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FUNERAL OF HENRY WATERHOUSE

ATTENDED BY MANY OF ALL NATIONALITIES WHO PAID THE LAST MARK OF RESPECT.

The funeral of the late Henry Waterhouse took place from his late residence on Nuuanu Avenue yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock. There was a very large attendance both at the house and at the grave. Almost every nationality in the heterogeneous population of the islands was represented. The services were conducted under the auspices of Kawaiahao church in connection with the work of which, Mr. Waterhouse has been connected for several years. The Hawaiian choir of Kawaiahao church was present and sang several hymns. Prayers were offered by Rev. William Morris Kincaid and Rev. Henry H. Parker the pastor of Kawaiahao. The mortuary urn of bronze, in graceful shape, with appropriate inscription was carried from the house to the cemetery in a carriage with the active pall-bearers, the four nephews of the deceased, Fred T. P. Waterhouse, Ernest C. Waterhouse, John Waterhouse and George S. Waterhouse. The honorary pall-bearers were Judge Sanford B. Dole, P. C. Jones, W. W. Hall, Judge Samuel Hookano, E. A. Schaefer, George P. Castle, and Frank Harvey. The girls from the Kawaiahao Seminary, all in white dresses, led the procession from the house to the cemetery.

The service at the grave consisted of prayer by the Rev. William Morris Kincaid, and by the Rev. Stephen L. Desha, and the singing of a hymn by a trio composed of Mrs. Otis, Mrs. Lamon and A. E. Ingalls. The urn was placed in a small concrete vault.

Many floral mementos were sent by friends. Many of these were placed upon the vault at the conclusion of the services.
