PUBLIC LANDS NOTICE.

On Friday, February 19th, 1904, at 12 o'clock noon, at the front entrance to the Judiciary Building, Honolulu, T. H., there will be offered for sale at Public Auction a License for a period of fifty (50) years, for the privilege of entering upon certain public lands on the Island of Hawaii, Territory of Hawaii, to confine, conserve, collect, impound, divert and sell all the Running Natural Surface Water, and power produced therefrom, (subject to existing vested rights of private parties in such water, and to the rights of the United States therein), upon and from all the said public lands situated on the Island of Hawaii, in the Territory of Hawaii, within the following area, to wit:

Boundary. Bounded on the North by the sea, on the East by Waipio Valley, on the South by Waipio Valley, the Puukapu-Laupahoehoe boundary until such boundary line reaches an elevation of 4,200 feet, from which point the contour line of 4,200 feet elevation shall form the balance of the South boundary, and on the West by the Honokane-Awini boundary as shown by green border on the sketch plan subjoined to license, the whole of such area being hereafter called the Kohala-Hamakua Water Shed.

Stated Annual Fee \$500.00.
Upset, 2 1/2 per cent of Gross Revenue, but in no event, after expiration of 2 years from date of license, shall the revenue received by the Government through this clause amount to less than \$2500 per annum.
Any bid other than on percentage of Gross Revenue will be rejected.

**BARRY DEFEATS
THE AUSTRALIAN**

FAST FIGHT FOR FIVE ROUNDS,
ENDING IN A DECISION FOR
THE LOCAL MAN.

Dave Barry won Saturday's fight at the Orpheum with Australian Tim Murphy, Referee Weday stopping the contest near the end of the fifth round when Murphy was almost helpless and was receiving a shower of blows from Barry. The fight was a fast one throughout, with Murphy showing more science and Barry superior strength and staying power. There were times when the Australian's fire of blows seemed to be winning for him, but Barry's splendid condition and ability to stand punishment made Murphy's work ineffective.

Dissatisfaction was expressed by some at the war the contest ended, as it was thought that there was a good deal of fight left in Murphy. He could probably have lasted the round, and his strong rallies and fast rushing in previous rounds left him some chance. His blows did not appear to have strength enough, however, and there is not much chance that he could have won.

When the men squared off it was seen that they were about even in height, and Barry looked heavier. His fine condition was evident, as in his former contests and Billy Woods' training had evidently been well done.

Murphy began by landing on Barry a good deal in the first round, apparently showing himself a quicker boxer. On results, however, the round appeared slightly in Barry's favor, as were all the rounds with the exception of a portion of the third. Murphy began the second with rushing tactics and it was give and take during all the round. The third opened the same way and Barry was fought to the ropes once, but Murphy was unable to give enough punishment to affect the result. Barry came back at him and had Murphy getting groggy when the round ended. Throughout round four Barry showed a decided advantage. He punished Murphy severely and the end appeared to be in sight.

Murphy, however, came up bright and strong for the fifth round, and did some more quick fighting. During an exchange in Barry's corner he received a body blow that made him gasp, and he was evidently giving out. Barry fought him to his own corner and had him there helpless. The Australian sank to the floor and though he rose he was not able to fight, and Barry was hitting him practically at will when Weday gave him the decision and stopped the fight.

McDonald, who was to have fought Huihui, was ill and "the Wyoming Kid" took his place. Huihui had him out at the end of the first round. George Morton of Camp McKinley and Joe Castro, the Guam fighter, fought four fast rounds. Castro got the decision. Another preliminary was between two Porto Ricans, one of whom knocked the other out in the first round.

FOOTBALL TIE.

The Iolani and Punahou association football teams met on the Makiki grounds on Saturday afternoon and played a tie game. The playing was hard and was witnessed by a large crowd. It was the second tie of the season between the two teams.

Y. M. C. A. BASKETBALL.

At the Y. M. C. A. basketball games Saturday evening the Lehigh defeated the Iolani, 15 to 13. The High School defeated the Collegians, 19 to 10.

EARTHQUAKE FELT AT HILO.

A severe earthquake was felt at Hilo on Thursday morning at 10:20 a. m. No damage was done.

ANDREWS MUST RETIRE.

Governor Carter has decided to remove L. A. Andrews as sheriff of Hawaii. The governor investigated the many complaints against Andrews, while on Hawaii, and decided in the interests of harmony to have a change. The position has been offered to Paul Jarrett, but the latter has just taken charge of the Raymond ranch on Maui and will probably remain there. W. A. Fetter, captain of the national guard at Hilo, has been endorsed for the position by Hilo Republicans.

PLANS FOR STATION.

News has been received at the immigration station that O. P. Traphagen has been directed to proceed and prepare plans for the immigration station building at this place. It is thought that the appropriation of \$30,000 will be inadequate so a larger amount will probably be asked of Congress next session.

HILO NIGHT STORM BIRD.

For a number of years scientific men who have visited Hilo and those who reside here have been unable to determine the identity of the bird that soars over Hilo at night after a heavy storm. Brother Matthias and Prof. Henshaw have made frequent efforts to capture the birds but without result. During the heavy storm last week the birds were numerous over the town and as far inland as Oloa mill. Brother Matthias is of the opinion that the birds are attracted by the electric lights and he has frequently searched the ground in the vicinity of the electric light poles during the stormy weather but without result. Last week five of the birds were captured alive near Oloa Mill and sent to him to be mounted. He describes them as the Sterna fuliginosa, Ewalena or Sooty Tern and says he believes they breed on Lisianski Island. One that was sent to him measured 28 inches from tip to tip of wings. The birds are web-footed with head and wings black on top and white underneath. As far as known these are the first birds of this species ever captured on the islands.—Hawaii Herald.


