DEATH OF MRS. W. D. WESTERVELT

HAD SUFFERED A LINGERING ILLNESS—WAS A GRADUATE OF OBERLIN COLLEGE—HER LIFE.

Mrs. Louisa C. Westervelt, wife of the Rev. W. D. Westervelt, died this morning after a lingering illness, aged fifty-three years. She was born in the State of New York, but lived most of her life before she was married at Oberlin, Ohio, where her adopted father was an active benefactor of Oberlin College. She graduated in the Ladies' Department of Oberlin College in the class of 1870. Her husband met her there when they were both students, and they were married in 1873. Two children were born of this marriage, both dying in infancy. After his marriage Mr. Westervelt

engaged in ministerial work, holding pastorates in various places, until he came here in 1889 under the joint auspices of the American Board and the Hawaiian Board to take up work for and among the Hawaiians, a work which it was felt had become somewhat neglected since the earlier missionary days. They remained here two years when they returned to Chicago where Mr. Westervelt was engaged in pastoral work until 1899 when they returned to Honolulu to take up again much the same work which he had been engaged in during his earlier residence here.

About a year and a half ago Mr. Westervelt took his wife to Japan and China hoping that the change and the travel would benefit her health. Though it did temporarily, no permanent benefit accrued, and for many months past Mrs. Westervelt has been a very sick woman.

Mrs. Westervelt was a woman of frail physique, but it is said of her by those who knew her well, that she was a woman of the most indomitable self-sacrifice, and an earnest co-worker with her husband, with whose work she thoroughly sympathized, and into which she heartily entered. All her life she displayed the missionary and philanthropic soul, that gave Oberlin College such commanding influence.

Services will be held tomorrow afternoon at 2 p. m. at the residence 1034 Keolu street after which the remains will be cremated. At 2 p. m. on Saturday there will be a short burial service at the Kawahao Mission Cemetery, where the ashes will be interred.

DISCHARGED SUGAR VERY RAPIDLY

PATENT CONVEYOR AT RAILWAY WHARF DISPENSED WITH MEN AND MAKES FASTER TIME.

Some rapid discharging of the steamer Helene has been done at the Railway wharf since yesterday. The vessel finished discharging about 625 tons of sugar at the warehouse in 8 1/2 hours. This work was possible by means of the automatic conveyor which wharf Superintendent Denison installed there the latter part of last year.

By means of this conveyor the sugar is carried from the steamer to the Ewa side of the warehouse a distance of 300 feet. Formerly this stuff would have had to be trucked from the edge of the wharf to inside of the warehouse but by means of the conveyor and a chute in the warehouse, the sugar is gotten to any section of the warehouse, desired. The services of 20 men would have been necessary to truck this cargo but with the conveyor operating only six men were required and the work was done in shorter time. The Helene finished discharging her cargo this evening.

The bark Gerard C. Tosby is taking sugar at the Railway wharf. She is the only vessel there now receiving cargo.

The ship Aryan hauled over to Railway wharf No. 2 yesterday. She will begin taking sugar in a couple of days.

COLLIER NERO ARRIVES.

The Naval collier Nero arrived off the port yesterday afternoon from San Francisco with 4,000 tons of coal for Admiral Glass's fleet, which is due here about next Tuesday from Panama. The Nero anchored off the port. She is the vessel that made the original cable surveys from Guam toward Midway and located the famous "Nero Deep" where a depth of ocean over six miles was discovered.

THE MAUI JUDGSHIP.

Efforts are being made to secure from Washington an order that Judge Kepoika of Maui take the oath of office at once, in order that he may be able to summon a jury for the coming Maui term. It is expected that Attorney General Knox will cable the desired order.

A petition has been granted by the Supreme court for the appointment of J. R. Galt as an additional guardian with George R. Carter and J. O. Carter, in the estate of H. A. P. Carter. The petition for his appointment, without bonds, was signed by all the heirs.

THE POLICE HEARD OF THREE DEATHS

The report of two deaths on the island of Maui were received yesterday by the police. One was the case of Frank Rodrigues a boy 7 years of age, who died from injuries sustained by falling from a pile of lumber at the new Wailuku school house on April 21.

The other case was that of Moriwaaka Taka a Japanese woman. She lived at Alabama Camp, Punene. She helped her husband who ran a store and restaurant. She had been ill for some time. On the night of April 20 she committed suicide by hanging herself.

An old Hawaiian who was afflicted with an incurable disease was found dead in the hills yesterday afternoon. The body was removed to the morgue where a post mortem examination was held.
