EIGHT UNANIMOUS DECISIONS

THE SUPREME COURT HANDS DOWN ITS FIRST OPINIONS SINCE THE REORGANIZATION—EIGHT CASES IN WHICH THE COURT AGREED, SIX OF THEM SUSTAINING THE RULING OF THE LOWER COURTS.

Eight decisions, all of them unanimous, were handed down by the Supreme Court this morning. The circuit courts appealed from are sustained in six of the cases. Chief Justice Frear is the author of three of the opinions, Associate Hatch of three and Associate Hartwell of two. It is a long time since a supreme court of Hawaii acted with such unanimity, and the results were pleasing to the legal fraternity.

Among the cases decided is that of Robert M. Fuller vs. the Rapid Transit Company, in which the opinion of the court, by Hartwell, is a lengthy one, sustaining the verdict in the circuit court. Fuller's suit was for injuries received in a collision between a Rapid Transit car and one of Pain's mule cars, in February, 1902. The case was tried in Judge Robinson's court and a verdict for \$2,500 damages was returned. The exceptions are overruled. D. H. Case and Avon H. Crook and C. F. Clemons for plaintiff; Castle & Withington for defendant.

In the case of J. Alfred Magoon, guardian of Kalua Kapukini, spendthrift, vs. Thomas Fitch, Judge Robinson is also sustained. Robinson awarded a fee of \$500 to Fitch for his services in attempting to free Kalua from her trust and Magoon procured a writ of error. In an opinion by Justice Hatch the writ is dismissed.

In the case of the Territory vs. Jacinto A. de Nobrega, Mathias Baptista and Loao Cordeiro, Judge Little is sustained. The defendants were found guilty of larceny in the second degree for stealing a steer, and appealed on legal grounds. Lorrin Andrews, Attorney General, E. A. Douthitt, for the Territory; E. M. Watson for defendants.

In the case of Yee Chin et al vs. the Kwong Chong Wai Company, a verdict for \$4,143.83 is sustained, in an opinion by Frear. The suit was appealed from the first circuit. Thayer & Hemenway for the plaintiffs; Castle & Withington and W. L. Whitney for defendants. Exceptions from the First Circuit Court are also overruled in the case of Yee Chin et al vs. the Kwong Mau Wai Company, in which the points were much similar and the same counsel were employed.

In the case of the Kapiolani Estate vs. William R. Castle, trustee, in which judgment against Castle was given in the circuit court, the supreme court, in an opinion by Hatch, sets aside the judgment and remands the case to the circuit court for further proceedings. Castle & Withington for plaintiff; Kinney, McClanahan & Cooper for defendant in error.

The First Circuit Court is also reversed, in an opinion by Hatch, in the case of E. H. F. Wolters vs. H. F. Redward, in which a judgment for \$1623.12 was entered against Redward. Exceptions are sustained and a new trial ordered. J. A. Magoon and J. Lightfoot for plaintiff; W. T. Rawlins for defendant.

The First Circuit Court is sustained in the case of Allen & Robinson vs. Annie S. Reist, in which the court directed a verdict for defendant. The suit was for \$434.81. The Supreme Court holds that the trial judge was right in directing a verdict for defendant. Kinney, McClanahan & Cooper for plaintiff; C. W. Ashford for defendant.

GIRLS IN REGATTA

THEY PROPOSE TO ENTER CREWS FOR THE SEPTEMBER REGATTA DAY CONTESTS—CREWS OF YOUNG WOMEN OUT IN THE HEALANI AND MYRTLE BARGES PREPARING FOR CONTEST OF SKILL AND MUSCLE.

There is something serious doing in boating circles and the next regatta day will see what it is. Not content with invading every known male pursuit the girls of Honolulu have taken to the oar and the big fete will be enlivened with an exhibition of oarsmanship, or rather of oarswomanship, such as has seldom been seen before.

The matter really started several weeks ago by the formation of a crew of haole girls known as the Punahou, but the spirit of rivalry has been engendered and two crews of Hawaiian girls have now been formed for the purpose of showing the world that the water is the Hawaiians' by right of birth.

Just who are to compose the crews for the race on regatta day is not yet even arranged and there will be a deal of "trying out" before the selections are positively made. The Punahou have already had several spins and yesterday saw both of the crews of Hawaiian girls on the harbor. One crew is using the Myrtles' barge and the other the Healani. Although they have started later, the Honolulu girls have absolutely no doubt as to their ability to defeat the haoles.

"Why," said one of the prettiest of the Hawaiian girls this morning, "those white girls have been rowing for months now and they can't row together yet. We all know how to row before we ever sat in the boat together. I don't know about the other crew of island girls though. They can row just as well as we can."

WOODS TO QUIT

Senator Palmer Woods of Hawaii has written that he will resign as national committeeman, in favor of Col. C. J. McCarthy. Woods says that he cabled to Iaukea announcing his withdrawal before he was appointed, and that he not only intends to resign as committeeman, but will withdraw from politics altogether. "You will never hear of this rooster in politics again," said Woods, who appears to have had quite enough, with the Hearst campaign and his other political activities, to satisfy him.

It appears from Woods' letter that Iaukea was the first to suggest Woods' withdrawing, and there was evidently some sort of understanding between Iaukea and Woods. Woods received a cable from Iaukea at St. Louis, stating that all would be well if Woods withdrew in favor of Koa, and referring to Woods' views of the committee position as evidently expressed to Iaukea before he left. Who Koa is a matter of much uncertainty. Woods says he wired to Koa, asking if he wanted the position and telling him to answer and cabled to Iaukea his withdrawal in favor of McCarthy. Iaukea does not seem to have acted, or else he didn't have the proper swing at St. Louis, for the national committee promptly appointed Woods, and there the matter now stands.

Woods says that he intends to resign at once, in favor of McCarthy, and the matter will therefore have to be taken up again by the National Committee. Incidentally the new developments appear to make Iaukea the one who did not make good, instead of Woods, whose wireless and the result were a mystery to all concerned. "It appears that Senator Woods made good," said Col. McCarthy, "but just what took place at St. Louis I cannot understand."

Another mystery of the case is the identity of Koa, who appears to have been fixed upon by Iaukea and Woods for Democratic National Committeeman. It is thought that the name may be one agreed upon by the two, for some of the leaders or delegates. In any event the issue seems to be up in the air and none of the Democrats seem to know who is the man whom Woods and Iaukea were going to have made their committeeman, if he had only signified his willingness.

THE AMERICA MARU ESCAPED RUSSIANS

JAPANESE LINER SAW NOTHING OF THE ENEMY DURING HER TRIP TO THIS PORT.

The S. S. America Maru arrived this morning from the Orient en route to San Francisco. The vessel left Hong Kong June 21 and Yokohama July 2. She experienced a heavy fog on her way from Hong Kong to the inland sea but from Yokohama to port she encountered perfect weather. She saw nothing of any Russian steamers or warships. Captain Going is once more in command of the America. He was transferred from command of the transport Rosetta Maru, to his former vessel, Captain W. W. Greene who took the America out last trip, left the vessel to take an examination for pilot of the Inland Sea. This position will pay him much more than service with the steamship company and as the examination this year will be the last one in which Europeans will be permitted to participate, he decided to take a chance of getting an appointment.

The America has only 250 tons of cargo for Honolulu and 300 tons of through freight for San Francisco. The report that she was to cut out San Francisco as her terminal is incorrect. She is to go to San Francisco. The company will operate only the America Maru, for the present. The high war risks on cargo on Japanese vessels has served to keep down the shipments upon her.

WAILUKU, Y. M. I.

WAILUKU, July 9.—Invitations have been issued for a Grand ball to be given at the K. P. hall, Wailuku, by the members of Gulistan Council, Y. M. I., on Thursday evening, July 14. This in celebration of the second anniversary of the birth of the council.

ADAMSON NOT CHARTERED.

The British S. S. Robert Adamson has not been chartered yet. She will be through discharging her cargo at coal by Wednesday. She may return to the Orient, unless she gets some charter.

PARKER CASE.

Argument on the demurrer in the Parker ranch case was continued this afternoon before Judge Gear. It is expected that counsel will complete their cases before the court rises today.

SUPREME COURT SESSION.

The old case of High Sheriff A. M. Brown and the Japanese Mayo and Goto engaged the attention of the Supreme court this morning. The High Sheriff appeared as plaintiff in error in the appeal from the habeas corpus proceedings which set the two Japanese at liberty. The matter was taken under advisement.

SHERMAN ARRIVES.

The Transport Brings Many Passengers for Honolulu.

The transport Sherman arrived Saturday afternoon from San Francisco with two days later mail. The vessel left San Francisco July 1. She experienced delightful weather. She brought a number of passengers for Honolulu, among them being William Haywood the Washington representative of the Planters' Association. He was accompanied by his wife and family. He will remain here several months.

Major B. H. Fuller who is to replace Captain Catlin as commander of the local guard of marines, arrived. The Sherman is going to Midway. She has as a passenger for Midway, Dr. William H. Allen who goes to accept a position with the cable company. A number of laborers for Midway will be taken by the vessel from Honolulu.

The Sherman has treasure valued at \$5,000,000 of which \$2,000,000 is in silver certificates and the remainder in specie. The Sherman is scheduled to sail today at 6 a. m.
