## VESSELMEN MAKE PROTEST

WAILUKU, February 26.—Captains of steamers and sailing vessels bound for Lahaina, complain of the manner in which they are compelled to enter their respective vessels, as a result of the abolishing of the office of Deputy Collector of the Port of Lahaina, some time ago.

In the case of steamers, they have to proceed to Kahului first, enter their vessel there, and then proceed to Lahaina, this sometimes causing a delay of a day. With sailing vessels, it is more customary that they sail directly for Lahaina or Kaanapali, and the captain came to Kahului, thus entailing considerable, and in a way, unnecessary expense.

Of course, it is a well known fact, that there are very few sailing vessels and steamers calling at Lahaina or Kaanapali direct from the mainland, or from Australia, yet it is contended by most captains, who have had to either ride overland, or go into Kahului to enter, before proceeding to destination, that some arrangement could easily be made, by the customs authorities, to avoid the necessity of entailing the expense and delay above referred to.

## TWO LARGE ESTATE SUITS

Bruce Cartwright as trustee under the will of the late Emma Kaleleonalani, who died in 1885, has brought suit against himself as trustee under the will of the late Prince Albert F. Kuniulakea and against the Queen's hospital and Mele L. Kuniulakea, asking the court to give him instructions regarding the disposal of \$3,145.00 received from the sale of lands to the government some time ago, for street widening purposes. The interests of the two estates and of the Queen's hospital appear to be peculiarly tangled and the trustee says he has the money in his possession, and is charging himself interest while retaining it, and wants to know which estate shall have it.

The lands in question were left to Prince Albert and his issue by the will of Emma Kaleleonalani, with a proviso that the Queen's hospital should have them, if he left no issue. Under the principle will his widow, Mele Kuniulakea, is made sole heiress, and the court is asked to require the various parties to come into court, present their respective claims and receive a ruling as to the disposition of the money.

Another old estate tangle is revived by the suit against John D. Holt, Emma Holt, the Wailua Agricultural Company and C. A. Long. Smith sets forth that the probate of the estate was begun in the Supreme court of Hawaii in 1892 and is "still pending." In June 1900, he loaned \$12,500 of the estate money to John D. Holt, taking a certain mortgage executed by him and others. The suit now brought is to foreclose and settle the interests claimed by the Wailua Company and others named. A similar action for \$1,500 has been brought by Smith against Christopher J. Holt, Emma M. Holt and C. A. Long.

### JONES MURDER CASE.

The second murder case of E. M. Jones will probably be the next trial before Judge Robinson. The Man Chong murder case is set for next Monday, but it will probably be postponed for the term, by consent. Man Chong is charged with the murder of Policeman Mahelona. Jones' trial is set for Monday, March 7.

### KINAU GETTING FAST.

The steamer Kinau is showing increased speed. On her last up trip she went to Lahaina from Honolulu in 6 hours and 27 minutes in the face of a head wind. On the previous trip she went up in 5 hours and 55 minutes. On her trip from Lahaina this week she came down in 6 hours and 10 minutes and last week in 5 hours and 55 minutes.

### SIX HUNDRED RIFLES.

Secretary Atkinson has received word that the federal government has sent six hundred new army rifles for the Hawaiian National guard. The rifles are the latest Springfield pattern in use in the American army. They were sent as a result of a requisition made some time ago.

### NEVADAN ARRIVED TODAY.

The S. S. Nevada arrived this morning from San Francisco with 1,000 tons of freight for this port and 900 tons for Kahului. She brought considerable live stock. The vessel sails tomorrow at 5 p. m. for Kahului.

### BROUGHT BEEF TO MARKET.

The steamer Kaula returned yesterday afternoon from a special trip to Kaunakakai after cattle. She brought 100 head. The steamer Noeau arrived this morning from Honolulu and Kukuhaele and Kailua. She went to Kailua to bring 37 head of cattle for the Metropolitan Meat Market.

### L. E. BEEBE MARRIED.

Friends of L. E. Beebe who was agent for the Globe Navigation Company at this port have received the announcement of his marriage. The ceremony was performed February 6 at Seattle. His bride was Miss Marie Wernli. Mr. and Mrs. Beebe will be at home after February 29.

## WEISBARTH IS TO TRY AGAIN

HAS SECURED SCHOONED LAVINIA UNDER BOND AND WILL GO TO FRENCH FRIGATE SHOAL.

Captain Weisbarth has secured the schooner Lavinia from Allen and Robinson and this morning took charge of her. The little vessel has been lying up for several years, but she is thought to be seaworthy as Captain Weisbarth has examined her and is satisfied on that score.

The vessel will be fitted up and taken to French Frigate Shoal next week, as Captain Weisbarth proposes to make another effort to "salve the bark Connetable de Richemont."

Captain Weisbarth will take only one white man and his crew will be composed of natives. Diver Ellerson will not go on the present expedition.

### HILO SHIPPING.

Hilo, February 26.—The Rosecrans arrived from Honolulu Thursday morning and will sail for San Francisco Saturday. She towed from Honolulu the Am. sch. W. H. Talbot laden with 1260 tons of coal for the Hilo Railroad Co.

The Hawaiian-American S. S. Oregon, Captain Jas. W. Carty, arrived in Hilo Sunday morning from Kahului for sugar. She took on 2,375 tons here as follows: Peppesko, 300; Onomea, 525; Olan, 1,150; Walaiea, 400. She brought for Hilo 4,000 barrels of lime and 100 tons of general cargo. From here she returns to Kahului to complete her cargo. The next vessel of this line to arrive in Hilo will be the flagship Texan.

## HOLT ASSESSOR

James L. Holt has been appointed Tax Assessor for the Island of Oahu. The appointment was made this morning by Treasurer Kepoikai, Holt having been endorsed by the Republican executive committee, and Governor Carter at once approved the appointment. Holt has been deputy in the office for a long time and lately has practically had charge of the office. He will assume the office at once, a commission being issued as soon as his bonds are filed.

## PROBABLY DELAY NIBLACK'S REPORT

DEPARTURE OF CAPTAIN RODMAN MAY PREVENT CAPTAIN NIBLACK COMPLETING REPORT

The departure of Captain Hugh Rodman of the U. S. S. Iroquois for the Orient March 4, will interfere with the work of Captain Niblack in inspecting the entire lighthouse system of these islands. Captain Niblack had planned to visit Kaula but as he has to take command of the Iroquois when Captain Rodman departs the inspector of lighthouses will be unable at present to go to Kaula. Captain Niblack will watch his opportunity however later and go to Kaula.

It is necessary that the system on that island should be inspected. The lighthouse board is now awaiting his report and recommendations before taking any steps towards the improvement of the lighthouse system of the Hawaiian Islands. The new duties that put on Captain Niblack may delay his report.

## INSPECTED MAUI LIGHTS

CAPTAIN NIBLACK AND LIEUT. SLATTERY RETURNED THIS MORNING.

Captain A. P. Niblack the assistant inspector of lighthouses returned this morning in company with Lieutenant Slattery the engineering officer of the lighthouse board, from an inspection of the lighthouse and buoy system of the island of Maui. The officials left by the last Kinau and were able to complete their work in time to catch the Kinau this week. They had to work fast to get to all of the various places, the task in reaching the Kinau light being very rough.

On reaching Honolulu Lieutenant Slattery found in his mail information that he had been allowed \$3,000 for the purpose of making repairs to the local lighthouse system. This is more than had been expected. It will enable the repairs to be made so that the local system can be put in much better condition than it exists at the present time.

### MAUI SHIPPING.

WAILUKU, Feb. 26.—The schooner Kona and bark Poohng Suey arrived at Kahului on Monday last. The latter vessel will load a full cargo of sugar from the Wailuku Sugar Co. She will proceed to New York via Cape Horn, her sugar being consigned to the order of Welch & Co. She commences loading as soon as she is properly berthed. The Olympic arrived at Kaanapali during the early part of this week, where she will take on a full cargo of Pioneer Mill Company's sugar. The schooner Rosamond is still at Kahului, with her cargo of lumber about discharged. She will most likely sail in tow of the Tug Leslie Baldwin.
