Robert Louis Stevenson's Account Of Rev. Kekela

Continued from page one.)

you want? 'This bad shippes, this slave shippes,' the chief he say. 'One time a shippes he come from Pulu, he take away plenty Kanaka, he take away my son. 'Melican mate he had man. I go eat him; you eat piece. 'I no want eat 'Melican mate! Kekela he say and he cly—all night he cly! Tomorrow Kekela he get up, he put on blackes coat, he go see chief; he see Missa Whela, him hand the like this. (Pantomime.) Kekela he cly. He say chief: 'Chief, you like thing of mine? you like whale-boat?' 'Yes' he say. 'You like file-a-m' (fire-arms). 'Yes' he say. 'You like blackes coat?' 'Yes' he say. Kekela he take Missa Whela by the shoul'a (shoulder), he take him light out house; he give chief he whale-boat, he file-a-m, he blackes coat. He take Missa Whela he house, make him sit down with he wife and chillen. Missa Whela all-the-same peison (prison); he wife, he chill'en in Amelica; he cly—O, he cly. Kekela he sofly. One day Kekela he see ship. (Pantomime.) He say Missa Whela, 'Ma' Whela? Missa Whela he say, 'Yes.' Kanaka they begin go down beach. Kekela he get eleven Kanaka, get on' (ears), get evly thing. He say Missa Whela, 'Now you go quick!' They jump in whale-boat, 'Now you low!' Kekela he say; 'you low quick, quick!' (Violent pantomime, and a change indicating that the narrator has left the boat and returned to the beach.) All the Kanaka they say, 'How! 'Melican mate he go away?'—jump in boat; low afta. (Violent pantomime and change again to boat.) Kekela he say, 'Low quick!'

Here I think Kauwealoha's pantomime had confused me; I have no more of his ipisissima verba; and can but add, in my own less spirited manner, that the ship was reached, Mr. Whalon taken aboard, and Kekela returned to his charge among the cannibals. But how unjust it is to repeat the stumblings of a forger in a language only partly acquired! A thoughtless reader might conceive Kauwealoha and his colleague to be a species of amiable baboon; but I have here the antidote. In return for his act of gallant charity Kekela was presented by the American Government with a sum of money and by President Lincoln personally with a gold watch. From his letter of thanks, written in his own tongue, I give the following extract. I do not envy the man who can read it without emotion.

When I saw one of you countrymen, a citizen of your great nation ill-treated, and about to be baked and eaten, as a pig is eaten, I ran to save him, full of pity and grief at the evil deed of these benighted people. I gave my boat for the stranger's life. This boat came from James Hunnewell, a gift of friendship. It became the ransom of this countryman of yours, that he might not be eaten by the savages who knew not Jehovah. This was Mr. Whalon, and the date, January 14, 1864.

As to this friendly deed of mine in saving Mr. Whalon, its seed came from your great land, and was brought by certain of your countrymen, who had received the love of God. It was planted in Hawaii, and I brought it to plant in this land and in these dark regions, that they might receive the root of all that is good and true, which is love.

1. Love to Jehovah.
2. Love to self.
3. Love to our neighbor.
If a man have a sufficiency of these three, he is good and holy, like his God, Jehovah, in his trine character (Father, Son, and Holy Ghost), one-three, three-one. If he have two and wants one, it is not well; and if he have one and wants two, this, indeed, is not well; but if he cherishes all three, then is he holy, indeed, after the manner of the Bible.
This is a great thing for your great nation to boast of, before all the nations of the earth. From your great land a most precious seed was brought to the land of darkness. It was planted here, not by means of guns and men-of-war and threatenings. It was planted by means of the ignorant, the neglected, the despised. Such was the introduction of the word of the Almighty God into this group of Nuuhiva. Great is my debt to Americans, who have taught me all things pertaining to this life and to that which is to come. How shall I repay your great kindness to me? Thus David asked of Jehovah, and thus I ask of you, the President of the United States. This my only payment—that which I have received of the Lord, love—(aloha.)

A PROPER VIEW OF IT.

The publisher or author who wrote to Grover Cleveland offering him a position as an agent for a certain book received in reply a dignified rebuke that was richly merited. If, as the offender pleads in extenuation, it was a jest, it was a sorry one, and whether the offer was made in jest or in earnest, it was equally insulting and marks its author as a man of little worth. Men who have held the office of president of the United States have reached too great a height of honor to be annoyed with cheap jokes or to be offered cheap positions. When their dignity is thus touched the nation as a whole is insulted and the people should be quick to resent the outrage. Mr. Cleveland has borne himself with such circumspection since he retired to private life as to win the respect and regard of all. The stiffness and harshness that once marked his manner have given way beneath quiet family life and increase of years, to a most charming urbanity and even a wit both keen and kindly. He has endeared himself to all who are not hidebound in prejudice, and there are few who will fail to feel indignant that any citizen should be so lacking in decency as to approach one of such high station in any spirit save that of respectful consideration.—Worcester Gazette.
