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DEMOCRATS IN CONVENTION

The Democratic Territorial Convention for the selection of six delegates and six alternates to the National Democratic Convention which meets in St. Louis July 6, met this morning in Progress Hall. The American and Hawaiian flags were draped over the platform. Back of the platform was an American flag, and the portraits of Washington, Jefferson, Lincoln and W. J. Bryan. There was a good attendance of delegates and everything promised a strenuous but orderly convention.

In opening the Democratic Convention at 10:30 this morning Vice-Chairman Fred Turrill of the Territorial Central Committee said: "I call this first convention of the Democratic Party of 1904 to order. I hope that business will be expedited. The first business in order is the appointment of a committee or five on credentials. Colonel C. J. McCarthy moved the appointment of a committee on credentials. Dr. Nobbitt rose to a point of order claiming that the first business was the selection of a temporary chairman. Turrill said this could not be done until it was known who composed the convention. Dr. Nobbitt said that the uncontested delegates composed the convention for the purposes of a temporary organization.

C. W. Ashford claimed that nothing could be done until the committee on credentials was appointed and reported.

John Emmeluth moved that the committee on credentials consist of one from each district to be selected by the district delegates. This was carried. The Hawaii delegates selected Ewaliko for Hilo and Sam Kanehailua for Kohala. Maui and Molokai chose L. R. Crook. The Fourth District of Oahu chose C. P. Iaukea and the Fifth District Frank Harvey.

A recess was then taken while the committee prepared its report. The recess for the committee on credentials to prepare its report lasted until 11:30 when the convention was called. Vice-Chairman Tur-

ill announced that the committee reported from the First District 41 delegates; Second, 10; Third, 37; Fourth, 66, and Fifth 55, a total of 209.

On motion of Ashford the report was adopted and the committee instructed to prepare a roll for use by the convention.

Col. C. J. McCarthy then nominated Senator Palmer P. Woods for temporary chairman. There were no other nominations and Senator Woods was chosen unanimously. T. B. Lyons and J. K. Kaupu were appointed to escort him to the chair. In taking the chair Senator Woods thanked the convention for the honor and expressed the hope that he should be able to satisfy the convention.

H. A. Juen moved that a committee of four be appointed to distribute the badges to the delegates. Chairman Woods announced that he would appoint one from each island: T. B. Lyons from Maui, Naillma from Hawaii, S. Umauna from the Fourth District and Uluihi from the Fifth.

Dr. W. S. Nobbitt moved the election of David Ewaliko as temporary chairman, which was carried unanimously.

C. W. Ashford moved that a committee of nine be appointed on resolutions. This was seconded by R. B. Kidd. Dr. Nobbitt raised the point of order that the convention was still in temporary organization and the committee on resolutions was a part of the work of the permanent organization. The chair ruled that the convention had the power to appoint the committee at this time. The motion carried and the chair appointed C. W. Ashford, Prince David, F. H. Hayselden, T. B. Lyons, Frank Harvey, John Emmeluth, David Ewaliko, C. P. Iaukea and Uluihi.

John Emmeluth objected that Uluihi was not a member of the convention. "As he was defeated in the 8th precinct of the 5th district, and only held a proxy. The chair expressed the propriety of the suggestion and was about to appoint some one else, when Ashford appealed claiming that delegates by proxy had all the rights of any other member. On vote the appeal was lost. J. C. Maguire then moved that no person not an elected member of the convention should hold a proxy; and that if any person not an elected member does hold any such proxies he shall turn them over to some member of the convention. The motion was lost.

The chair appointed W. A. Kinney on the committee on resolutions. R. B. Kidd moved that a committee of five on rules and permanent organization be appointed. This motion prevailed. The chair appointed R. B. Kidd, Dr. W. S. Nobbitt, C. J. McCarthy, Fred Weed and H. Swinton.

A recess was then taken until 2 o'clock.

CANNOT COLLECT A LIQUOR BILL

Judge Robinson this morning gave a decision dismissing the case of the Hawaiian Hotel against H. B. Gehr. The suit is on an account largely consisting of sums alleged to be due for liquor, and the court holds that such an account cannot be legally collected.

Dedicate Mausoleum

The new royal mausoleum has been completed and will be dedicated with appropriate ceremonies on June 19. The mausoleum contains the remains of Hawaiian monarchs and the ceremonies will be largely public. Official recognition will be given to the occasion and the government band will take part in the programme. The programme has not yet been fully arranged.

MORE PARROTS BROUGHT HERE

On board the ship Jabez Howes, Captain R. C. Clapp, which arrived from Newcastle on Saturday, is an interesting collection of Australian birds. It consists of about twenty large cockatoos which Captain Clapp will endeavor to enter at this port and if he is allowed to do so intends to sell the birds at ten dollars each. Each bird stands about fifteen inches in height, is entirely white with the exception of a small topknot of yellow on the head and a little streak of yellow under the tail. On the sixty-three days from Newcastle the birds stood the weather at sea well. They are housed in large cages on the poop of the vessel and on arrival in port each bird looked as clean as it ever looked in its native state in the gum tree forests of Australia. In case Captain Clapp is allowed to land the birds here they will net him quite a handsome profit. The skipper declares that the birds have no relationship whatever to the kea or mutton birds which have recently been a cause of rupture between Prof. Bingham and the Board of Agriculture and Forestry.

Bill Huihui and Silva, the Punchbowl terror, will probably fight one of the liveliest bouts ever seen in Honolulu at the Orpheum next Friday night. There has seldom been a contest in which greater interest was aroused here, for Huihui has the enthusiastic backing of Hawaiians generally and Silva's Punchbowl backers are willing to swear by him.

THE NAURE MAN.

Republicans Take Notice

Sec. 13. Each precinct club shall meet biennially at 7:30 p. m. on the second Friday in June or upon the call of the county, district or Territorial Central committee or the Executive committees thereof and shall then make nominations for officers of the club; and on the fourth Friday in June, they shall meet at the same hour and elect officers for the ensuing two years; on the fourth Friday in July they shall meet at the same hour and make nominations for members of the district committee and delegates to the county and Territorial Convention to be voted for at a primary to be held on the first Saturday in August between the hours of 2 and 8 o'clock p. m. or upon call of the Territorial Central Committee, or its Executive Committee.
