**BAR MAKES NO RECOMMENDATIONS**

ASSOCIATION MEETS AS RESULT OF DAVIS' CALL BUT REFUSES TO DISCUSS CANDIDATES.

**WEDDED A QUARTER OF A CENTURY**

There was music by the Hawaiian band, and later by a native quintette. There was dancing. The house was beautifully decorated. Mrs. E. K. Wilder whose beach residence, Kinau Hale, adjoins the Macfarlane residence, tendered the use of that for the evening and the fence between the two places was removed throwing the grounds of the two places into one. The refreshments, for which tables were provided, were served in the spacious lanai and reception room of Kinau Hale.

It was in Waikiki that Mr. and Mrs. Macfarlane were married, Father Hermann later the Bishop of Oba officiating. The bridesmaids were the two ladies who are now Mrs. Freeth and Mrs. J. M. Dowsett. The best man was W. G. Irwin who is now at the coast. The groomsmen were Cecil Brown and Hervey Whitney. Mr. Brown is now on a tour of Japan. Mrs. Freeth and Mrs. Dowsett were in the receiving party last night with Mr. and Mrs. Macfarlane. The receiving party stood under a canopy of white tulle spangled with tinsel and malle. Just such a one as the wedding party stood under twenty-five years ago. Many who were there last evening to offer their congratulations, were guests at the wedding a quarter of a century ago.

Mrs. Macfarlane was handsomely gowned, gracious and charming in the reception of her guests, and both she and Mr. Macfarlane were visibly pleased at the large turnout of friends on this happy anniversary. Friends handsomely remembered the occasion, and the presents displayed were very numerous and beautiful, including almost everything of use and beauty that is made in silver.

**SERVICE WAS WRONG.**

In the debt suit of Hoffschlaeger Co. vs. S. Kato, defendant and Hana Plantation Co., garnishee, John A.
