10,000 MILES TRAVEL AND ALL EXPENSES FOR \$175

IN MANCHESTER, ENGLAND, TOURS TO THE ST. LOUIS EXPOSITION ARE BEING ADVERTISED FOR THIRTY-FIVE GUINEAS—A MONTH IN TIME AND 10,000 MILES IN DISANCE.

To those who are studying tourist problems, the following from the Manchester City News of March 26, showing what is being done on the other side, will doubtless be of interest. Speaking of a series of tours known as the "Polytechnic Program," the Manchester paper says: "Among the new features of the tours are a series to the St. Louis Exhibition, covering ten thousand miles within a month, at a cost of thirty-five guineas, with facilities for a week's extension to Canada at an extra cost of five guineas. Parties will leave this country weekly, beginning on May 21, by either the American Line from Southampton, or the White Star liner Celtic from Liverpool. The first party by the Celtic, starting on May 27, will be conducted by Mr. S. E. Short."

Thirty-five guineas is the practical equivalent of \$175. On the general subject of tours the Manchester City News says: The Polytechnic program of forty Continental tours and cruises has been issued, and copies may be obtained from the offices of Mr. Frank Short, Royal Exchange, Manchester. Two of the earliest among them will be personally conducted by Mr. Short. On Thursday evening next a special party from Lancashire and Yorkshire, under his guidance, will leave London and arrive in Lucerne on the following evening for a week's sojourn in that charming Swiss resort. At Easter it is especially beautiful, for Pilatus, the Rigi, and other mountains to which there will be sleighing and glissading expeditions are still covered with snow, whilst along the St. Gothard route the remains of numerous avalanches are still to be seen. The cost of the holiday is stated to be five guineas, and thirty shillings extra to those who take advantage of the four day excursions arranged from the Chalets of the Polytechnic. It is wise to add thirty shillings more to these figures. Mr. Short will also conduct one of the steam yachting cruises to the glaciers, fiords, and waterfalls of Norway, passing through, at a cost of nine and a half guineas from Grimsby, nearly three thousand miles of the most picturesque scenery in Europe. The cruise will begin on May 21 and cover thirteen days of the Whitsuntide holidays.

The continental tours arranged by Messrs. Thomas Cook and Son—whose Manchester offices are in Market-street—for the Easter holidays comprise conducted journeys to Belgium, including Antwerp, Brussels, and Waterloo, at a cost of five guineas; to Holland and the Dead Cities of the Zuyder Zee at a cost of £5, 15s.; to Paris at charges varying from £3, 3s. to 5s. 8s. 9d., according to the traveling and hotel accommodation; to the Thuringian Alps at a cost of ten guineas; to Lucerne for eight days for eight guineas (from Manchester); and to Rome for ten guineas upwards. A special leaflet is published showing inclusive fares from this city to Switzerland at Easter. Besides these there are a number of cruises, and many independent tours arranged to Italy and the South of France, the Italian Lakes, the Riviera, several parts of Switzerland, Algiers and Tunis, the Balearic Islands and the Pyrenees, Boulogne, Dieppe, and Ostend. As an example of what is to be enjoyed on the tours, that to the Thuringian Alps may be instanced. The district is one of luxuriant valleys, high peaks, and fine forests. Four hundred years ago, says a writer, it was the cradle of the Reformation. The life of Martin Luther, from the needy student singing carols for his bread to the translator of the German Bible, is as an open book amidst his haunts and homes in Thuringia. Then, there are the houses that Goethe and Schiller spent the greater part of their lives in; the home of at least one of Germany's great musical composers and the favorite towns of one of her most celebrated artists. They count Weimar greater than Stratford-upon-Avon in Thuringia, for in that town lived Goethe and Schiller, the Shakespeare and Milton of their country.

MRS. STANFORD RETURNS HOME
BRINGS A RARE COLLECTION OF EGYPTIAN ANTIQUITIES FOR MUSEUM AT UNIVERSITY.
SAN FRANCISCO, May 3.—Mrs. L. Stanford, accompanied by her maid and courier, arrived home last evening on the steamer China from a nine months' tour of Australia, Ceylon, India, Egypt and Japan. During her stay in Egypt she secured a very rare collection of antiquities that will be added to the museum of the university at Palo Alto a feature being a portrait statue of Cheops, builder of the larger of the pyramids. It is a seated figure, about four feet in height, and was discovered in the temple of the pyramid d-ring Mrs. Stanford's visit to Egypt. It is finely preserved, though made at a period several thousands years before the Christian era.

Mrs. Stanford returns in excellent health, having enjoyed every day of her absence. Leaving here in August 3d last on the steamer Ventura for Sydney, she visited all the principal cities and points of interest in Australia and sailed from Adelaide for Ceylon after a month in the antipodes. A month was spent in the beautiful island of Ceylon, the tea plantations and botanical gardens being particularly attractive and novel. Ceylon was next visited, from which point Mrs. Stanford made a tour of the northern cities and spent a fortnight in the Himalayas, where she stopped at the same hotel that had as its guest Colonel Younghusband, commander of the British troops then about to push on into Tibet. She had many conversations with the British officer who anticipated little trouble for his expedition, having previously made three trips over the Himalayas. She speaks in high praise of his accomplishments.

While at Darjeeling in the Himalayas, Mrs. Stanford enjoyed the rare sight of the Mountain Kinginganga, believed to be the highest peak in the world even higher than Mount Everest, and with an estimated altitude of 29,000 feet. The clouds that hung above the tremendous mountain rendered the view mystical, and the blood-red sunsets that were observed almost daily caused Mrs. Stanford to prolong her stay at Darjeeling several days.

After a brief sojourn in Egypt a return was made to Ceylon and later Southern India was visited. Thence the steamer Prince Henry was taken for Japan and at Nagasaki a Government tugboat accompanied the liner into port to avoid the mines.

The cradle for the Prince Imperial, which the city of Paris gave to the Empress Eugenie, is now in a museum it cost Paris \$16,000.
