

The annual meeting of the Planters' Association will be held in the Assembly room over Castle & Cooke's offices, Monday forenoon next, beginning at 10 o'clock. After the reading of the minutes, the first matter of interest will be the president's address. The president this year is H. A. Isenberg. Then will follow the report of the secretary, the director of the Experiment Station and of the several committees. Charles F. Eckhardt, director of the experiment station has been engaged in a series of very important and interesting experiments during the year, and his report of the progress and results of these is looked forward to as likely to be of very great interest.

Among the committee reports are those on cultivation, field machinery, reduction processes, labor, insect pests and pumping machinery. It is known that some of these committees have devoted a great deal of time to the work of gathering data and preparing their reports, and much that is valuable in them is expected.

The subject of forestry is expected to engage the attention of the meeting to a considerable extent. The planters have always taken a good deal of interest in forestry, and at their meetings for several years past the subject has been one that has been reported on

and discussed. The last legislature passed new legislation on the subject creating a new board with new powers to have charge of the matter. The continuation of the work of the individual plantations with this board will be one that will no doubt be considered.

Much in the direction of the study and of war on insect pests has been accomplished during the year, and the reports on this subject will take up some of the time of the Association.

The report of the secretary, W. O. Smith, is looked forward to as likely to present fully the work attempted and accomplished during the year.

There has been a very disagreeable north wind prevailing this morning. The water front has been very disagreeable and dusty. The wind would have been fine for vessels to have sailed out of the harbor. The only sailing vessel leaving the harbor today was the schooner Alpena. She got away about 10 o'clock this morning in ballast, for Port Townsend. The tug Fearless towed her out.

The Italian ship Agostina Terrazona sails from off the harbor today for Makaweli to discharge coal for Makaweli plantation.

The schooner Charles Levi Woodbury brought a load of firewood from Hilo yesterday.

The steamer J. A. Cummins made a special trip to Waimanalo yesterday with a load of fertilizer.

The steamer Walaleale is being overhauled. She has been on the Marine Railway.

Reports from Koolau are that quite heavy weather is prevailing along the northern side of the island. The schooner Lady was to have sailed this morning for Koolau ports but she will probably wait until tomorrow, owing to the heavy head wind.

Reports from Kailua by the steamer Mauna Loa are that the schooner John G. North which arrived off Kailua a week ago with lumber, had been unable to get into Kailua to discharge. She was not in sight when the Mauna Loa was at Kailua Thursday.

News of the suicide of Ah Lin, a Chinese woman aged 21 years at Hoesie Ewn district November 8 was received this morning by the police. The woman is thought to have taken her life while insane.

Her husband, Kam Chong was out in the rice fields shooting rice birds when one of his children came out saying that her mother was ill. Kam went into the house and found the woman suffering pain, lying on the bed. The woman had evidently taken poison of some kind. Kam thought that she had poured water over a vegetable substance used as a hair dressing and drank some as a bowl of this substance was spilled over the floor. The woman died within a short time after her husband went to her.

The contents of the stomach and some of the hair dressing were sent to the government chemist for analysis. Strychnine was found in the stomach. There was no poison in the hair dressing.

The woman had evidently taken strychnine, for in addition to nearly 9-10 of a grain being found in a small portion of the contents of the stomach, the symptoms of her last illness were those which would have been caused by strychnine poisoning. Kam the husband, testified that he had had a poison a white powder, which resembled strychnine, in his house a year ago to kill rats, but he had thrown the stuff out and buried it. He did not know how the woman could have secured any poison. Kam said that the woman was subject to fits of insanity when she was in delicate condition and in his opinion she had taken the poison with suicidal intent.

The coroner's jury returned a verdict that death had been due to strychnine poison taken with suicidal intent. The evidence went to show that the woman had been insane at the time she took the poison.
