HILL ATTACKS ROOSEVELT.

NEW YORK, Jan. 5.—At a banquet given to Mayor McClellan, ending early this morning, prominent Democrats made enthusiastic speeches. The feature of the speaking was a caustic attack on President Roosevelt by David B. Hill.

FIRE IN DES MOINES.

DES MOINES, Ia., Jan. 5.—A fire in the State capitol gutted the House of Representatives. Governor Cummins personally fought the flames. The damage done will reach \$500,000.

The State capitol building at Des Moines was a magnificent structure, erected at a cost of three million dollars and containing, in addition to the halls of the House and Senate, a State library comprising forty thousand volumes. The building was of stone, situated in a big square on Capitol Hill, East Des Moines. The House of Representatives had walls sheathed with costly marble. The speaker's gallery, the press gallery and a large visitors' gallery of the House, in addition to the floor furniture, were made of wood. The gutted House is on the second floor, in the West wing of the building and beneath it were the offices of the State railroad commissioners and the valuable historical and horticultural collections of the State.

TO FORTIFY MANILA AND SUBAG BAY.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5.—The Army and Navy Board recommends that Subig bay and not Manila be made the Philippine naval base. It also asks for prompt appropriations to fortify both Manila and Subig bay.

Over two years ago the War Department announced that the government had chosen Subig bay as the best adapted locality for a naval station in the Philippines. The site for the navy yards is in a little bay within Subig bay. It bears the name of Olongampo bay, and at the town of Olongampo the United States already has a force of marines, Olongampo is perfectly landlocked, admits of fortifications that will make it absolutely impregnable, has a plentiful depth of water which is free from currents and wave action, and is forty miles from Manila by land and about sixty by water. It is intended to build a dry dock there large enough to accommodate the largest American vessel in Asiatic waters.

CHICAGO HAS CLOSED 5000 PUBLIC HALLS.

CHICAGO, Jan. 5.—All public halls, numbering 5,000, have been closed in this city until the safety of occupants from fire is reasonably guaranteed. The order has left several thousand people idle.

Found The Ovalau Keel Up

ed hull. He was surprised to find that the vessel had turned completely over, and was lying bottom upwards. He alighted on the keel, and walked along its whole length, and noted that the bilge each side was badly rent. This had evidently been done by the terrible explosion which preceded the vessel's sinking. On making his way towards the bow he found that the fore part had been torn clean away, and a big gaping hole was visible. This damage, too, was no doubt due to the force of the explosion.

The diver examined the vessel's position carefully, and from his observations he says that the steamer in going down must have turned, on one side and lodged on the reef in 11 fathoms of water. During the heavy weather which followed the disaster, the vessel must have been forced from her insecure position, and, toppling over, rolled down a slope, and finally became imbedded keel upwards on the fine sandy bottom. The salvaging party were unprepared for finding the wreck in this peculiar position, and the diver was unable to reach the holds, which contain a large quantity of shells, ivory nuts, and other island produce. A case of dynamite was stored on the Sophia Ann in case it was wanted, and this was taken below, placed in a suitable position near one of the holds, and then exploded. It did considerable damage, but the diver after several attempts found that it was too dangerous to work in the vessel, as the aperture made by the explosion was too small. Operations at this particular spot were, therefore, abandoned for the time being.

An effort was next made to get the chain and anchor. It was unfastened from the vessel's bow, but the greater part was found to be under the deck of the steamer, and no amount of straining and hauling from the winches on the vessel above would shift it. The diver then attempted to get the propeller, but as on closer inspection it proved to be considerably damaged, it was left alone. A quantity of shell and nuts were secured out of the hole in the vessel's bow. They were from the fore hold, and were slowly washing out through the rent. Captain Weston states that he will make another attempt to secure whatever is of any value from the wreck after the holidays. He then intends to take a large quantity of dynamite with him for the purpose of rending holes in the hull sufficiently large to get at the cargo.
