MAGISTRATE AUI IS REVERSED

THE SUPREME COURT GIVES A DECISION IN THE KONA SUGAR COMPANY CASE.

A decision was given by the Supreme court yesterday in the matter of Clinton J. Hutchins, trustee for the Kona Sugar company. The writ of possession issued to the Kapiolani estate by District Magistrate Aui is set aside. The opinion of the court by Chief Justice Frear, concludes as follows:

"The Magistrate's allowance of the motion for a writ of possession, his issuance of such writ, and his refusal to allow the motion to set aside the same are voided and set aside, with leave to the petitioner to move for a writ of restitution in this court. A LESSON FOR HAWAII

Dr. W. D. Alexander writes as follows:

From a letter just received from S. Percy Smith, former Surveyor General of New Zealand, and founder of the Polynesian Society, we learn that he has been appointed chairman of the "Royal Commission on the Preservation of Scenery" in New Zealand. The New Zealand Parliament has voted £100,000 to secure those of the "beauty spots" of that colony that still remain in private hands, though many have been destroyed, and there are still large areas of Crown lands which can be reserved.

This action should have been taken, he thinks, 30 years ago. Herein lies a lesson for Hawaii.

HIGH SHERIFF ENJOINED.

The wireless telegraph company, the Henry Waterhouse trust company and Nellie D. Cross yesterday secured a temporary injunction restraining Li-luokalani and the High Sheriff from interfering with the wireless company's property. The sheriff recently attached the office and instruments.

SENTENCE COMMUTED.

Acting Governor Atkinson yesterday commuted the sentence of Ihara Ichigoro, the convicted Kahuku murderer to life imprisonment. Ihara was convicted in May, 1895, but was reprieved by Governor Dole twice, the last reprieve ending with the first Saturday in July 1904. He was the only one of the Kahuku murderers to receive the death penalty and he has been under death watch ever since May, 1899.

SEARCH FOR HER FATHER.

Acting Governor Atkinson has received from California a letter asking that efforts be made to find the father of a Hawaiian girl who is now in San Francisco and was taken from the islands when ten years of age. The letter is as follows:

Governor or Consul Kahulawe Island H. I. "Dear sir: I write to you asking the whereabouts of a Mr. Kaluwaha, Hawaiian gentleman, the reason why I take this step is because a daughter of his is in California and would like to hear from him if he is still alive. "Her name is Miss Anna Callaway Kaluwahi; this last spelled name we are not sure we are spelling right. She was taken away to America when she was ten years old by a Mrs. Rick English for an education. "She has tried over and over again to get her father's address but this Mrs. Rick would not tell. "I wish you would do your utmost to find him. "I remain your obedient servant, "ANNA CALLAWAY."

Carter having been the first representative of the Japanese Empire.

FOR THE INDIGENT SICK. Honolulu, Hawaii, May 11, 1904. To the Public: The last Legislature having failed to provide funds for the maintenance of the Government Dispensary or provide medicines or supplies therefor, and also having failed to provide for a Government Physician for the District of Honolulu, the undersigned physicians have mutually agreed to render their services free of charge for the care of the indigent sick and helpless through the Dispensary until July 1st, 1905, or until the Legislature meets and a.d. otherwise provides.

The necessity of this step is disclosed by the fact that there have been 355 treatments at the Dispensary and 62 outside visits in the month of April. There will be an increase of calls upon the Dispensary. To meet expenses \$125 per month will be required. We believe the object will be voluntarily forthcoming.
