HAS SEEN MUCH SERVICE

TWELFTH INFANTRY GOING OUT TO THE PHILIPPINES A SECOND TIME.

The transport Sherman arrived yesterday afternoon from San Francisco with one of the biggest crowds of passengers taken in many months by any of the transport fleet. She left San Francisco March 1 so brought three days later mail. The vessel experienced disagreeable weather for a couple of days but the remainder of the trip was pleasant.

The Twelfth Infantry under command of Col. John W. Bubb is aboard. There are also a number of recruits aboard, the total number of soldiers being 1,352.

The Twelfth Infantry served during the Cuban campaign and participated in the attack on El Caney where it suffered considerable loss. After the Cuban war the regiment was sent in 1898 to the Philippines via the Suez Canal.

The regiment remained in the Philippines until the early part of 1900 when it was sent home. Since that time the regiment has been doing garrison duty in Utah, Texas and Arizona.

Colonel Bubb has been in the regiment since the beginning of the Civil War. He entered the regiment in 1861.

Mrs. Guy Howard widow of the late Colonel Howard of the quartermaster department will stop at Honolulu with her daughter. Col. Howard was killed during an engagement in the Philippines in 1900.

Captain Moor N. Falls and bride formerly Miss Donellan of Salt Lake are through passengers.

The Sherman will sail for Guam and Manila at noon tomorrow. She brought supplies for the local post.

CIRCUIT COURT NOTES.

Judgment by Judge Gear has been filed in the suit of the First National Bank of Hawaii vs. Jesse M. McChesney et al. to the effect that the plaintiff recover from Jesse M. McChesney and Robert W. McChesney, surviving copartners of the firm of M. W. McChesney & Sons, the sum of \$44,537.82, with interest at the rate of 6 per cent per annum until paid, together with plaintiff's costs taxed at \$1159.94.

Judge De Bolt granted a decree of divorce to Annie P. Vida against William C. Vida for refusal and failure to provide suitable maintenance.

Andrew Cox, the deputy sheriff of Waiialua, was granted a divorce against Annie M. Cox by Judge Gear. C. W. Ashford for libelant; no appearance of or for libellee. The grounds are cruelty and desertion.

Judge De Bolt has ordered that the bill be taken pro confesso, giving judgment for plaintiff by default. In the two suits of Henry Smith, Holt estate trustee, against Christopher J. Holt and Emma N. Holt, and against John D. Holt, Jr., Emma Holt, Waiialua Agricultural Co. and Carlos A. Long.

Judge Gear granted defendant in the suit of James W. W. Brewster vs. Frederic J. Church ten days more wherein to file his bill of exceptions.

Plaintiff's bill of exceptions in the ejectment suit of Right Rev. Libert Hubert Boeynaems vs. Malle Kamalu Paahao has been filed. It is an appeal from the granting of a nonsuit by Judge Gear.

Ernest Pardon, one of the beneficiaries, by his attorney in fact, the Hawaiian Trust Co., Ltd., has appealed from the decree of Judge De Bolt in the matter of the estate of August Kraft, deceased.

GOING TO MOLO-AI.

Captain Niblack and Lieutenant Slatery of the lighthouse board will depart today on the steamer Lehua for Moloakai to complete their inspection of the light house system of the islands. The light at Barber's Point was inspected yesterday by Captain Niblack. It is the best light in the entire Hawaiian system and will not, for the present, require any enlarging.

IT WAS JAP DAY IN POLICE COURT

HALF OF CASES ON CALENDAR WERE AGAINST THE LITTLE BROWN MEN.

It was Japanese day in the police court today. Out of a total of 24 cases on the calendar twelve were Japanese. Eight Japs were charged with having disturbed the peace of the night. They were having a war feast and they made too much noise. Judge Dickey fined them \$4 and costs as he thought that the friendship of the Japs must not be risked by inflicting heavy fines, besides the offences did not warrant heavier fines any how.

Asa the diminutive Japanese sneak thief whose depredations were large enough however, was arraigned on three charges. He was charged with stealing a coat, a silver sugar bowl and some silver spoons. Asa had admitted to Detective Renear his guilt but when arraigned the little Jap with good criminal strategy fell back to a new line of action and tried to pass the buck to a mysterious partner. Asa claimed that the other Jap did most of the stealing and gave the goods to Asa. The court continued the cases until tomorrow afternoon.

Kobashi Sidaro was fined \$150 and costs for selling liquor without a license. Toma Abe caused the arrest. Ah Kee was arraigned on a charge of having Che Fa tickets in his possession. When the tickets came to be translated, it was discovered that they were nothing but Chinese riddles. Kee had evidently been calling on some lady friends and wanted to entertain them with a rebus or two. When Deputy Sheriff Chillingworth learned the nature of the tickets he had to nolle prosequere the case.

AT WASHINGTON.

Associated Press, Morning Service. TOKIO, March 9.—It is rumored that the Japanese fleet has engaged the Vladivostok squadron.

The Russian Vladivostok squadron is supposed to be composed of the belted cruiser Rossia, the cruiser Rurik, the protected cruiser Bogatyr, and the fine armored cruiser Gromobol. The Gromobol is a vessel of 14,367 tons and carries a crew of 809 men, and has a speed of twenty knots. The Rossia is of 12,560 tons and has a speed of twenty knots. The Rurik is slightly smaller than the Rossia and not so fast. The Bogatyr is of 8,500 tons and has a speed of twenty-three knots. The vessels composing the squadron are known as commerce destroyers and there has been considerable mystery as to their movements since they first destroyed the Japanese steamer off the northern Japanese coast at the opening of the war a month ago.

THE RUSSIANS FLED.

JAPAN MA, MAKE A LOAN.

JAPANESE CONCENTRATING.

Associated Press, Morning Service. ST. PETERSBURG, March 9.—The Japanese are still landing troops at Gensan and proceeding to Ping Yang. The sending of Ito to Korea is regarded here as the establishment of a virtual protectorate over a country which has become a Japanese military base. Viceroy Alexieff is preparing to move his headquarters to Harbin. The Russians are throwing up earthworks between Kalping and Liao Yang.

RACE WAR THREATENED.
