Jealous Hilo Hawaiian Arrested for Alleged Assault with Revolver.

HILO, June 17.—About dusk Tuesday evening the neighborhood of Waiama, near Stockfield's lumber yard was startled by the report of three pistol shots fired in quick succession. Screams came from one of the cottages belonging to Dan Kihenui, and when the police arrived they found the wife of Mike Lehuanui, a Hawaiian hawk driver, lying in a pool of blood in a semi-conscious condition. The woman stated her husband had shot her, and in the meantime Lehuanui delivered himself up to Sheriff Andrews at the police station. Captain Rowland immediately took the woman to the hospital, where an examination proved that only two of the shots fired had taken effect. The revolver used was a .22-calibre, one bullet striking deep into the shoulder and the third piercing the woman's abdomen, passing through the body and finding lodgement in the back near the spine. The ball was easily located, and will be removed. If blood poisoning does not set in, it is believed the woman's life may be saved. The would-be murderer is well known about the Volcano Stables where he has been a trusted hawk driver for years. It is alleged he has been jealous of the attention of other men to his wife, and this together with being under the influence of liquor is attributed as the cause of the deed. Otherwise "Mike" as he is familiarly called, has been a peaceable, law-abiding fellow. He was taken before Judge Hapai on Wednesday morning and held in custody pending the outcome of his wife's injuries. After sobering up, he seemed solicitous of his wife's welfare and inquired whether she was still alive. She was resting quietly at last accounts.

VLADIVOSTOK FLEET ESCAPED. Associated Press Cable to the Star. It is believed that the Russian fleet has returned to Vladivostok.

BRITISH STEAMER CAPTURED. Associated Press, Morning Service. NAGASAKI, June 29.—The Russians have captured the British steamer Albatross, Mitromi Hongkong, coal laden, and have taken the vessel to Vladivostok. The above cable is not quite clear as far as the words "Mitromi" and "Hongkong" are concerned. The Albatross, a vessel of 2,775 tons register, sailed from Penarth on February 29 for Hongkong. The vessel had not been reported since she left Port Natal, South Africa, on April 5.

MARTHA DAVIS PROBABLY LOST. Associated Press, Morning Service. SAN FRANCISCO, June 29.—The ship George Curtis arriving from Honolulu, reports having sighted about two hundred miles west of the Farallones a dismasted bark, which is probably the Martha Davis, from Honolulu. The bark Martha Davis, Captain McFall, left Hilo for Honolulu, for San Francisco, on May 25.—The ship George Curtis left Honolulu two days prior to that time. The Martha Davis is well known in the Hilo trade and has made several smart trips between the island port and San Francisco. SPIES ABROAD FOR RUSSIA. St. Petersburg Government Maintaining Spy Bureaus in Many Foreign Countries.

Curious facts about the Russian Government spies in foreign countries have been collected by the press committee of the friends of Russian freedom, and embodied in a leaflet, from which we learn that in Switzerland a certain Rabinovitch was discovered opening letter boxes with a private key, after having vainly offered bribes to postmen. At the intercession of the Russian consul this criminal, who should have been imprisoned, was merely expelled from the country. The protest of liberals in the German Reichstag against the facilities extended by that government to Russia recently attracted considerable international attention. It was shown that Russia had a regular spy bureau in Berlin, with the co-operation, as well as knowledge, of the German police. Searches and seizures in private houses were facilitated; private correspondence furnished, and Russian residents in Germany seized and carried across the frontier to be delivered to the Russian authorities without trial or extradition, when desired. Secretary von Richthofen, in a speech cynically admitting the facts, said Russia maintained a similar spy bureau in Paris. In Bulgaria the seizure of the papers of Weissmann, head of the Russian secret service there, showed that he and his subordinates had been employed by the Asiatic department of the Russian foreign office for nine years in developing a regular system of corruption. Almost all the postmen of Sofia were in his pay. He saw what letters he wished. In England detectives have masqueraded as policemen in order to gain entrance to the domiciles of suspected Russians. Danish, Belgian and Swedish newspapers have also had occasion to complain of this reptilian activity; yet, when President Roosevelt wished to present a protest against the Kishineff massacre, Russia said she could brook no interference in her internal affairs. It is doubly humiliating, then, that other nations should submit to it from her.—The Churchman.

COLDEST CITY.

The coldest city in the world is Yakutsk, eastern Siberia, in the empire of the Czar and the Russians. It is the great commercial emporium of East Siberia and the capital of the province of Yakutsk, which, in most of its area of 1,517,063 square miles is a bare desert, the soil of which is frozen to a great depth. Yakutsk consists of about 400 houses of European structure, standing apart. The intervening spaces are occupied by winter yurts, or huts of the northern nomads, with earthen roofs, doors covered with hairy hides and windows of ice.

RUSSIANS ARE WITHOUT BRAINS.

German military critics compare the Russian rout on the Yalu river with the great battle of Koniggratz in 1866, which ended in the retreat of the Austrian across the Elbe, with heavy loss in artillery, and decided the war in favor of Prussia. The significant feature of the Japanese victory, according to the German view, is not that the Japanese have succeeded in establishing themselves on the Manchurian side of the Yalu, which was generally anticipated, but that the Russians were guilty of characteristic lack of preparation and of inefficiency in failing to arrange for an orderly retreat when retreat was inevitable. This already justifies the fear, say the Berlin strategists, that with all their bravery the Russians are lacking in brains. This is the essential weakness of the Russian army.

Speaking to The Daily News correspondent this morning a member of the German headquarters staff said: "While it was not the Russian plan to hold the Yalu, the strategic importance and moral effect of the Japanese victory cannot be overestimated. The loss of thirty-six guns is a blow that cannot easily be minimized, while the hurried abandonment of Antung proves conclusively that the Russian retreat was in reality a rout. Kuroki outgeneraled his opponent all along the line. The Japanese now hold the lower valley of the Yalu.—Berlin Correspondence Chicago Daily News.
