GO INTO CONVENTION THIS AFTERNOON

The Democratic convention did not convene until 2:40 o'clock this afternoon.

The committee on permanent organization and order of business was prepared with a report making Col. C. P. Injken, permanent chairman, D. W. Ewaldiko, secretary, M. Haffernan, sergeant at arms; Mr. Koshon, assistant sergeant at arms; F. W. Wood, interpreter.

The order of business recommended was: Report of the committee on platform and resolutions; election of delegates to the National Convention; election of alternates; miscellaneous business; adjournment; Cushing's Manual in made the rule of parliamentary proceedings.

The report was adopted without debate.

The platform reported by the platform committee contained the following:

"We realize that our political destiny is indissolubly linked with that of the United States. We declare that the Hawaiian people, for more than half a century prior to annexation had successfully conducted an independent and sovereign Government within these islands—where Government was based upon a representative parliamentary system; and that the people of this Territory have long been, and are now, fitted for self-government. We therefore protest against being longer held in the position of political subservience and tutelage which inheres in a Territorial form of Government—and we demand, in behalf of all the people of this Territory, at the hands of the Congress of the United States, the speedy admission of Hawaii to Statehood, upon terms of equality with the other States of the Union;—and we pledge the Democratic Party to unceasing efforts to achieve this end.

"We declare that the Republican policy in the past has created, and it now nurtures a system of insolent and powerful TRUSTS,—which are at once a great detriment to the individual welfare of our citizens; a restraint upon individual independence; and a menace to the perpetuity of Republican institutions and government. And we charge one of those dangerous creations, namely the Sugar Trust, with the arbitrary and mercenary manipulations and depression of the price of raw sugar to such extent as to have contributed in large degree to the present unsatisfactory condition of our sugar industry,—where many of our plantations are struggling for existance, and all but few sugar properties are being operated at a profit.

"We condemn the present Republican Administration for its employment of Asiatics in the Navy—and Treasury Department to the exclusion of citizen labor in Hawaii and request such legislation as will protect citizen labor in the future.

"We place our party on record as insisting upon an honest and economical policy of Territorial Government, and we pledge our party to the nomination of none but honest and capable persons for legislative and executive offices. We charge the Republican Territorial Administration of the past and present, with incompetence, and neglect of public interests. We charge the Republican party in this Territory with wilful deception of the people in respect of the so-called County Act, passed in 1903, in that said Act was never intended by them, to become effective,—but was framed with the full intent, that it was so honey-combed with invalid and unconstitutional provisions, as to preclude its bearing the test of attack in the courts.

"We charge the Republican Territorial Administration with being corrupt, beyond all precedent in these islands, and that officers high in said Administration have winked at crime, committed in office,—tolerated, and negotiated with confessed embezzlers of the public funds,—and connived at the escape of such embezzlers from justice."

Korea Will Cut Out Honolulu

Will Sail Direct From the Orient to San Francisco This Time—Many Passengers Booked Here.

The Pacific Mail liner Korea will cut out Honolulu on her homeward trip from the Orient. A large number of passengers had booked to sail by her to the Coast on June 14 and her failure to make Honolulu on this trip will make the situation as regards passengers booking more complex than it has been during the past few weeks.

GEAR GRILLS THE TELEPHONE

S. M. BALLOU WINS THE SUIT HE BROUGHT FOR AN INJUNCTION TO RESTRAIN THE MUTUAL TELEPHONE COMPANY FROM INTERFERING WITH HIS RESIDENCE TELEPHONE.

S. M. Ballou was given the injunction he asked for against the Mutual Telephone Company, by a decision of Judge Gear this morning and in addition he was complimented by the court for having begun the proceeding, which Gear found was a "substantial service" to the community, in settling the law of the case. The judge was quite severe in his comments on the company's attempted charges against Ballou, declaring that its schedules were grossly and outrageously exorbitant. The decision quotes many authorities and lays down a number of important rules.

PAIA AND HAIKU LISTED ON EXCHANGE

The New Issue of Seven Hundred and Fifty Thousand Dollars of Bonds on the Stock Exchange.

The new first mortgage, six per cent bonds of Paia Plantation and Haiku Sugar Company, have just been listed on the Honolulu Stock and Bond Exchange. The Hawaiian Trust Company is the trustee of the bonds and is floating the issue. The trustee has just issued a very handsome circular respecting the bonds giving information about them, and the purpose for which they are issued, the resources behind them, and other matters of interest to investors.

HARD FIGHTS ON FRIDAY'S LIST

HUIHUI AND SILVA AND MODLIN AND CASTRO EXPECTED TO DO HARD-RING WORK.

Bill Huihui and Silva the Punchbowl terror, will probably fight one of the liveliest bouts seen in Honolulu at the Lighthouse next Friday night. There has seldom been a contest in which greater interest was aroused here, for Huihui has the enthusiastic backing of Hawaiians generally and Silva's Punchbowl backers are willing to swear by him.

The contest will be largely one of Huihui's cleverness and speed against the strength, endurance and terrible hitting power of Silva. The fight is certain to be an exciting one whichever man wins.

Modlin will fight Castro. Modlin's bouts have shown him to be a "bad man" to mix things with and Camp McKinley men back him as their champion. Many who have seen Castro fight, however, think he is a match for the soldier, and there is no doubt that he will make a good showing.

BEACH RIGHTS

Judge De Bolt this morning gave a decision in favor of L. B. Kerr in the case brought by the Territory against Kerr to restrain him from constructing a stone wall from high water mark to low water mark and extending along the low water mark line, in front of his lot at Waikiki. The Territory claimed that Kerr had no right to fence in the shore line as far as low water mark. The decision involves points as to riparian rights which have never been determined here before and the case is an important one. Judge De Bolt sustains Kerr's demurrer and dismisses the temporary injunction obtained by the Territory. P. L. Weaver appeared for plaintiff, and Kinney, McQuinnan & Cooper and S. H. Derby for defendants.

The cruiser Albany will leave for Seattle at ten o'clock tomorrow morning and will take mail.

BROKE RUDDER IN A STORM

THE SCHOONER EDWARD R. WEST HAS A LIVELY TRIP HERE FROM NEWCASTLE.

The American schooner Edward R. West, Captain Dahler, seventy-eight days from Newcastle with a cargo of coal from J. J. Moore for the Inter-Island Steam Navigation Co., arrived off port at noon today. The vessel had a very long voyage and only the good seamanship of Captain Dahler brought the vessel in after encountering a serious mishap.

Up to April 10th the West encountered ordinary weather. Then a severe gale came on. At the height of the storm the rudder was broken. The vessel was in 29 degrees south latitude and 162 degrees West longitude. As the gale moderated Captain Dahler found his rudder broken and a portion of it entirely gone. It had broken about ten feet below the cap and had to be cut away in order that planks might be cut up and battened around it with heavy iron bands. After two days' work at the water's edge under the stern of the ship the rudder had been repaired to such an extent that the vessel could proceed slowly. In this manner, at part speed and steering partly with canvas the vessel reached Honolulu.

Captain Dahler is of course very glad to be in port. Shipping men consider that he performed a lively feat in bringing the vessel in.

USED DYNAMITE

CRIPPLE CREEK, Colorado, June 6.—Three hundred pounds of dynamite under the platform at Independence station on the Florence-Cripple Creek railroad exploded, doing great damage. The explosive had been placed there by some unknown party or parties and the deed is supposed to have had some connection with the strike troubles. The dynamite which exploded had been concealed in the shafthouse of Delmonico Mine. Thirteen non-Union miners were killed and a number of others were injured.
