FATE OF HENRY B. HYDE.

NEW YORK, February 11.—The ship Henry B. Hyde bound from New York for Baltimore to load for San Francisco went ashore ten miles south of Cape Henry during a heavy gale. She is reported to be leaking badly, and as the gale is still raging it is not believed that she can be saved. Her crew has been taken off. The Hyde is owned by the Coast Shipping Company of San Francisco.

WILL NOT TRY AGAIN.

Alec Dowsett, the owner of the schooner Ada, says that he will not send the vessel away on another expedition to French Frigate Shoal. He will put her in the wood hauling business between Molokai and Honolulu. Considerable lumber, ropes and blocks and tackle were brought back from the French bark by the schooner.

WAILUKU BRIDGE.

The new steel bridge across the Wailuku river on Bridge street will soon be ready for traffic. The props were knocked from under it this week and riveting the braces is going forward. The bridge is one of the best in the islands and is an improvement which Hilo thoroughly appreciates.—Hilo Tribune.

Malcolm, Forbes & Co., where he gained a knowledge of financial matters. He is a bachelor and resides on a magnificent estate of 200 acres in West Wood. He also has a ranch in Wyoming. He is a member of the Union and St. Botolph clubs and of several polo clubs. Forbes has traveled extensively and was mentioned for a place on the Isthmian Canal Commission about a year ago.

THE ROSAMOND.

WAILUKU Feb. 18.—The schooner Rosamond is still at Kahulu discharging lumber. The stormy weather has prevented very good progress on the vessel. She has now quite a big portion of her cargo out, and will sail for the Sound shortly.

THE OREGONIAN.

WAILUKU Feb. 18.—The Oregonian was still outside of the harbor of Kahulu this morning, awaiting favorable conditions to go into Kahulu harbor. The big steamer arrived off Kahulu on Saturday morning, February 6th, and it is now 12 days that she has been lying idle, with probably one or two days work. She lays on the outside idle, while carloads of sugar rush into the warehouses at Kahulu for shipment. Sugar is piling up rapidly, as the H. C. & S. Co.'s mill has been working steadily without a hitch. Yesterday the harbor was not rough, but it is conceded that the reason for her not entering the harbor was the southerly wind which prevailed. The big liner is bound for Delaware Breakwater.
