NEW YORK, Jan. 23.—The schooner Augustus Hunt was wrecked off the Quogue Life Saving Station early this morning. Fifteen of her crew were lost.

REBATE ON MANILA COAL

INTERESTING POINT RAISED OVER REBATE ON TRANSPORTS BOUND FROM PHILIPPINES.

*The rebate on the duty on imported coal is no longer granted. The year during which the rebate was allowed expired January 15, and the old law went into effect the morning of January 15. It has been enforced by all federal collectors ever since. No coal vessel has arrived at this port, however, since that time. The duty is 67 cents a ton.

Quite an interesting point has developed recently, however, regarding the rebate to be allowed transports on coal burned from Manila to this place. The collector was asked regarding the matter whether rebates could be allowed on such coal. While the Philippines may not in the full acceptance of the

word, be American territory, still the shipping laws will be put into operation there next July and only American vessels will be permitted to carry freight between those islands and other American ports. In such an event this coal would not be regarded as being brought from a foreign port or subject to duty. The matter has been referred to the Department for a ruling.

Tender Must Carry Cargo

VESSEL FOR LIGHTHOUSE DIVISION MUST BE ADAPTED TO LOCAL CONDITIONS.

It is likely that the lighthouse tender for these islands will be a vessel specially constructed for the work of the lighthouse division of Hawaii. Captain Niblack in his orders and general directions from the lighthouse board was requested to give his idea of the character of vessel that would be best suited to the requirements for a tender in these islands.

Such a vessel would have to be so constructed as to be a cargo carrier. There is likely to be considerable building done throughout the local division and the lighthouse tender will be required to carry materials to the various sections in the division. Some time will elapse however such a tender is sent to these islands.

ARE FEASTING GOVERNOR CARTER

NATIVES ENTERTAIN GUBERNATORIAL PARTY AT ELABORATE LUAU AT PAHALA THURSDAY.

Governor Carter and party are having a splendid time on the island of Hawaii. Reports of the progress of the gubernatorial party were brought today by the steamer Kinau.

Governor Carter and party arrived at Mahukona at 8 o'clock Wednesday morning. They were greeted with a salute. There was a big crowd at the landing to greet the governor. The party were the guests at breakfast of Mr. and Mrs. E. A. Fraser.

On Thursday the party were given an elaborate luau at Pahala by the natives. After the feast there were speeches. Governor Carter spoke and expressed the utmost friendship for the natives. In the evening there was a reception and ball at the Pahala Club. Everybody in the district attended. The affair was a big success in every respect.

Yesterday Governor Carter and Secretary Atkinson met with the planters of that part of the island for the purpose of conferring with them regarding the Kohala ditch and other water matters of importance to that section. Today the party left to inspect the Kohala ditch and other sections of the Kohala district. The party were the guests of Senator and Mrs. Palmer Woods at his ranch.

Beautiful ex-Crown Princess Louise of Saxony, now residing in England, is the alleged author of a book entitled "The Confessions of Princess Louise," in which she declares that she eloped with Giron only to break from the monotony of palace life, and expected by her act to gain much sympathy.

SUIT TO ANNUL ITS CHARTER

ATTORNEY GENERAL TO ASK THE CIRCUIT COURT TO REQUIRE THE FIDELITY INSURANCE COMPANY TO SHOW CAUSE WHY IT SHOULD NOT BE DISSOLVED AS A CORPORATION.

Suit will be brought next week by Attorney General Andrews to close up the affairs of the Fidelity Insurance Company. The Attorney General will ask the Circuit Court to appoint a receiver to close up the affairs of the concern. The court will also be asked to revoke the company's charter, under which it operates.

The suit will be an application for an order to show cause and will be based upon the report of Insurance Commissioner Smithies as to the affairs of the concern, showing that it has failed to comply with the law requiring insurance companies to have \$50,000 of cash or available assets on hand, of such a character that they can be readily converted into cash. Smithies held after investigation that the company was a large sum short in its supposed paid in capital.

CHANCE FOR A LIVELY PRIMARY

Senator Crabbe, chairman of the Republican Territorial Central Committee, is considering the call of a primary election for a convention to select delegates to the national convention. The convention will be held in April and will probably be given to Hilo, which is anxious to have one of the party gatherings.

The question of whether a primary is necessary or whether the members of the old convention should be called together, has not been fully settled, but it is thought that there will have to be primaries. As the regular primaries are to occur in August this would mean two primary elections this year.

JOHNSON APPOINTED

It is Road Supervisor Sam Johnson today's discussions, and he at once issued a commission for Johnson, according to the committee's endorsement. The letter from the committee was a reiteration of its previous endorsement.

Broached Supplies

CREW SAID TO HAVE REFUSED DUTY AND SOME OF CROWD GOT HOLD OF CAPTAIN'S SUPPLIES.

The recent trip of the British ship Netherby to this port from London was decidedly exciting according to reports that have just been made public. The vessel encountered very rough weather off the Horn and some damage was done the vessel, but the principal occasion for excitement lay with the crew and not with the elements.

The crew is reported to have practically mutined during the voyage. Some of them even refused duty. Several of the crew are further said to have broached the captain's supplies and to have enjoyed a high old time. No arrests were made however on the vessel reaching Honolulu.
