably have to be ordered to the local station. A small hospital may also be required.

Admiral Terry has not as yet decided regarding the manner of quartering the men except that they will live on the naval station grounds. Nothing official, however, has been received on the subject of the coming of the men.

Admiral Terry has taken the Punahou residence of Henry Macfarlane, Mrs. Terry, Miss Terry and Mr. Terry, the Admiral's son, will arrive on the S. S. Korea on Tuesday from San Francisco.

LESLIE BALDWIN TIED UP IN PORT

MASTERS AND PILOTS ASSOCIATION MAY TAKE STEPS TO GET BOAT OVER TO KAHULUI.

Captain Mosher the captain of Honolulu Harbor No. 54 of the Masters and Pilots Association will be requested to call a meeting of the association for tomorrow night for the purpose of considering the best means of assisting Alexander and Baldwin in securing a crew to take the tug Leslie Baldwin from Honolulu to Kahului.

Captain Peterson the present master of the Leslie Baldwin is not a member of the association and as another officer will be required to man the boat, the prospects are very dubious about securing any one. The members of the association realize that Alexander and Baldwin have been most kindly disposed toward the association and they are desirous of helping the firm to get the boat back to Kahului. No attempt is being made to dictate to the firm as to whom they shall employ on the vessel after she reaches Kahului. None of the association will ship as mate with Peterson, it is said, so unless an extra man is secured or unless the association's probable offer to take the boat to Kahului is accepted, there is not much chance of her getting over with the requisite crew.

MEN ON THE CRUISER ELBA ARE HIGHLY COMPLIMENTED ON THEIR CONDUCT WHILE HERE.

The Italian cruiser Elba will sail for Yokohama on Wednesday. The vessel has finished coaling and is now lying at the Naval wharf, she may pull out into the stream the first of the week.
