APPEAL TO HIGHEST COURT. WASHINGTON, January 4.—A petition for a writ of certiorari was filed in the United States Supreme Court today by H. Hackfeld & Co., of Honolulu to require the Circuit Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit to certify the case of Hackfeld & Co. against the United States of America. The firm in question, agent for the Pacific Mill Steamship Company, was charged with violation of the contract labor law by failing and refusing to return two Japanese to Japan who had been ordered deported from San Francisco. The Japanese in question escaped from the steamer Kofea at Honolulu on November 12, 1902, and the Court found the defendant guilty of neglecting and refusing to return the immigrants to the port from which they came and imposed a fine of \$500 and costs. The Court of Appeals affirmed this judgment. The defendant claimed that the escape occurred through no fault of the company and that the judgment is erroneous and repugnant to common sense.

MAUI STARTS NEW SERVICE. Beginning today the Wilder S. S. Company inaugurated a new schedule for the steamer Maui. The vessel sails every Friday at noon for Kawahae, Mahukona, Laupahoehoe and Papaiaoa. The vessel connects with the S. S. Alameda every third week on the arrival of that mail steamer from San Francisco.

NEW STEAMSHIP LIST. The American-Hawaiian S. S. Company has gotten out a new schedule of mail steamers operating to and from Honolulu. The list also includes the regular sailings of the S. S. Nevada, She is to continue her sailing from Kahului for San Francisco on the return trip, not returning to Honolulu after she goes to Kahului.

WHARVES FOR BIG STEAMERS

A PIER FIVE HUNDRED AND FIFTY FEET LONG BEGINNING AT ALLEN STREET LINE.

Superintendent of Public Works Holloway had a conference yesterday afternoon with a number of men interested in the proposed new plan of wharves, which were prepared by former Superintendent Cooper and for which an appropriation of \$300,000 was made by the legislature. Those present were: Marston Campbell, C. L. Wight, president of the Wilder Steamship Co.; J. A. Kennedy, president of the Inter-Island Steam Navigation Co.; F. W. Kiebahn, representing H. Hackfeld & Co., Ltd.; Fred Whitney, W. G. Irwin & Co., Ltd.; and Clarence Crabbe Theo. H. Davies & Co., Ltd.; Captain Thomas K. Clarke, port superintendent for Wilder's; Andrew Fuller, harbor master, and William H. Hoogs, representing the drayage interests.

As a part of the general plan on which work might be begun at once, and which met with general approval of these present, it is proposed to build a seawall 75 feet out toward Ewa from the Navy wharf and, cutting off a portion of the present Pacific Mail wharf dredge a slip 200 feet wide clear back to Allen street. With the dredgings the walled-off space next to the navy wharf would be filled in. The length of the slip is at present given as 550 ft., although this would leave the steamer Korea, 575 feet long protruding her excess into the harbor. Still she could work all her hatches. There would be two berths for the largest liners, or four berths for steamers of medium size. The seawall is to be of solid concrete in the main, yesterday's discussion leading to the conclusion that at the present deep water end of the site cylindrical concrete piers should support the wharf superstructure.
