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SIBERIA TAKES A DOZEN.
Not a baker's dozen can get away on the Siberia tomorrow for San Francisco. The vessel is crowded in her cabins with through passengers only a dozen people can be given accommodations from Honolulu. Governor

Carter and family will be among those to leave by the vessels tomorrow.

PORTRAIT OF THE DOWAGER

The Empress Dowager's picture is aboard the S. S. Siberia bound for the exposition at St. Louis, where the likeness is to be placed on exhibit. The picture is something remarkable. It has the famous picture of the Vicar of Wakefield's family beaten a block. The Vicar's picture was only too big to be gotten into the house, while the Empress' picture is almost too big to get into the hold of the ship.

The space occupied by the picture and its various trapping and finishings is exactly 835 cubic feet. There is a pedestal on which the picture is to rest. The weight of this pedestal is over 5 tons. The picture is life size showing her Majesty in her royal robes of state. It is an oil painting and is the work of a foreign lady in Pekin. The picture is said to be a fine likeness. After the painting had been completed and was ready for shipment the event was made the occasion for a great demonstration in Pekin and all along the line. The picture could not be defiled by the touch of profane hands. It was sent in a special train from Pekin to Shanghai. In fact the officers of the Siberia, declare that a railroad was specially built to convey the picture to Shanghai. A dozen mandarins of high rank acted as escort to the likeness.

From Shanghai, the picture was conveyed by boat down to Woussung where the S. S. Siberia was lying. The loading of the picture and the various parts of the consignment was an important affair. The marine Superintendent of the Chinese Merchants Steam Navigation Company, Thomas Weir, had special charge of the shipment. The gaily dressed mandarins were aboard the Siberia and small boats, watching the stuff being taken aboard. The picture and rest of the consignment was placed in one of the forward holds.

A special escort was sent with the picture. His Excellency Shen Nang Hoo the former governor of the Tung Chow circuit of China, is the special emissary of Her Majesty. He will accompany the picture to St. Louis and remain indefinitely. He is accompanied by his interpreter Chum Chin Tung. The picture and the entire outfit cost a large sum. It is insured for \$50,000 gold. The emissary is worth \$11,000,000 and is one of the most influential men of China. He is a director in the Chinese Merchant Steam Navigation Company.

The enemy which partook in the fight near Kinchow on the 16th inst, consisted of the Fifth, the Fourteenth and the Sixteenth Sharp-shooter Infantry regiment with 8 quick-firing guns. After the fight the enemy retreated leaving 30 dead, officers and men. According to prisoners the enemy's casualties were above 300.

Rear Admiral Masamichi Togo's report:
Our fleet consisting of 4 cruisers, 3 gunboats and torpedo flotilla, after successfully repelling the enemy's destroyers which emerged from Port Arthur during the Hatsuse's disaster and after rescuing her drowning crew, on the 15th inst., proceeded to the Pechili gulf and reconnoitered along the Kaichow promontory. On the 15th inst. we discovered the enemy ashore and fired at them who fled.
On the 17th inst. our fleet penetrated Kaichow gulf and bombarded the enemy's edifices, railway bridge and military trains.

back for five years or so, to find out.

The embezzlements are supposed to have begun when Boyd was chief clerk in the office, under Land Commissioner Brown. At that time, it is stated, the chief clerk, as the one to receive funds, took various sums and the deficiencies were hidden by utilizing recent payments to make the cash entries seem to balance. It is stated that there was a shortage of over \$3,000 when Brown left the office. At that time the Home Rule senate refused to confirm Brown for land commissioner and Boyd was appointed by Governor Dole, being practically the choice of the Senate. He is a brother of Ex-Superintendent of Public Works Boyd.

According to the theory of those who have been investigating, the speculations continued under Boyd. Commissioner Boyd in his statements to the officials this morning admitted that he had drawn money, but claimed that each time he did so he replaced it. Mahaulu in his statements appeared to lay the matter on Boyd.

Attorney General Andrews is in possession of a number of I. O. U.'s bearing the signature of E. S. Boyd, also some of his private bills received, which it is claimed were paid out of government money in the land office. Mahaulu this morning admitted having paid such bills and cashed such I. O. U.'s.

The books of the land office have been experted time and time again since the reported embezzlements began and senate committees have investigated the department. The results of the investigations have been repeated reports in favor of an improvement in the system of book-keeping, but none of the investigators discovered the shortage. It is stated that the shortages were hidden by use of recent payments to make matters balance, recent dues remaining unentered.

As a result of the new discoveries all the books and records are to be examined by Auditor Fisher. As the embezzlements are said to have been going on for five years or more, the investigation will take some days.

Boyd was taken into custody by the police shortly after 1 o'clock this afternoon. Messengers were sent to tell his brothers and friends to come to his assistance and bail him out.

A Proclamation!

Whereas, it is provided by Section 31 of An Act to provide a Government for the Territory of Hawaii, passed by the Fifty-Sixth Congress of the United States of America, on the twenty-seventh day of April and approved on the thirtieth day of April, A. D. 1900, "That the public property ceded and transferred to the United States by the Republic of Hawaii, under the Joint Resolution of Annexation, approved July 7th 1898, shall be and remain in the possession, use and control of the Territory of Hawaii and shall be maintained, managed and cared for by it and its own expense until otherwise provided for by Congress or taken for the uses and purposes of the United States by direction of the President or of the Governor of Hawaii," and

Whereas, it is necessary for the transaction of the public business of the United States relating to Post Offices and the postal service that certain buildings and lot of land within and in the possession, use and control of the Territory of Hawaii to set apart for such purpose.

Now therefore, I, George R. Carter, Governor of the Territory of Hawaii, by virtue of the authority in me vested, do hereby declare and proclaim that the following described piece of land, the buildings thereon and the furniture and fixtures therein contained, are hereby taken for the uses and purposes of the United States, to wit:

Beginning at the present North corner of the Post Office Building on the Southeast side of Bethel Street, as shown on Government Survey Registered Map No. 2219, and running by true azimuth:

- 1. 68° 25' 78.0 feet along Southeast side of Bethel Street;
 - 2. Thence following a curve to the left having a radius of 10 feet, direct azimuth and distance being: 20° 35' 14.7 feet.

 - 4. 231° 30' 86.2 feet along Government Land;
