REDUCED COAL BURNING.

The cruiser Cincinnati proved herself on the recent trip to be the most economical coal burner in the fleet. Formerly she was very wasteful but new boilers were installed in her, she was given additional coal bunker capacity.

HEAVY TRADE IN HUMAN HAIR.

One Hundred Tons, Valued at Three Million Dollars, Imported at Gotham This Year.

NEW YORK, Dec. 20.—Since the revival of the pompadour style of dressing women's hair and the use of the "rat," there has been a tremendous increase in the importation of human hair. It is estimated that 100 tons of hair, valued at \$3,000,000, have been received at this port this year. This does not represent half the expense the style has entailed upon women, for it has given an impetus to the hair-dressing business. Three times as many New York women now patronize hair dressers as did a few years ago. With women of fashion, the hair dresser is looked upon now as a necessity.

The hair dressers say this is a great country for their business. The women of America have less hair than the women of Europe. The quality is about the same, but there seems to be something in the climate of the United States or in the habits of the people that is not conducive to women's hair growing as luxuriantly as abroad.

GOVERNMENT WANTS AIR SHIP.

Overtures Similar To Those Made Professor Langley Are Made To the Wright Brothers.

NORFOLK, Va., Dec. 20.—Uncle Sam wants the flying-machine invented by Orville and Wilbur Wright of Dayton, Ohio, the brothers who made the successful test of their invention last Thursday at Kittyhawk, Va. The Government has been in communication with the Wrights and it is said made the same overtures to them that were made to Professor Langley, who thrice failed to make a successful test of his aeroplane.

Telegrams from Government officials and scientific experts in the employ of the Government have been received by the Wrights, with an invitation to come to Washington and talk over their wonderful machine. The Wrights will leave tomorrow for their home, and at least one of them will visit Washington on the way. The Wrights have refused to answer numerous newspaper queries, and are sacredly guarding their machine from further newspaper exploitation.

WILL NOT FOUND NEW JERUSALEM.

Toler Abandons Effort to Establish One in Harlem Because Mrs. Eddy Objects.

NEW YORK, Dec. 14.—Henry Pennington Toler, leader in a movement to sue for the recovery of Harlem property claimed by descendants of early settlers, has given up his efforts in that direction, so far as the founding of a new Jerusalem there is concerned, because, it is asserted, of the opposition of Mrs. Mary Baker G. Eddy, who did not want Christian Science affairs mixed in with the contest for the property. Direction of the litigation has been turned over by Toler to a law firm, which he has supplied with funds to prosecute the cases.

Toler recently sold his seat on the Stock Exchange in order to devote all his time to the restoration of Harlem real estate to its alleged rightful heirs. He is said to have conceived the idea that the new Jerusalem was to be located on the northern end of Manhattan island by the construction which he placed upon a verse in the Bible, to which his eyes were drawn by opening the book at random. He has issued a statement explaining that he wishes to correct a mistaken impression that Mrs. Eddy and the Christian Science church were behind the movement.

Property worth \$3,000,000,000 is claimed by the corporation under royal grants of land lying north of the present Seventy-fourth street. There are said to be 17,000 heirs to the original twenty-six owners of Harlem. They include many prominent families of this city and persons scattered all over the country.

THE TALAMANCANS.

In the new republic of Panama reside the Talamancans, a tribe of Indians ruled by a king, who have not changed their habits since the days of Columbus. The Talamancan's hut, which is a masterpiece in the art of thatching, is a huge affair and shelters his entire family and all his worldly possessions, including the domestic animals. As he is a past master in the art of domesticating the wild deer, the peccary, the tapir and even the tiger cat, numbers of these animals are present in every village. His bed consists of the trunk of a certain species of palm cut into strips and supported three or four feet from the ground on a frame. A few earthen pots complete the furnishing of his house.

MASQUERADED IN DRESS OF MAN

BEAUTIFUL FRENCH COUNTESS WHO WORE CLOTHES OF OTHER SEX KILLED IN AN ACCIDENT.

PARIS, December 27.—One of the most remarkable and sensational instances of a woman masquerading in man's clothes was revealed here yesterday by the accidental death of the beautiful eccentric Countess Diane Ogier d'Ivry, daughter of the Count d'Ivry.

On the seat of the pony cart that moved along the Avenue des Boulognes, behind a high-stepped horse, was apparently a young man, handsome and dressed in the height of fashion. On the seat also was a groom in showy uniform.

In the crush of vehicles the pony cart collided with a carriage and the handsome young man was thrown to the ground, picked up bleeding from the head and taken to a hospital. There he proved to be a woman and was identified as the Countess d'Ivry. She died from her wounds.

In explanation of the young Countess' madcap freak, it was explained that she adopted man's attire to escape the attention of men. Cutting off her hair, she donned man's attire and in company with her groom visited every part of the city without her identity being disclosed.

THE COLDEST PLACE.

The coldest place on earth inhabited by man is Verkhoyansk, above the Arctic circle, in northeastern Siberia. The thermometer there drops to 90 degrees below zero in January, but sometimes rises to 86 degrees above zero in the shade in July, dropping, however, to the freezing point on the warmest summer nights. The hottest place in the world is the interior of the great Sahara desert in Africa, where the thermometer rises to 122 degrees. The hottest place is Greytown, Nicaragua, where the mean annual rainfall is 299 inches. The place of least rain is Port Nolloth, in South Africa, where less than an inch sometimes falls in a year.
